Pacifist Plans Trip

TOKYO (AP)—American pacifist Earle L. Reynolds, who sailed his yacht Phoenix on a protest voyage into the U.S. Pacific nuclear test area in 1958, said today he and his family will sail on a similar mission to the Soviet Union.

Reynolds, 50, who now teaches at Hiroshima Women's University, said he sent a telegram Wednesday to Soviet Premier Khrushchev informing him of his intention to sail into the Soviet port of Vladivostok, on the Sea of Japan.

Reynolds said in making the trip he will keep a promise made in 1958 to sail into a Soviet port if Soviet testing resumed.

Reynolds said it will take at least a month to ready the boat for the week's voyage.

Russian Atom Test Aims Eyed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The prevailing opinion within the Kennedy administration is that the Soviet nuclear tests are aimed at developing antissile missiles, informed members of Congress said today.

Congressional leaders who have participated in White House discussions predicted that the United States will fire an underground shot within two weeks. Kennedy announced Tuesday the United States had no other choice but to resume underground tests.

A resumption within two weeks would precede the Sept. 19 opening of the United Nations, where a great outcry against resumption of testing is anticipated.

The U.S. explosion is expected to have a double-barrel objective—the testing of a small battlefield warhead and the effectiveness of new detection equipment.

President Kennedy is reported to have told Capitol Hill leaders that up to this point the United States has very little technical information on the Soviet detonation. The fourth blast in the new Soviet test series was touched off Wednesday, the Atomic Energy Commission reported.

U.S. scientists have been able to register their size as relatively small and to report that at least one of the shots reached a height of about 200,000 feet in the atmosphere.

It was reported, however, that the President expects to have within five days through intelligence and scientific reports reasonably accurate information on what the Soviets are up to.

There is some thought that the Soviets may be trying out a new system of detonating their bombs. But the weight of opinion is that they are seeking a missile-killer.

In this connection, some members of Congress said it was significant that Kennedy has not committed himself against the later resumption of atmospheric tests. They said such shots would be necessary to determine the effectiveness of any antissile missile.

John A. McCone, former AEC chairman, said he had told Kennedy in a White House visit Wednesday he does not feel that atmospheric shots are necessary now.

This statement was described in some quarters as calculated to reassure jittery world neutrals—without pinning down the President himself—that the United States is not now planning on joining the Soviets in contaminating the air with radio-active fallout.

But the President's advisers have not overlooked the possibility that the Soviets could fire off a series of shots, get the scientific information they are after, and then announce to the world that they are willing to sign a test ban treaty.

Record Enroll At University

CORVALLIS (AP)—A record enrollment is expected this fall at Oregon State University.

More than 8,200 students are expected to attend the school with Dr. James H. Jensen as new president. It will be the first time the 8,000 mark has been exceeded.

Coast Oil Lease Given

SALEM (AP)—The state Forestry Board Wednesday granted Standard Oil Co. of California an exploration lease on 120 acres of land in the Gardiner area on the Oregon Coast.

The lands are owned by the Forestry Board. The board decided to continue its policy of charging 25 cents per acre per year for oil exploration leases.

Dewey Rand, Salem, a board member, said the figure should be higher, since the federal Bureau of Land Management charges 40 cents.

Bankers Trust Co. submitted the best bid on \$750,000 worth of forest rehabilitation bonds. It will charge 3.246 per cent interest.

The board turned down a recommendation by a 1961 legislative committee that it name a state forest tract near Salem after Sen. Robert F. White, (R-Salem), who died last May. The board decided to keep its present policy of making such memorials only to deceased board members and state foresters.

But the board suggested that Marion County name a park after White.

The board instructed the Forestry Department to make a survey of its lands for parks purposes.

Goat Cruelty Charged Man

A charge of inflicting cruelty upon an animal was filed in district court Wednesday against a 75-year-old Klamath Falls man, Ernest Smith, 2539 Kane Street. The complaint against Smith, signed by a neighbor woman, accused him of torturing and mutilating a billy goat in an apparent attempt to operate on the animal. Neighbors said the goat had been in extreme pain for almost a month. Smith posted \$100 bail and was given until Friday to enter a plea by District Judge Hal F. Coe.

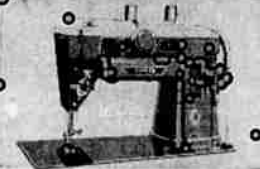

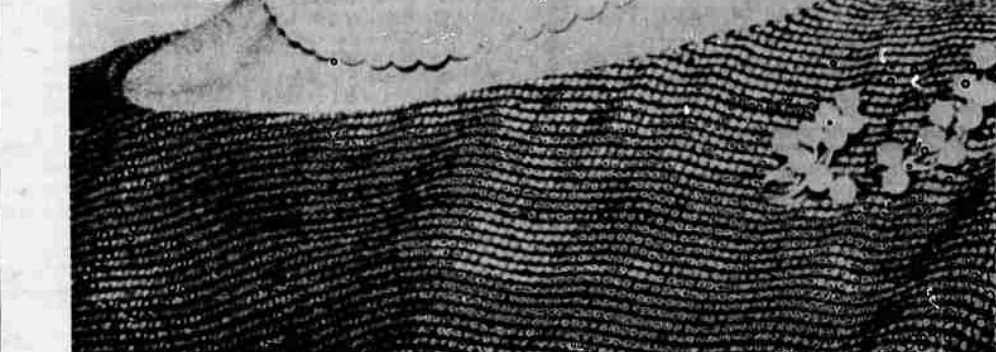
