

# Senator Says Boeing Boardman Lease Offers Tremendous Future Potential

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SALEM (AP) — Sen. Melvin Goode, R-Albany, told the State Senate Monday that the "ultimate potential is just tremendous" in referring to the proposed lease by Boeing Airplane Co. of the 96,000-acre Boardman Navy bombing range.

Goode, one of six legislators who visited the Boeing plant in Seattle last Friday, said Boeing probably would spend millions of dollars at the new site. The legislative Ways and Means Committee scheduled a meeting

for 4 p.m. to consider two bills that could help pave the way for Boeing to sign the lease. Goode said that the taxes on the buildings to be constructed by Boeing could amount to millions of dollars, but that the development probably would proceed slowly.

He told of the possibility of allied industries locating on the Boardman site. "The Boeing officials were favorably impressed by Oregon's tax structure. They pay a 4 per cent sales tax in Washington, and that amounts to more than their profit. So some of our committee members invited them to move their plant to Oregon."

## Morse Doubts Land Trade To Be Arranged Very Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Monday expressed doubt that the Boardman Bombing Range land exchange with Oregon can be arranged soon.

by sales. Exceptions to this policy have been few and far between, and then under the most extraordinary circumstances," Morse wrote.

He assured the governor that he and the state's congressional delegation would "do its best to present the best case possible."

In a letter to Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, the senator outlined problems arising in connection with the 96,000-acre land exchange approved by the last Congress.

Under that arrangement, the state was to acquire the Navy's Boardman Bombing Range through an exchange of state land. The Boardman lands were to be used for industrial development.

He also said that there is no possibility that Morrow County would be deluged with school children of Boeing workers.

Morse told Hatfield it is doubtful the necessary appraisals for the exchange can be completed by July 1.

Another complication that may cause delay, Morse said, is a proposed lease with Boeing Aircraft Co.

He said there have been several requests that the federal-state deal not be completed "unless the guarantees to the people of Oregon leave no room for doubt that the lessor of the property will put it to job-creating and wealth-producing uses for the direct economic benefit of the state of Oregon."

As to suggestions that Congress be asked to approve purchase rather than exchange of lands, Morse said, "This is much easier said than done."

## Demo Relates Speaker Plan

SALEM (AP) — If the Democrats control the Oregon House of Representatives two years from now, Rep. William Holmstrom, D-Geart, may be the speaker.

Holmstrom said he is actively seeking the post, and said he has a number of pledged votes. Holmstrom would not say how many.

Speaker Robert Duncan, D-Medford, is serving his second term and is not expected to seek reelection. He has been mentioned as a possible Democratic candidate for governor.

Among possible opponents for Holmstrom in the race for speaker are Rep. Ed Whelan, D-Portland; Rep. Norman Howard, D-Portland; and Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Mohawk.

Rep. Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, said he is not in the race for speaker.

"At this point I don't think I'll be here next session," Barton said in reply to a question about the race for speaker.

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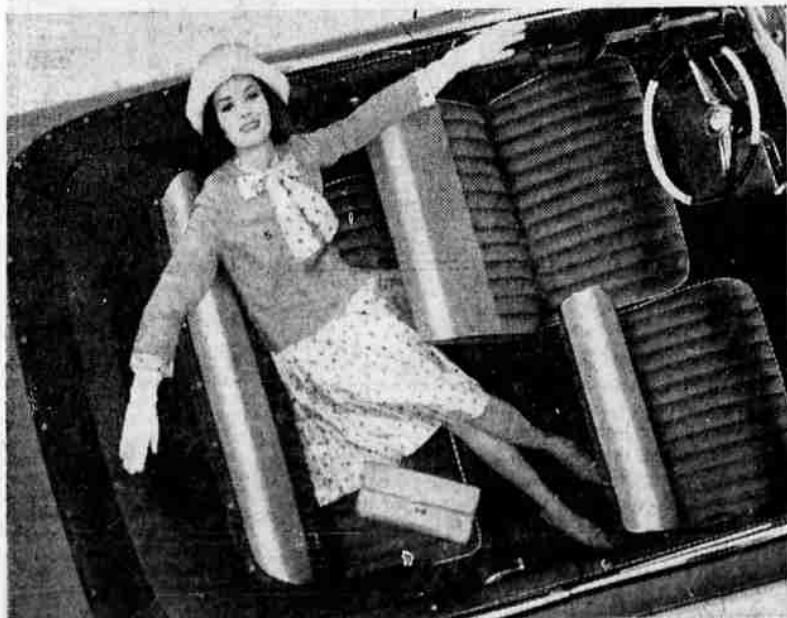
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
