

Yreka City Council Votes To Make Up Pool Deficit

YREKA—The Yreka City Council pledged during a special meeting Monday afternoon to make up the difference between the bid price and the remaining funds of the Ringe estate for construction of Ringe Memorial Swim Center here.

Fund Drive Doing Well

DUNSMUIR — Dorothy Baughman, campaign chairman for the Siskiyou Society for Crippled Children, announced Tuesday that the response to her mail campaign which appealed for funds has been very assuring. By Tuesday, \$1,385.36 has been deposited to the society's account by Beverly Minth, treasurer.

Leading enterprises throughout the county are now displaying coin containers to receive contributions to the Easter Seal Society. The Siskiyou school nurses hope that a total of \$3,400 will be subscribed this year. These funds make it possible for them to obtain medical services aimed at correcting or relieving crippling conditions found in our school children.

Dimes Drive Total Lower

McCLOUD — The March of Dimes drive, conducted by Local 3-64, International Woodworkers of America, raised \$849.01. The total was \$50 less than a year ago, union officials said.

A total of \$564 has been collected to date by the Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges in McCloud for the Heart Fund, slightly higher than last year's donations.

Incomplete results on the Boy Scouts of America fund drive show a total of nearly \$700, down nearly \$400 from last year's total.

The council agreed after considerable discussion that difference between available Ringe funds, less than \$80,000 at present, and the constructive cost should come from the city's general funds, sales tax income or from the improvement and building fund which is based on sale of city properties.

The single bid received at the last council meeting was \$109,000 from the Myer, Jones Construction Company of Medford. The bid was rejected and councilmen voted to readvertise for bids. Opening of the new bids has been set for April 20, during a regular scheduled meeting.

Councilman Ed Doyle moved that a deadline of April 6 be set for a decision concerning sale of property presently leased by the Pine Mountain Lumber Company to the city.

The city is asking \$40,000 for the land. Doyle asked that funds so derived be earmarked for the swimming pool. The motion was accepted.

DUNSMUIR — Legislation that might have an adverse effect on Dunsmuir schools was studied at the meeting of the Board of Trustees Monday afternoon.

Roger Ellis, principal, and Harold Baughman and Jack Samuelson, board members, left Tuesday for Sacramento to protest that

portion of AB 1000, school financing bill, that would take forest reserve funds from the counties where lands are predominately national forests.

At present, counties receive federal funds from national forest

income within their boundaries. Current legislation, if passed, would withhold state aid in the amount provided schools through forest reserve funds.

"This is literally 'in lieu' of property tax money," Ellis said in advocating a fight to retain state aid plus forest reserve funds. Ellis noted that Siskiyou County does not have sufficient privately owned property to form sufficient tax base to support its schools.

The board will hold a special meeting within the next two weeks to consider taking a stand on other proposed legislation.

During World War II, she was commissioned a first lieutenant and served in European and other overseas areas. She received several citations for her care for those wounded in battle zones.

She also leaves a son, Sam Edward Lamb Jr.; mother, Mrs. Cecelia Barr of Yreka; her father, Rolland J. Barr of Beaverton; two sisters, Mrs. Helen Bell of Portland and Mrs. Betty Miller of Germany, and three brothers, Jerry and Rolland J. Barr Jr., both of Portland, and Ted Barr of Cathlamet, Wash.

School Asks Higher Tax

ALTURAS—The qualified electors of the Big Valley Joint Unified School District of Modoc and Lassen counties may vote on a \$1.35 override tax on April 18. Polls will be open from 1 p.m. until 7 p.m. in the Bieber Elementary School, Adin Elementary School and Lookout Elementary School.

The increase is asked to provide for operational expenses, building repairs, transportation replacement and repair, maintenance of cafeteria services, prevent cutbacks in programs, replace obsolete equipment, meet rising costs, improve the educational program and to meet salary schedules.

Modoc, Lassen Cattlemen Hold Hearing On Grazing

ALTURAS — Cattlemen of Modoc and Lassen counties began a hearing in Susanville on Tuesday, March 7, with examiners who are interested in the proposed animal unit carrying capacity cut ordered by the Bureau of Land Management more than a year ago. The hearing after getting under way has been recessed until June 20 to complete a survey of the disputed carrying capacity of the Willow Creek grazing unit.

The extension of time to complete the survey was granted by Dent D. Dalby, hearing examiner, upon motion by William O. Bradley, attorney for the dissenting cattle and sheep raisers.

Dalby specified if an agreement for a temporary partial reduction can be worked out by the ranchers and bureau, the hearing would not be resumed until September.

Bradley's request followed the testimony of Fred Harris of Elko, Nev., former University of Nevada agricultural expert and now a range management consultant. The attorney admitted he has no range capacity figures comparable to those compiled in an intensive study by land management officials.

Utility Given Federal Loan

ALTURAS — Congressman Harold T. Johnson has announced the granting of a loan of \$375,000 by the Rural Electrification Administration to the Surprise Valley Electric Corporation. The corporation serves Modoc and Lassen counties in California and Lake County in Oregon and has headquarters in Alturas.

The loan will enable the corporation to construct 108 miles of new line to serve 200 customers and to make general improvements in the system.

The loan is for 35 years at two per cent interest. Marvin Hines is president of the corporation.

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
