

M'Field Claims Less Beef, More Quick

Marshfield High football coach Pete Susick has just begun his 16th year at the wheel of the Pirates grid machine and his 1960 5-5 record is one of the best in the log.

This season he plans to make up for it and from all indications he also plans to get his start in Klamath Falls some Friday night. Game time is 8 p.m.

Tickets to the Marshfield-KUHS opener will go on sale Thursday at noon at the Chamber of Commerce. Season tickets, \$6, will also be available there until noon Thursday. At

that time those left will be converted to individual game reserved seats.

Susick's 1961 crop of talent includes 21 returning players, though he claims "only six are outstanding football players." He says staff are busy working with a squad of 160 applicants and the competition for positions on his starting eleven is slightly heated.

Among the 160 on hand Susick notes a "number over 200" but claims his '61 Pirate starters will include a "lot less beef than squads of the past, but a lot more quick players."

The reference to "quick" did not indicate an overall crew of speedsters it was reported but it did indicate an ability for the fast get-off when it was needed.

Gary Crabaugh, a 140-pound senior, is one of the few starting lettermen the Pirates have in the backfield. The little halfback has a reputation as a "scooter," being one of the fastest on the club.

Standouts in the line are a pair of big ends, Mike Holland and Stan Traxler, both 6-3 and 185 pounds. The remainder of the line spots are still up for grabs at this time, but among the contenders are John Layton, a 210-

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The San Francisco Giants have lost 10 of their last 12 games, and seven members of the club have lost a little money for losing a little sleep early in the same period.

Manager Alvin Dark said Tuesday night he has fired seven players for returning to their hotel after curfew two weekends ago in St. Louis.

Dark can't say who they were, or how much he fined them. But he said a report that the fines totaled \$1,950 — and involved 13 players instead of 7 — was erroneous. "That figure (\$1,950) is much too high," he said.

The curfew was 1:30 that night, Dark said, "and the players were just a few minutes late getting back to the hotel. They hadn't been out on a party or anything. They were just late."

One source close to the club estimated the fines ranged from \$100 to \$200 per player.

Usually, players are required to be in their hotel rooms two hours after a game ends.

But when the Giants came to Los Angeles, and dropped their first two games here, Dark told his players to forget about the curfew for one night — Monday. He figured it might help pull them out of their slump.

But after the long evening out, they dropped their third straight to the Dodgers Tuesday night, 4-2.
