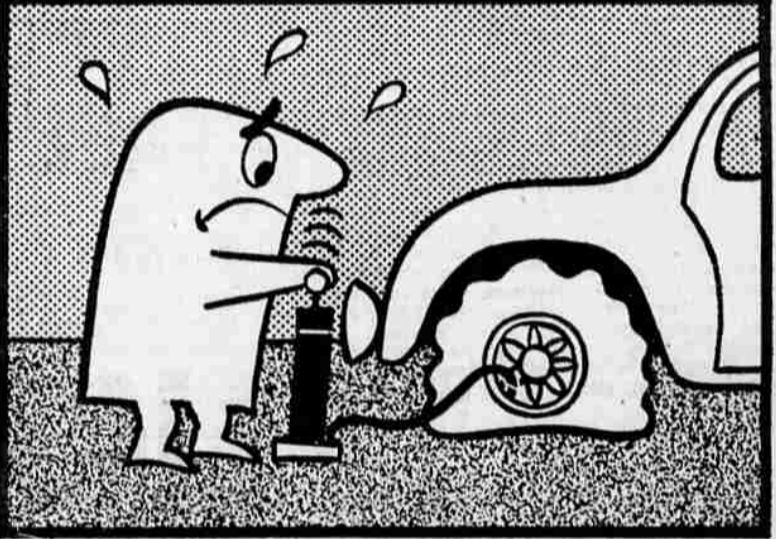

## Browning, Lodge Grass, Warm Springs, Toppenish Win First Round Games In All-Indian Basketball Tourney

Browning posted a come-from-behind 99-89 decision over the Phoenix Chiefs to move into the Friday semifinals against the Lodge Grass Saints, 68-59 conquerors of the Klamath Nation All-Stars. The other winners' semifinalists are the Warm Springs Magpies against the powerful Toppenish Papooses.

The Magpies trounced the Sprague River Ducks 81-56 to open the three-day tourney and Toppenish rolled over the Fallon (Nev.) Wa-Pai-Shones 103-85.

This is the eighth annual tournament sponsored by the Klamath Reservation Jaycees. A large crowd was on hand for opening day action.

**Lodge Grass 68, Klamath 59**  
 The Klamath Nation All-Stars never could get together as a team and were the big disappointment of the first day as they bowed to the aggressive Lodge Grass Saints, 68-59.

The shorter Saints were down 38-33 at the half but came roaring back to take advantage of some sloppy ball handling by the Klamath five. While the Saints got stronger, the All-Stars faded.

Aside from one brief lead, the Lodge Grass team was on the short end all through the first half. Their stubborn second half surge was spearheaded by Pete Plenty Hawk, 6-8 center, who handled the boards, and a pair of sharpshooting guards, Owen Old Crow and Larry Real Bird.

The Saints pulled themselves to a 50-50 tie as the third quarter gun sounded. As the fourth quarter opened, Larry Plenty Hawk hit two short jump shots and Old Crow drove for two points and Lodge Grass had a 59-54 lead.

Klamath resorted to a full-court press with four minutes left in the game and took advantage of a Lodge Grass cold streak to pull up to 59-61 with one minute left as John McCutcheon hit a long jump shot. But the Saints "played it cool" and iced the game on four free throws by Old Crow.

McCutcheon, an all-tournament selection last year, paced the local team with 14 points. All but one of the 11 Klamath players scored, but nobody scored enough. Norm Johns, a recruit from Oregon Technical Institute, had 11 for Klamath.

Mont., bidding for their second straight title, got the scare of their lives before rallying to whip the Phoenix Chiefs 99-89.

The Braves were down 47-39 at the half and had to come clawing back over the determined, but tiring, Chiefs. The game featured some spectacular shooting and a thrilling scoring battle between the Braves' smooth Murray Harwood and the Chiefs' rugged Buck Salway. Harwood edged Salway by one point, 37-36.

Phoenix started as if they were going to run the Blackie right off the court. Guards Charley Fixco and Joe Canard fired long howlers or passed inside to the elusive Salway. The Chiefs raced to a 28-18 first quarter lead.

But, with only two substitutes, the Phoenix five began to tire and Browning began to nibble at the lead. They closed the gap to 47-39 at the half and 69-47 at the three-quarter mark.

Browning tied the game early in fourth quarter on a tipin by big Demele Lytle and took their first lead at 71-69 with nine minutes to go when Floyd Crossguns hit a short jumper. T h lead seasawed back and forth but Phoenix ran out of gas and the ever present Harwood hit an assortment of soft pushers to preserve the win for the Braves.

Lytle followed Harwood with 21 points for Browning while Crossguns rifled in 19 counters. For Phoenix, Salway got important help from Canard, with 19, and Fixco, who tallied 15. Harwood and Crossguns were all - star choices last year.

 The Warm Springs Magpies started fast against the ice cold Sprague River Ducks and coasted to an 81-56 victory to open tournament action.

The Magpies moved out to a 16-9 first quarter lead, paced by fast-breaking guards Tom Estimo and Ed Madsen and the inside work of shifty Jim Keene. Ron Owings, a hustling 6-2 forward, kept Sprague River in the game with 14 first half points.

At the halfway point, the Magpies were in possession of a comfortable 36 - 25 lead. They lengthened their margin to 61-40 at the three - quarter mark and the Ducks were never able to threaten.

The Warm Springs five, which took fourth place last year, showed it will be a contender again this year. Keene led Magpie scorers by dumping in 18 points on an assortment of close in shots. Madsen followed with 17 and Estimo, an all-tourney choice last year, fired in 15 counters.

Owings was the whole show for Sprague River. He hit nine field goals and 14 of 22 free throw attempts for 32 points, but they weren't enough.

Dominating both backboards throughout the game against their shorter opponents, the Magpies took almost twice as many shots from the floor. They canny 36 field goals to only 17 for Sprague River. Free throws saved the Ducks from complete humiliation as they popped in 22 of 36 tries for a respectable 61 per cent while Warm Springs could manage but nine successes in 17 tries from the foul line.
