

Phoenix Tips Fallon, Captures 4th Place

The hustling Phoenix Chiefs raced past the Fallon, Nev., Wa-Pai-Shone five, 84-67, Saturday afternoon to capture fourth place in the tournament.

The Chiefs, making their second tourney appearance, were paced by the outstanding outside shooting of guard Charlie Fixico and the rugged inside work of Buck Salway. Two years ago, the Chiefs took second place in the tourney behind Lodge Grass, Mont.

Both teams shot well in the first quarter and the game ended with Phoenix on the long end of a 29-22 count.

Two Switches Given O.K. By New ABL

CHICAGO (AP) — The new American Basketball League formally approved a switch of two franchise holders Saturday as it opened a two-day session aimed at starting operations in 1961-62.

Representatives of the eight charter members sanctioned ABL Saperstein of Chicago, prime mover of the new pro circuit, as a Chicago franchise holder and George McKeon, a construction company owner, as operator of the San Francisco franchise.

Saperstein, originally scheduled to operate the San Francisco franchise, turned over all assets of that club to McKeon.

The move is intended to have Saperstein lead an expected battle for patronage in Chicago where the long-established National Basketball Association also will start operations next fall.

McKeon attended the meeting, accompanied by the San Francisco club's general manager, Kevin O'Shea, former Notre Dame star, and coach, Phil Woolpert, former University of San Francisco coach.

Other representatives included Ken Krueger and a second signed coach, Jack McMahon of Kansas City; Harry Lynn, Washington, D.C.; Len Litman, Pittsburgh; Len Corbiero, Los Angeles; Arthur Kim, Honolulu, and Marty Silverman, Cleveland.

Ed "Sarge" Easter of Burbank, Calif., and John Crimmins of Detroit fell short of the required 75 per cent of the votes cast, drawing 60 and 38, respectively.

NEW YORK (AP) — General Manager Murray (Muzz) Patrick of the New York Rangers predicted Saturday that the Toronto Maple Leafs will end Montreal's five-year hold on the National Hockey League's most coveted team trophy—the Stanley Cup.

"The Leafs have been a hungry team all year and I figure they'll go into the playoffs the same way," said Patrick. "After all, they haven't won the cup in 10 years. The Canadiens are liable to be complacent as they were at times during the season. They could lose the first game or two and by the time they recover it may be too late."

The cup competition opens in Montreal and Toronto next Tuesday. The third-place Chicago Black Hawks and the fourth-place Detroit Red Wings are the other teams in the best-of-seven semifinal round. The regular season ends Sunday night.

Oregon Board BV Thumps Yreka Sanctions Two Shrine Games To Finish Season

EUGENE (AP) — The Board of Control of the Oregon School Activities Association Saturday unanimously voted to sanction the two Shrine football all-star games.

Previously, the OSAA had approved the games. The sanction means that the association will have a closer connection with the two contests.

The action came at the closing session of the two-day meeting.

The two Shrine all-star games pit the Portland metropolitan area against the remainder of the state in the game for big schools at Portland and the East-West game, for smaller schools, at Pendleton.

The OSAA sanction was taken after the National College Athletic Association recently ruled that high school athletes who participated in post season games without permission of their state organization would lose their first year of varsity eligibility.

The OSAA action thus removes any question about college eligibility for those who participate in the two Shrine games.
