Hornet Fans Earn Awards From School

Henley High School Principal George Elliott will present 29 lifetime passes to Hornet backers to night in token of the school's gratitude for their efforts in helping to light the Hornet gridiron.

The presentations will be made during the halftime of the 1961 season opener, which pits the Hornet eleven against the Chiloquin Panthers. The game, which will start at 7:30 p.m., is the first to be played under the Hornet's brand new lights.

"Sam Piche gave up only three hits Thursday night in pitching the Vancouver Mounties into last place in the Pacific Coast League.

The Mounties traveled Seattle 1-0. The team were last by one run when the game began and were nine games behind the league champions, the Tacoma Giants.

Tacoma, in the meantime, advanced to 4-4 loss from San Diego. In the other games, Hawaii beat San Diego 14-8, and Portland defeated Spokane 7-4.

Red Raider Boss Enthusiastic Over Potential Of '61 Squad

The opening of the 1961 football season at Southern Oregon College brought 43 prospects out for the first practice Tuesday afternoon.

Included in the initial turnout were 19 returning lettermen, including four All-Conference choices from the 1960 season.

Tackles Jess Munyon, 205, and Tom Morris, 170, end Howard Hartman, 168, and linebacker John Buck, 180, all Oregon Collegiate Conference All-Stars last fall, headed the pack, one of the lightest in recent years.

The 1961 Raiders, however, boast experience at every position to make up for the lack of weight.

Coach Al Adams, starting his seventh season at the Red Raider grid helm, took a definitely optimistic viewpoint after the Wednesday afternoon workout.

"I feel," said Adams, "that this will be the best team I've ever coached here at Southern Oregon. We may not have as much weight as we would like, but the players showed up with a good attitude and were real enthusiastic."

"But, of course," he added, "we won't really know about some of the squad, particularly the newcomers, until the going gets rough."

The two-day practice schedule set up by the Raider coaching staff will continue through next week until the opening game at Chico against Chico State Sept. 16.

The lone senior on the team's SPC eleven is three-year letterman Tony Brauner, an All-Conference guard two years ago, who reported Tuesday at 180 pounds, some 20 pounds lighter than last fall.

A pair of heavy linemen who won letters two years ago and are returning as sophomores this fall are Larry Drake, 207, and Joe Tacchini, 236. Drake hails from Grants Pass and Tacchini from Henley.
