East Side Bypass Bid Date Set

Paving bids for the South Sixth Street-Shasta Way section of the East Side Bypass will be received on Sept. 13 by the State Highway Commission in Salem.

Four lanes of asphaltic concrete will be laid on a base that has been completed by the Klamath County Road Department. The section, six-tenths of a mile long, is the first step in the bypass which will eventually link Highway 97 with Highway 66.

The bypass will run from near the South Sixth Street-Homedale Road intersection around the east side of Klamath Falls to the Alameda - Esplanade-Kit Carson Way intersection.

Bids on a second Klamath County project will be received Sept. 13. This is to be a standard latrine building system and water supply at Collier Park.

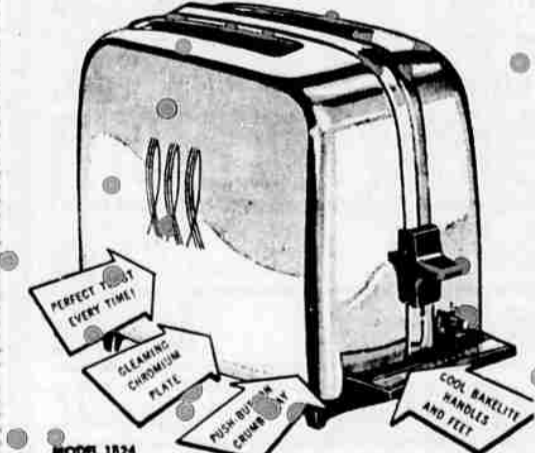

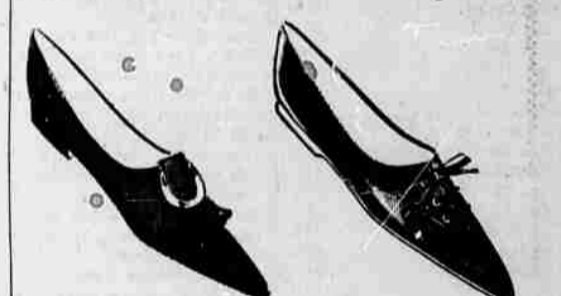
