The Reader's Corner

The Civil War in the West is at last getting the attention it deserves. Among the books for spring is "Confederate Strategy from Shiloh to Vicksburg" by Archer Jones (La. State University Press, \$5). In it, Mr. Jones—a Virginian—gives the overall picture of the establishment of a command system in the West in 1862-63.

And Robert H. Jones, in "The Civil War in the Northwest" (University of Okla. Press, \$4), tells what went on in Minnesota and nearby states where the Indians were more of a problem than the Confederates. Oscar Lewis carries the war to the Pacific Coast in "The War in the Far West 1861-65" (Doubleday, \$3.95). The capture of New Orleans in April, 1862, by the Union Navy under Farragut is described in "The Night the War Was Lost" by Charles L. Dufour (Doubleday, \$4.95). And a Western unit that did noble work in the East is described in "The Iron Brigade" by Alan T. Nolan (Macmillan, \$6.95). Regimental histories have been used here as sources for a fine account of this historic brigade.

It may seem difficult to do a worthwhile one-volume life of Lincoln after all that has been written on the subject, but Reinhard H. Luthin has done so in "The Real Abraham Lincoln" (Prentice-Hall, \$10) by re-examining old material and incorporating recent information in a book of nearly 800 pages.

One of the most interesting minor figures of the war has been brought to life in "Porte Crayon, the Life of David Hunter Strother" by Cecil D. Eby Jr. (University of North Carolina Press, \$5). Strother, who lived in the Harpers Ferry region, did the well-known sketches of the John Brown raid. Although he seemed to favor the South, he became a Union general. Mr. Eby edited "The Old South Illustrated" by Porte Crayon for the same publisher (\$6).

The dramatic story of the war's greatest mine explosion is told in "Inferno at Petersburg" by Henry Pleasants Jr. and George H. Straley (Chilton, \$3.95). Dr. Pleasants is namesake and cousin of

the brilliant young engineer who planned the coup that might have shortened the war if Union commanders had properly followed through. And one of the finest of all Civil War military biographies has been reissued with a new introduction by Gen. Walter Bedell Smith. This is G. F. R. Henderson's classic work "Stonewall Jackson" (Longmans, \$8.95).

Two Georgia books are of more than ordinary interest. "The War-Time Journal of a Georgia Girl," edited by Spencer Bidwell King Jr. (Ardavan, \$5.50), gives a day-by-day account of Eliza Frances Andrews while she lived in country invaded during Sherman's march to the sea. And "Confederate City: Augusta, Georgia 1860-65" by Florence Fleming Corley (University of South Carolina Press, \$6) is the kind of local history we badly need. Told in pictures and words, this unusual book gives a detailed account of a Southern community in wartime. We could use more such books.

Other big picture books are "They Fought for the Union" by Francis A. Lord (Stackpole, \$12.50) and "Centennial Album of the Civil War" by Marvin H. Pakula (Yoseloff, \$25). Both are filled with useful data on uniforms, weapons, flags, insignia, etc. And, as if to anticipate the end of the Civil War Centennial, John S. Blay has done a picture book entitled "After the Civil War: 1865 to 1900" (Crowell, \$12). But the end is four years and many hundreds of books away.
