SALEM (AP)—The U. S. Army Engineers will begin an inventory of potential fallout shelters in Oregon in October, the state Civil Defense Advisory Council was told today.

B. E. Wilcox, director of engineering in the Portland Regional Office of the Army Engineers, said they will make an "inventory of existing buildings, tunnels, whatever structures, might afford protection from fallout."

The survey, he said, will be made by private architectural engineering firms under contract to the Army Engineers.

"I'm sure the shelter capacity and availability of all structures in the area that could be used in the event of a nuclear attack."

He said the survey also will seek to find out what it would cost to improve buildings that fall short of shelter capability to make them into shelters.

Wilcox said the emphasis is on fallout shelters and not blast shelters so the survey will start outside the Portland area with the Portland area that is in Oregon to be surveyed.

Wilcox spoke after Phil D. Batson, regional director of the federal office of Civil Defense Mobilization, who cautioned Gov. Mark Hatfield to go slow on a state Civil Defense Agency changes.

Batson said that as a result of putting civil defense under the Defense Department, Congress granted a four-fold increase in funds to provide shelters in federal buildings which previously declined to approve.

However, Batson said, it is still not clear how civil defense will operate under the defense department. He said the move did cost him all of his 45-man staff.

Hatfield said that Oregon's Civil Defense Agency will continue as it is presently constituted as a civilian agency.

The governor said the state Civil Defense Agency will center its phase on shelters rather than evacuation. He said the agency will do all it can within the limits of its appropriation, which he said the legislature cut from what he had requested.

Hatfield also told A. M. Sheets, state civil defense director, to halt a survey of state buildings as potential fallout shelters after learning the federal survey will do this same thing.
