

# Eichmann Played Roll Of Exterminator Of Jews, Using Judas For Model

Adolf Eichmann prepared himself for the role of exterminator of the Jews as today's method actor might train to play Chekhov. Only it was no Chekhovian character that Eichmann chose as his model. Eichmann modelled

himself consciously on the master betrayer of all times, Judas Iscariot.  
It was in Berlin in 1933 that Eichmann first began to understand the role of Judas.  
He was to perfect his performance later in Riga, Lithuania, when, disguised as a rabbi, Eich-

mann personally betrayed a number of Jews to their deaths.  
But why Judas? Why did Eichmann apprentice himself to a man who sold out for only 30 pieces of silver and who himself soon met death?  
Eichmann's reply might be: What man compares to Judas as

a force for evil? For Eichmann is a worshipper of power. He has said of his fuchrer:  
"Adolf Hitler may have been wrong all down the line, but one thing is beyond dispute: the man was able to work his way up from lance corporal in the German army to fuchrer of 80 million people... his success alone proves to me that I should subordinate myself to this man."  
Eichmann was only a corporal in the Schutzstaffeln (SS) when he first began to ingratiate himself with the Jews in Berlin, the better to betray them. He was 27 and had a long way to go before he could boast to his conscience: "A Jew who knew him in 1933 has left this portrait of Eichmann

as he sat in on Jewish discussions in the coffee-houses along Berlin's Kurfurstendamm."  
"He used to listen intently and would always take notes. After the meetings he used to drag the speakers into conversations about theology, of which he was a student."  
"He was popular for his polite, gentlemanly manner and unobtrusive approach."  
"He surprised Berlin Jews by speaking fluently both Hebrew and Yiddish. He had a thorough knowledge of Judaism and was well-informed about all sides of the Zionist question."  
But the polite young man had a peculiar hobby. "He used to summon leaders of the Jewish community in Berlin in the evenings and order them to deliver detailed statistics about Jewish emigration, births, occupations and other matters by 10 a.m. the following morning."  
Hitler had not yet unleashed his reign of terror on the Jews. They were still five years away from "The Night of Broken Glass," Nov. 10, 1938, when in Berlin alone 191 synagogues were burned and 7,500 Jewish shops looted.  
Compare the amateur actor of 1933 with the finished performer

of 1941. As an SS major, Eichmann is now head of the Gestapo's department on Jewish affairs. The place: Riga, the capital of Nazi-occupied Lithuania. The time: summer, 1941.  
The liquidation of Lithuanian Jews is moving too slowly for Eichmann's liking. So he dons the black caftan or skull cap of the rabbi and tattered clothes with a yellow Star of David sewn to the sleeve. He seeks out Aniel Fried, the leader of the Jewish community, who is completely convinced by Eichmann's masquerade.  
And why not? Eichmann's features are Semitic. He speaks Yiddish with a soft, Viennese accent. Fried turns over to Eichmann lists of prominent Jews.  
It is the triumph of the apprentice Judas.  
The following day the men, women and children whose names appear on the lists are marched to the woods outside Riga and shot. Eichmann, this time in

his SS uniform, supervises the carnage.  
When the schnapps flows freely, Eichmann is to boast of his exploit to his SS cronies. Of the 150,000 Jews in Lithuania at the outbreak of the war, only 15,000 survived the Nazis.  
The element of betrayal is present in all of Eichmann's dealings with the Jews.

As a delicate, sickly child in Linz, Austria, Eichmann's best friend was the son of a Jewish chemist. From him, Eichmann learned to speak Yiddish.  
The final irony is that in the 1930s, when Eichmann was being sought by the police of half a dozen nations, he was to take refuge with Jews in Argentina—Jews whom he had allowed to

escape from Hungary for just this purpose: to hide him from justice.

## Community Rallies To Aid Of Couple

TEMPLE, Tex. (AP)—Critically injured in separate automobile accidents, Carl Tune, 46, and his wife, 44, for weeks have been unconscious in the same room of a Temple hospital.  
Two daughters of the popular couple hover nearby constantly, aware that their parents' physician, Dr. James Pettigrew, expects no immediate improvement in their condition.  
The girls, Janet, 18, and Kay, 20, have dropped out of college to be with their parents. Neither Tune nor his wife has shown improvement since they lapsed into unconsciousness. The community has rallied to their aid.  
Tune was injured last Dec. 8 when he was struck by an automobile as he walked to work. Mrs. Tune, a registered nurse at the hospital, cared for him in off hours. He suffered a head injury and multiple fractures.  
Mrs. Tune and Janet were en route to Denton, Tex., March 5 when the car Janet was driving overturned. Mrs. Tune suffered a critical head injury.  
Kay left her studies at North Texas State in Denton. Janet dropped out of Temple Junior College. Both wanted to be near their parents and they were needed to care for their brother, Carl, Jr., 13, who continued in school here.  
The Tunes are well known in central Texas for their work with young people and the ill. He was a member of the Temple Quarterback Club, affiliated at Golden Gloves bouts, and helped with the Little League program in the area. He worked at the American Desk Co. and was known as an avid sports fan.  
Mrs. Tune was graduated at the King's Daughters Hospital School of Nursing here and had been night supervisor of nurses at Scott and White Hospital for several years.  
The Communications Workers of America, a union with which the family had no connections, started a fund drive for the children, without income since their

parents were hospitalized.  
Local cafes began donating coffee sales to the family. Railroad employees joined in the drive. So did King's Daughters Hospital. (CWA President Truett Tomlinson)

After 10 days, there was \$1,600 for Kay, Janet and Carl Jr. "It's gratifying to see even strangers open their hearts," commented CWA President Truett Tomlinson.

## City Facing Budget Rise

PORTLAND (AP) — A City Council budget committee held the first of two hearings on salary matters Tuesday night and listened to requests for a \$60 monthly increase for Portland's 650 patrolmen.  
Representatives of other municipal employees' groups also asked that the city pay part of the cost of health and welfare programs.  
Lt. Frank K. Springer of the Portland Police Association said a \$60 boost would only bring patrolmen's pay up to the average received by police in similar Pacific Coast metropolitan areas.  
Earlier a three-step increase average of about \$75 monthly was asked by the Portland Firefighters Association.  
The two increases annually would cost more than \$1 million. Commissioner William Bowes said the city just would not have that much extra revenue.  
Union representatives asking city participation in the health-welfare programs suggested no specific plan. Some 70 per cent now are covered and pay the full cost.  
Mayor Terry Schunk said, "I would like to see the city make a contribution toward it."  
In his annual report the mayor proposed a \$5 monthly city contribution per employee.  
Another budget committee hearing on salaries is scheduled to night.
