

Non-Support Count Faced

Ysmael C. (Smiley) Herrera, 19-year-old Klamath Falls youth, is facing charges of assault and battery and failure to support minor children.

The sheriff's office looked for Herrera for more than a month before the youth was arrested Saturday night at his home at 636 Owens Street. The arrest was made by Sheriff Murray (Red) Britton and Deputy Del Summers. Summers said Herrera tried to get out the back door.

Herrera was first charged with assault and battery. He posted \$500 bail Tuesday afternoon and was rearrested on the failure to support count. He posted \$400 bail on the latter charge.

Both charges were filed by Herrera's wife. The assault trial will be Sept. 21 at 9:30 a.m. and the failure to support trial will follow on Sept. 22 at 10:30 a.m. both in district court.

Shakespearean Festival Closes Successful Season

With the final 18 nights sold out, the Oregon Shakespearean Festival closed its 21st and most successful season Sunday night, Sept. 3, in Ashland. Record audiences during the 42-night run brought the annual attendance figures to a grand total of 47,734—and a new box office record for the first of the North American Shakespearean Festivals.

Hog Calling Champ Named

SALEM (AP)—A Vancouver, Wash., grandmother, who practiced her ear-splitting call on children, won the third annual hog calling contest at the Oregon State Fair Tuesday.

Mrs. May Louise Rogers was the unanimous choice of the three women judges. There were eight other competitors—all males.

Her winning call began with a low-pitched "soo-ee, soo-ee," and then rose to a high pitched "Pig, pig."

The hog-calling contest was a feature of Tuesday's fair activities.

According to statistics from William Patton, general manager, the theater played to 99 per cent of capacity over the entire run, including the 2,387 standees that attended on the 29 standing-room-only performances. The 1961 totals are 4,738 ahead of the 1960 season, when the Oregon Festival played to 42,976—91.7 per cent of the theater's capacity. Once again a comedy proved most popular with the audiences. B. Gen Payne's production of "A Midsummer Night's Dream" attracted a total of 12,406 persons. Close in second place was Robert B. Loper's staging of "Hamlet," the title was Charles G. Taylor's "All's Well That Ends Well," with 10,881. Richard D. Russo's production of "Henry the Fourth Part One" was seen by 8,943. Edward Brubaker's "Caging of Ben Jonson's 'The Alchemist'" proved to be the most successful extra production in the festival's history, attracting 3,641 persons to its three performances.

Next year's audiences will see "As You Like It," "Henry the Fourth, Part Two," "Comedy of Errors," and "Coriolanus." The Oregon Shakespearean Festival will open its 22nd season on Saturday night, July 21. The 1962 run will be extended 44 nights, running consecutively through Sunday, Sept. 2.

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
