A poll will be taken of the membership by mail before the endorsement becomes official. A ballot was taken of the directors at a special meeting Tuesday morning at the Travelers Hotel.

The Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors will be urged by the Dunsuir Chamber of Commerce to approve resurfacing of Mt. Airport. # College Votes To Build Five Classrooms

WEED—During a regular meeting recently on campus here, the College of the Siskiyou governing board approved plans for construction of five classrooms on the present science building, and of a utility building for garage and storage space. The emergency construction was ordered to cope with an expected increase in enrollment next fall. The present plant was designed to accommodate a maximum of 200. That figure was surpassed slightly last fall, when the second year of college operation began. The addition would provide space for an enrollment anticipated at up to 300 next fall. Architect Allyn Martin, Redding, was instructed to send working drawings to the state Division of School Planning and the Division of Architecture for final approval. Construction is expected to get under way in May and to be completed by the time school convenes next fall. Money borrowed from the school service fund must be repaid within a year.

# Faller Acquitted

WEED—A verdict of not guilty was returned by a jury of six men and six women for Harvey Leo Tipton, 48, McCloud River Lumber Company faller charged with driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. The case was heard in the Weed Justice Court Tuesday and Wednesday of last week before Judge Kenneth T. Stone.

Tipton was arrested Jan. 25 by Weed police officers and was represented by William M. Heidewald, Weed attorney. David Otis, assistant to the district attorney, was prosecutor.

The jury returned the verdict after approximately four hours deliberation at 7:40 p.m. Wednesday night.

# Cities Defying Supervisors

DUNSMUIR—Mayor Dave McClintock has volunteered to work with other mayors of Siskiyou County in defying the board of supervisors for taking punitive action against incorporated cities.

He noted at the city council meeting Wednesday night that W. A. Barr had introduced action to have the county road department shops moved out of Yreka as "punishment" for that city's refusal to bow to a board of supervisors' decision regarding distribution of sales tax. The board approved the action, three to two.

Moving the road department shops will cost the county a minimum of \$100,000, McClintock told the council members. "I think this sort of retaliation is rather expensive," he commented.

McClintock said he had unofficial figures indicating that the county could have collected \$118,000 to date had it passed a sales tax when Dunsuir passed one last year.

# Keep State Green Meet

YREKA—A meeting of the Siskiyou Keep California Green Committee was held Tuesday evening at the Shamrock Cafe under chairmanship of Mel Barron of Fruit Growers Supply Company, who is vice president of Keep California Green, Inc. A no-host dinner preceded the business session.

Since the major function of the Keep California Green program is education of the public on dangers of forest and grass fires, topics under discussion included the poster contest now being sponsored on a statewide level for school children in all grades.

Barron appointed a committee of teachers to meet and start work on a program for school children next year which would include art work, slogans and essays.

Bill Tallis, secretary for the Siskiyou committee, spoke of need for more membership in order to keep the organization going. Tallis explained that the funds derived from membership dues provide literature, bumper strips, bookmarks, automobile decals and various other advertising materials.

Tallis explained that sustaining memberships such as lumber companies, and those who give more than \$100 towards the maintenance of the program is not enough. He pointed out that all organizations, clubs and individuals can assist in the program by joining with smaller contributions. Individuals may join for less than \$5.

Also during the session, Alan McMurry was appointed county chairman to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Jim Hennessy. McMurry stated he would hold the post until he could find a replacement.

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# United States To Increase Postal Rates

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Kennedy administration wants a one-cent increase in the present postage rates for letters, postcards and airmail, and boosts for other classes of mail. Ralph W. Nicholson, assistant postmaster general-designate for finance, said Thursday the request for the across-the-board increase would be made soon, aimed at bringing in an additional \$831 million a year.

Nicholson said the increased rate for letters, postcards and airmail would bring in an estimated \$430 million, while the other boosts would bring in another \$401 million.

He presented the plan to the Senate Appropriations Committee Thursday.

Lindsay H. Noble, deputy assistant postmaster general, said the post office deficit for the 1962 fiscal year, starting July 1, now is estimated at \$831 million—just the amount of the proposed increases.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower had asked for similar rate increases. Noble said the department figures \$344 million of the anticipated deficit is accounted for by second-class mail, magazines and newspapers; \$251 million by third-class mail, largely advertising circulars; and \$113 million by fourth-class mail, parcel post.

See A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., asked what percentage of the loss on second-class mail is attributable to newspapers. Noble said about one-fourth is due to daily newspapers, and about one-third counting all newspapers.
