## State Continues Gorge Death Prosecution

MADRAS, Ore. (AP) — The prosecution was scheduled to continue its case today in the murder trial of 19-year-old Jeannette June Freeman.

Freeman, her mannish hair cut grown out and her tattooed arm covered by a long-sleeved blouse, showed no emotion Thursday as Dist. Atty. Warren Albright made his opening statement.

Albright accused the defendant of bludgeoning, strangling, and slaying 6-year-old Lawrence Jackson, then throwing him over a cliff into the 300-foot-deep Crooked River Gorge.

The bodies of Larry and his sister, Martha Jackson, 4, were found May 12 at the bottom of the canyon.

The children's mother, Mrs. Gertrude May Nunez, also known as Gertrude May Jackson, confessed last week to the slaying of the daughter. Miss Freeman has pleaded innocent.

Witnesses Thursday described the finding of the bodies in their shattered condition.

Three witnesses, a former stepfather of Miss Freeman and her two half brothers, said the bodies and Mrs. Nunez arrived in Culver early the morning of May 11 and left for California May 12.

Clyde Whitcraft, Culver, said he was Miss Freeman's stepfather from the time she was a little girl until her mother divorced him when she was 15.

He said the two women ate breakfast at his home about 5 a.m. May 11, then he and his sons, Thomas 15, and Ronnie 18, accompanied them on a fishing outing to the Crooked River.

Whitcraft said he helped Mrs. Nunez clean out the car, but didn't notice anything unusual except that she said children made such a mess in the car.

Walter H. Meyer, U.S. Forest Service employee at Bend, said he and a companion spotted the bodies on the afternoon of May 12 and called Redmond police.

In his opening argument, Albright said Miss Freeman had formed an unnatural relationship with Mrs. Nunez and the children hampered this relationship.

At dawn on the morning of May 11, Albright charged, the two women arrived at the deep canyon at Peter Skene Ogden State Park.

Miss Freeman told Mrs. Nunez to "get lost," Albright said, then hit the Jackson boy on the head, strangled him and threw him over the cliff.

The girl was thrown into the gorge by Mrs. Nunez, Albright said.

A motion by Capt. Perrine, defense attorney for Miss Freeman, that the defense be allowed to wait until the state concludes its case before making an opening statement, was denied by Circuit Judge Robert H. Foley.

### Court Hands Conviction Of Gibbons

The Oregon State Supreme Court Wednesday upheld Klamath County Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg in the case of Louis Gibbons, 29, Chiloquin, convicted last year of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The appeal, filed by Gibbons attorney, Glenn D. Ramirez, listed 11 possible grounds for reversal. In the opinion by Justice George Rossman, most of the grounds were dismissed as being "without merit."

Gibbons and Charles Hood Jr., 30, Chiloquin, had both been found guilty of assaulting Cyril Bierle with a stove poker. Both men were sentenced to three years in the Oregon State Penitentiary by Judge Vandenberg on March 15, 1960.

An earlier appeal on behalf of Hood was also denied by the supreme court.

Circuit Judge Charles H. Foster of Lake County also had a case affirmed this week by the supreme court. It was the case of Fremont Lumber Company versus Starr Petroleum Company in a suit involving title to 25,000 acres of land. The opinion was written by Justice Harold Warner.

### Surplus Milk Covered By New Marketing Rule

SALEM (AP) — New regulations governing possible market-wide milk marketing pools under the state Milk Stabilization Act were announced Thursday by the state Agriculture Department.

Kenneth Sawyer, milk stabilization administrator, said the regulations will permit setting minimum prices to producers for surplus milk as well as for milk and can milk.

Under present regulations that cover only distributor pools the floor price to dairymen can be set only for the grade A and B milk in bottle and can trade.

Surplus milk goes into manufacturing uses and is bought by distributors and manufacturers at a price \$2 to \$3 per hundred pounds below that paid for bottle and can milk.
