

Legislature Backs Kennedy On Most Items

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Here is the box score on President Kennedy's main legislative requests:

Action Pending
Foreign aid—A "satisfactory" compromise authorization bill enacted. A pared appropriation bill approved by House Appropriations Committee and up for House action.

Education—A last-ditch compromise school construction bill killed by the House. The House will pass a two-year \$900 million extension of two existing aid programs Wednesday.

Peace Corps—Approved by Senate; still awaiting clearance by the House Foreign Affairs Committee with no enacted possibility. It may not be enacted this year.

Postal rate—Senate Post Office Committee voted not to consider action this year. House

committee already had been dragging its feet, and Senate committee action closed out any prospect.

Tax revision—Formally put off after hearings. Until next year. Medical care for the aged—Formally put off, after hearings, until next year.

Enacted Into Law
Security—Liberalized benefits for one-fourth of those on rolls, higher taxes, optional retirement for men at age 62.

Housing—New subsidies and other tools to fight slums, and improve urban living conditions.

Minimum wage—Raised gradually from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour, with coverage extended to several million additional workers.

Unemployment—Temporary extension—Temporary extension in benefits with costs financed by higher taxes on employers.

Highways—Higher tax on trucks and tires to keep interstate roadbuilding on schedule.

Depressed areas—Federal loans and grants to help communities hit by depression.

Needy children—Grants to states to help children of jobless parents.

Latin American aid—\$500 million for loans and grants for economic and social improvement, plus \$100 million for Chilean disaster relief.

Tax extension—Extends for another year Korean War excise taxes and corporation tax rate.

Water pollution—More federal

money and power to clean up water supplies.

Defense—Two bills to give Kennedy added authority in Berlin crisis, one allowing call-up of reserves and extended enlistments and the other providing for extra procurement of planes and missiles, as well as major repair of an aircraft carrier.

Tourist allowance—Amounts of foreign goods brought by U.S. tourists duty-free cut from \$50 to \$100.

Farm—Emergency supports for farmers who cut 1961 feed grain production.

Congress Plans Heavy Pre-Adjournment Labor

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress now plans to tackle more work this session than it has in any full month of work done in little time.

Both branches of the legislature are expected to pass a scaled-down school aid bill, now that hope has been abandoned for a more comprehensive program advocated by President Kennedy. The scaled measure would continue federal help for public schools in areas where there has been a heavy influx of federal workers and would renew the student loan program.

The House vote on the school bill is set for Wednesday. The Senate's vote on Thursday.

OROVILLE (UPI)—Bruce McBritt, 40, who tried to hijack an airliner at Chico Airport to fly to Arkansas, today was sentenced to three consecutive prison terms for attempted murder.
