A hospital spokesman described the heart seizure as "mild."

Morgenthau, 70, who lives on a 700-acre farm in Wicoppe in southern Dutchess County, was head of the Treasury from January, 1934 to July, 1945.

Bogus Checks Finance Dance Band

CHICAGO UP) — A teen-age divorcee told police Friday night she used \$68,800 obtained from cashing bogus checks to finance a dance band and award college scholarships.

Mrs. Shelby June Neumann, 19, and Patricia Cavey, 18, were arrested Friday when a bank teller became suspicious of a \$32,000 check drawn against the Fleischmann-Distilling Corp.

Police said Mrs. Neumann took the checks when she left her summer job as a relief switchboard operator for the distilling firm. She filled out the checks and gave them to Miss Cavey to cash at the South Side Beverly Bank & Trust Co. Authorities said Mrs. Neumann admitted the theft.

Miss Cavey, who said Mrs. Neumann told her the checks belonged to her grandmother, succeeded in cashing checks for \$3,900, \$4,150, \$10,750, and two for \$25,000 each.

Asked to Return
When Miss Cavey attempted to cash the sixth check for \$32,000 Thursday, bank officials told her they did not have that much cash on hand. They asked her, to return Friday.

Bank officials checked with Frank Fiore, an executive of the Fleischmann firm, and learned the checks were bogus. When Miss Cavey appeared to claim the money Friday, she was arrested. Miss Cavey told detective William Kearney she got the checks from Mrs. Neumann, who was then arrested.

Mrs. Neumann said she gave \$1,000 of the money to Miss Cavey as a wedding present.

Mrs. Neumann said she handed over another \$1,000 as a gift to a friend named Don Davidson.

Money for Education
She said she gave \$20,000 to an other friend, a trumpet player named William Nielsen, to finance his musical education at a California college and another \$3,000 for a sports car for his trip West.

Mrs. Neumann said she provided \$10,000 to a man named George Gorman, who wanted to organize an eight-piece dance band and turned over another \$7,000 to Gorman for a Cadillac to transport the band.

Her final gift was \$1,000 to Miss Cavey's boy friend to assist him with his college education.

Miss Cavey said Mrs. Neumann told her the checks were drawn against the Fleischmann firm because it acted as administrator for a trust fund controlled by her grandmother. She said she was unaware the checks were forged.
