Open Door For Atom Test Ban

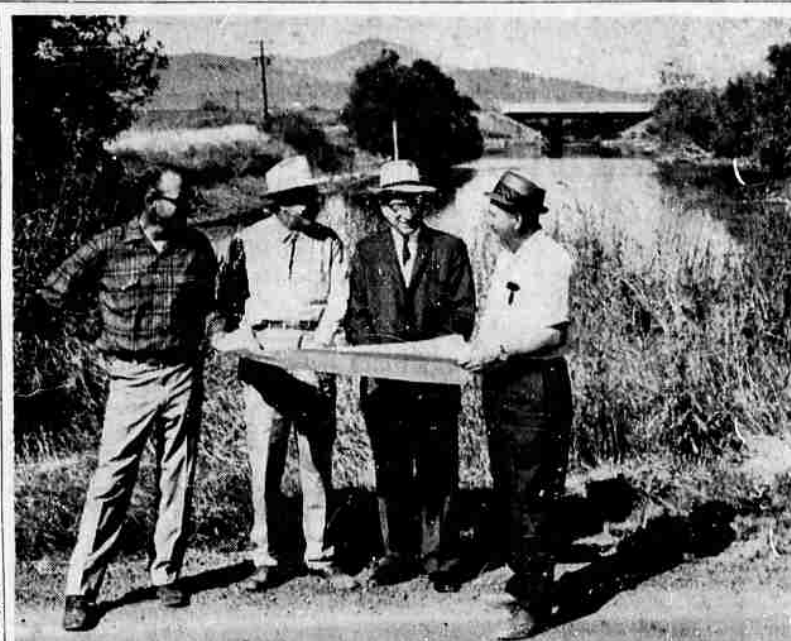

Fire Hoses, Dogs Subdue Labor Day Riots By Booze-Fueled Youths

Booze-fueled youthful hijinks erupted into violent disturbances in a half dozen states over the Labor Day weekend. Police arrested hundreds, aided in some cases by fire hoses and snarling dogs.

Ocean City, Md.: Lake George, N.Y.; Clermont, Ind.; Hampton Beach, N.H.; Wildwood, N.J.; Russell's Point, Ohio; and Falmouth and Hyannis, Mass., felt the brunt of the youthful violence.

At Hyannis, a few miles from where President Kennedy was weekendizing at his Cape Cod home, 149 young people were arrested for disorderliness or drunkenness. Another 32 were arrested at Falmouth.

At Hampton Beach, N.H., some 500 teenagers poured into streets where they disrupted traffic and jeered police who asked them to move on. More than 100 were hauled into police stations, and 70 were charged with drunkenness or possessing liquor — illegal for a minor.

At Russell's Point, in the Indian Lake resort area of Ohio, about 250 youths gathered early Monday but were quickly dispersed by officers who had been alerted to possible trouble.

The West Indies Day parade in Harlem turned into a riot when scores of spectators tried to join the 2,000 marchers. Pushing and shoving resulted, followed by bottle-throwing, fist-swinging and clubbings. A dozen rioters were taken in for questioning, and 11 were charged with felonious assault or disorderly conduct.
