

Impressive Pelicans Defeat Corvallis, Meet Grant

Klamath Posts Tourney High In Dumping Corvallis 75-53

McARTHUR COURT (Special)—The Thursday afternoon quarter-final championship round pairing the Klamath Union Pelicans and the Corvallis Spartans produced five firsts.

The Pelis' impressive 75-53 victory over the hard-working Spartans not only gave the KU quint the right to the first semifinal tournament berth, but it also gave them the tourney's high score to date.

The contest also featured the tournament's most impressive rebounding single-game effort over the first 13 as big Bruce Brickner, the 6-7 All-State Pel center, pulled down 21 rebounds to outdistance Medford's Bob Quinney and Roseburg's Ron Lake who each had an earlier 19.

But the balance of the firsts were claimed by Corvallis' 6-0 All-State guard Larry Enos.

Enos connected on nine of 24 shots from the field and a perfect 10 for 10 from the foul line to stack up records two at a time. His total of 28 against the Pelis eclipsed the Wednesday night high of 27 posted by the Tornado's Quinney. His perfect foul shooting was not only the top of the tournament to date but it also tied an all-time mark of 10-10 shared by Eddie Grossbacher, Milwaukee, in 1956, Bert Williams of Medford in 1953, and Bill Maurer, North Salem, in 1959.

Enos' performance, however, was not enough to offset the awe-inspiring .425 field goal shooting of the Pelicans who got four runs into the tall double figures with 31 good ones in 73 attempts from the floor. Despite Enos' work the best the Spartans could muster was 18 for 58 and a .310 from the field.

Junior 6-3 forward Gary Patzke and senior 5-11 guard Wally Palmberg shared high honors for the Pelis with 18 points apiece while Brickner made his lofty jumpers account for 16. Forward Ray Taylor muscled up four for nine from the field and two for two at the foul line for a total of 10 for the Pelis.

Patzke connected eight times in 13 two-point tries and added two for four from the foul line. Palmberg matched him from the free-throw mark and hit eight of 20 from the field. Brickner had seven good ones in 19 from just outside the lane and added two for three from the gift stripe.

Corvallis had the edge on the

Pelicans in just one department; they were successful on 17 of 22 shots from the foul stripe as compared to the KU five's 13-22.

The only mark on an otherwise successful afternoon for the Pelis was an injury to guard Freddie Biehn. He turned his ankle in a third-quarter melee during which he received his fourth foul of the game. Although the wound was not considered too serious he reported immediately to the training room where he had the injured member checked and taped.

Both coaches, Dean White of KU, and Bob Payne of Corvallis, emptied their benches and only one of the Spartans failed to score a point while two Pelis missed out.

At the outset of the game the KU five hurried off to a 6-0 lead but the Spartans, sparked by the shiftless Enos who notched eight points during the first period, closed it to 10-9 with 2:40 left.

However, Palmberg promptly shifted gears and hit for seven points to boost the Pelis to a 22-11 first quarter bulge.

Although Enos kept up the pace in the second frame and shoved the Spartans to within four points, 28-24, within three minutes, the Pelis steadied down and led 37-30 at the intermission.

In the third quarter White shifted Taylor, 6-2, onto Enos and while teammates Patzke, Brick-

ner and Palmberg concentrated on the bucket, Taylor allowed Enos only five free tosses. By the close of the quarter the Pelis were nearly out of reach, leading 56-41.

In the fourth the Whitebirds romped away to the long end of a 66-49 spread and then decided to coast, preferring keep-away tactics to what could have easily amounted to "piling-it-on" to the obviously outclassed Corvallis five.

They worked the ball around the outside for the final three minutes but still couldn't pass up an additional easy nine points.

"Nobody Got Chewed" - White

McARTHUR COURT (Special)—Tonight at 7:30 the Klamath Union Pelicans tangle with the towering Grant Generals in the first game of the semifinals in the 43rd Annual A-1 Basketball Tournament. The winner of the game will move on into the championship game Saturday night while the loser must content himself with a shot at third place.

The coming battle is being considered by even the most enthusiastic and happy Pelican fan with a decided air of caution.

In the Generals they face the tourney's only undefeated team, also the tournament's tallest, deepest entrant.

However, the Thursday afternoon Pelican performance, a marked improvement over their showing in the opener, has convinced the average tournament "expert" that the KU Club regained its "pre-illness" peak and should be considered the equal of the Grant men.

In the dressing room following the Pelican 75-53 victory over Corvallis Thursday, coach Dean White told sports writers that he was "highly pleased with the team's work."

Questioned about the KU start against upstart St. Helens in the opener, White said, "I wasn't mad at them... nobody got chewed! And there was still no reason to chew anyone today. They all did a great job."

Asked if he had made any special preparations for the handling of Corvallis' Larry Enos, who ended up with 28 for the game, White said, "Yes, we put Biehn (5-10) on him with the hopes we could force him to drive... and we found out that he could drive better than we thought. However, after we put Taylor (6-2) on him and forced him to take the jumper over Ray's arms, we pretty well contained him." (Enos hit 20 in the first half and only eight in the last two periods.)

Asked to compare Enos with Roseburg star Jim Jarvis, White noted, "He can't compare as an all-around ballplayer but he certainly can hold his own in shooting."

Three Pelis In Tourney List Of High Scorers

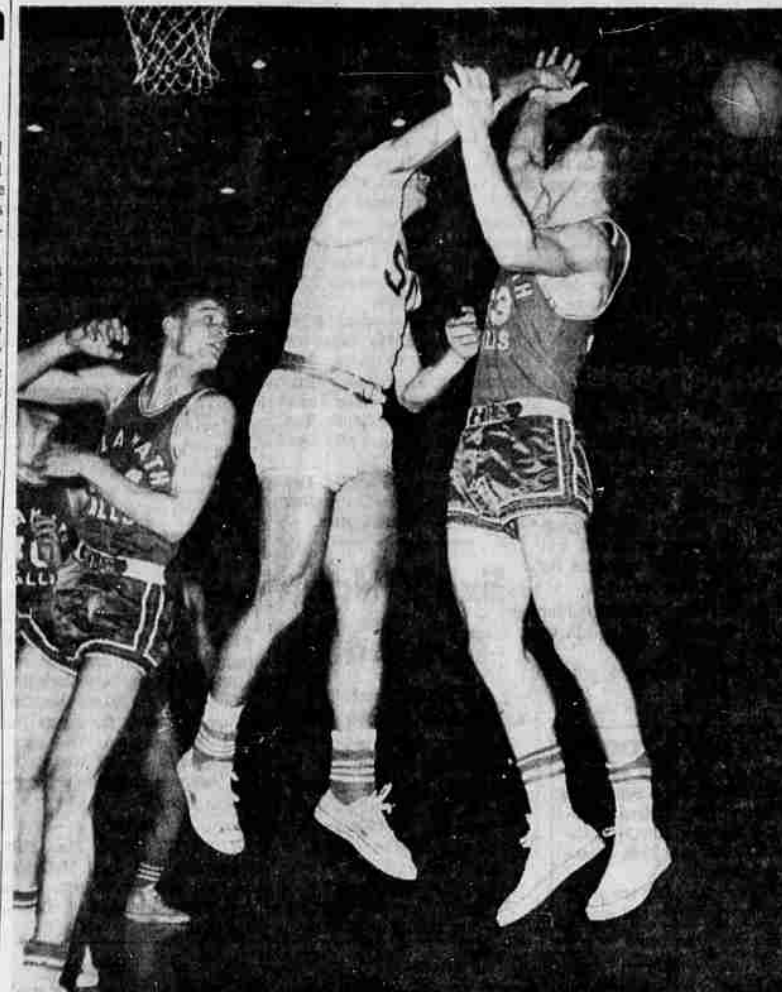

Pelis, Grant, Medford, Wilson Move Into Semis

Grant 63, So. Eugene 43

McARTHUR COURT, Eugene (AP)—Grant High of Portland gained the second semifinal spot in the Oregon A-1 basketball championships here Thursday afternoon before a record crowd of 8,888, slightly more than the 1956 attendance for the same session.

Grant's Generals, the only unbeaten team in the tournament, stretched its record this year to 24 straight by eliminating the South Eugene Axemen, 63-43.

The Eugene quintet, with middle quarters totaling only 11 points, was never in real contention after the early minutes of the third quarter.

South Eugene, playing recklessly and at times carelessly, could not crack Grant's zone defense. The Axemen held only brief leads in the opening period and never more than two points, including a 13-11 margin at the close of the first period.

Mark Leap gave Grant a 13-13 deadlock and then Lyle Smith connected on two free throws to give Grant a 15-13 advantage the Generals never relinquished. At halftime the Grant lead was 26-19. Grant quickly rolled up a 18-point margin with about three minutes remaining in the third quarter, 48-20.

At the end of the third period the count was 40-24, but the Generals went in front by 18 on the first play of the fourth quarter. The Axemen made a mild bid to get back into the ball game, shaving the lead to 11 points, 47-36, with 3:12 remaining.

Bo Blair, a second-team All-Stater for the Axemen who shared Eugene scoring honors

with Ross Carter with 11 points, fouled out with about four minutes remaining—and that ended any chance the Axemen had.

Grant, making good use of a platoon substituting system, had balanced scoring with Eddie Tolleson leading the Portland champs with 10 points.

Medford 60, South Salem 33

Bob Quinney, Medford's 6-4 All-Stater, opened the semifinal door for the Black Tornado as he scored 18 points and added 17 rebounds to his already impressive total to lead an easy 60-33 win over the South Salem Saxons Thursday night.

The Tornado, the defending 1960 state champ, entered the 1961 tournament in the shadow of the Klamath Union Pelicans but in face of its almost too easy wins

climbed into at least a share of the favorite's role.

Medford guard Dick Ragsdale had 12 points for the game. He hit five of seven tries from out front and a perfect two for two from the foul line. Quinney hit 7-14 from in close and potted 4-4 in foul tries.

Medford's stout defense held the Saxons to a chilly nine for 45 and a 200 field goal mark. The Tornado connected on 22 of 57 for a .386.

Steve Stewart, a 5-11 forward, led the Salemites with seven points while Jon Brack and Jim Glott were next with six each.

Dick Ballantyne's outgunned Saxons had a brief, very brief, lead in their loss to the Tornado. Stewart hit a jumper from the corner in the opening 10 seconds of the game and the Salem five managed to stay out front, 2-0, for just 40 seconds.

Quinney canned one from outside and Stan Dowson followed with a free toss and that was all for the Saxons.

By the end of the first quarter Medford was out front 14-7 and they stretched it to 30-11 by the midway point. The Medfordites kept the pressure on the Saxons with a mean man-to-man defense and despite Salem's try at running with them in the third period had a comfortable 44-22 edge by the three-quarter rest.

The Tornado continued to get over Salem's zone in the fourth and Roelandt got his entire squad into the workout.

Wilson's Trojans, Portland's No. 2 entry, had too much of everything before a record crowd of 8,852 here Thursday night in a convincing 64-50 victory over Roseburg's Indians at the A-1 Oregon basketball tourney.

The Trojans, paced by 6-6 Jim Smith, took the lead in the opening four minutes and held brief leads of from one to three points. Doug McDougal's pivot shot put Wilson ahead at 8-7, and the Trojans were never behind.

Mike Brundage kept Roseburg

in the ball game with nine points in the first period that found Wilson ahead 18-13. The Indians were never able to get closer than that 5-point margin, and with less than three minutes before the half, the Trojans had a 14-point lead, at 31-17.

The halftime count was 31-23 with Smith collecting 13 of his 28 points in the half.

Wilson's zone defense was particularly effective against the smaller Roseburg Indians. High scoring Jim Jarvis was held to three free throws and a field goal in the first half, but finished with 19. Both he and Smith of the winners left the game in the closing minutes—but neither fouled out.

The Trojans moved steadily ahead in the third period, with little Stan Johnson hitting from outside to lead a 47-30 count at the close of the quarter.
