D. Hard Closer To Title

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — Darlene Hard of Minneapolis, Calif., moved within a step of her second straight women's title and edged off Queensland's Rod Laver and Roy Emerson, who won the 1958 all-Australian men's final in six years Saturday in the National Tennis Championships.

Miss Hard's sharp and game was too much for Margaret Smith, 19, the Australian champion, and the California pre-medical student won 6-4, 4-6, 6-3 to go into the last round against Laver and Emerson.

Miss Hard pulled a surprise in eliminating her Wimbledon teammate Angela Martin, 6-4, 6-2. Miss Hard was winging away at 4-1 in the first set when her steady backcourt game suddenly collapsed and she lost 11 of the next 13 games.

Laver and Emerson were a couple of marathon matches.

Laver, the Wimbledon champion, beat young Mike Sangster of Britain 13-11, 7-5, 6-4, rallying from a 2-5 deficit in each of the first two sets.

Emerson, Australian champion and No. 3 seed, took an exciting 6-3, 6-2, 3-6, 5-7, 9-7 triumph over unseeded Rafael Osuna of Mexico in a 2-hour, 18-minute match.

NAACP Asks Picket Line

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People wants Negroes on the Oakland Raiders football team to refuse to cross antisegregation picket lines tonight.

An NAACP official said the picket lines will be at the public school stadium, where the Raiders play the Houston Oilers in an American Football League game, to protest segregated seating.

Mrs. Hosea Evans, executive secretary of the Houston chapter of the NAACP, said she sent telegrams to four Raiders Friday night.

The telegrams asked them to "use your every influence" to bring pressure on the Oilers and get integrated seating at the pro football games, she said.

Duck AD Denies Charges

EUGENE (AP) — University of Oregon Athletic Director Leo Harris Saturday denied any lack of cooperation on the part of Oregon athletic officials in last fall's Michigan investigation of the attempted bribe of UO football player Mickey Bruce.

"At no time did any official of the university including me make any statement to the effect that we did not want the boy (Bruce) to testify," Harris said.

Harris said further that both the Michigan state police and the National Collegiate Athletic Association were immediately informed of all the facts of the attempted bribe, including player Bruce's name, at the time of the incident.

"If they wanted anybody to testify, they could have gotten him to," Harris declared.

The statements by the athletic director came in response to reports of testimony given before the Senate investigations committee Friday by L. Carl Robinson, head of the Michigan State Police Racelets Squad, and Walter Byers, NCAA director.

Harris also said he has requested a full transcript of the committee proceedings. After he reads the transcript, he said, he will write a letter to the Senate group making his own statement.

PULLMAN (AP) — Washington State University Coach Jim Sumrall Saturday called the Cougars' full-dress scrimmage Saturday one of the finest defensive shows in years.

But from the performance of quarterback Mel Melin from Olympia, Wash., it must have been quite an offensive show, too.

Melin completed 12 of 18 passes, three of them good for touchdowns and engineered another scoring drive to give the Cougars a 27-7 win over the Orange squad. Melin kicked the extra points, missing just one.

The Cougar's fine end, Hugh Campbell, Saratoga, Calif., got one for a score, Pete Schenck, Los Angeles, went 13 on another pass and Harvey West, Olympia, hauled down another Melin offering for a 42-yard scoring play.

Nov. 4 Day Of Decision In '61 Football Campaign

The season opens Saturday, Sept. 16, featuring Pittsburgh at Miami—a meeting of two powerful independents confronted by nightmare schedules.

Trojans Schedule Oregon

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The University of Southern California announced Saturday it will play Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State in seven football games between 1960 and 1968.

The announcement immediately triggered speculation about whether the old Pacific Coast Conference might make a comeback. But Trojan officials said the scheduling merely indicates they are again on friendly terms with these schools.

The Trojans' 1967 schedule will include games with every member of the old PCC except Idaho — which USC did not play even within the PCC.

Games were booked with Oregon State each year from 1965 to 1968. Oregon was booked for 1967 and 1968, and Washington State for 1967.

Though USC decried the small attendance these teams attracted when they used to play in Los Angeles, four of the seven games were booked for the Coliseum here.

USC has not played Oregon or Washington State since the PCC season of 1958. It continued to occasionally play Oregon State and met all three schools in other sports.

University President Dr. Norman Topping said only Friday that he believed reconstitution of the PCC was inevitable.

The Athletic Association of Western Universities (Big 5) made up of SC, UCLA, Stanford, Washington and California, has been unable to expand since it was founded amidst the wreckage of the PCC.

Stanford, Washington and USC have all indicated they favor a return to the eight-team conference. Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State remained independent after the PCC breakup.

Veteran QB Paces Titans

BOSTON (AP) — New York quarterback Al Dorow engineered three lightning drives, passing for two touchdowns and scoring the other, as the Titans defeated Boston 21-20 Saturday night in the American Football League inaugural.

Dorow's 43-yard scoring aerial to Don Maynard at the start of the fourth period brought the New Yorkers from behind. But the decision was not secure until Boston's Gino Cappelletti missed a 33-yard field goal try three minutes before the finish.

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Experts Compare College Elevens

By The ASSOCIATED PRESS Iowa's Hawkeyes, lightning fast, have been picked to succeed Minnesota as the 1961 national college football champion in The Associated Press annual pre-season poll of its board of regional experts.

But if the Hawkeyes should stumble, and this is entirely possible playing a tough Big Ten schedule, then the choice goes to Ohio State, whom the Hawks must meet during the season.

Iowa and Ohio State were in a class all by themselves in the voting, while Minnesota's Golden Gophers hardly drew a nod. The 1960 champions got only one vote for 4th, 5th and 10th places. Iowa and Minnesota both finished with 8-1 records last year, and were co-champions of the Big Ten. The Gophers went to the Rose Bowl after beating the Hawks during the season, and were whipped by Washington.

Coach Bear Bryant's Alabama team is considered to be third best, but only by the margin of two points over Texas' Southwest Conference Longhorns, with defensively tough Louisiana State another point behind Texas.

The points were figured on the basis of 10 for first, 9 for second, etc., on down to a single point for 10th place.

A member of five different American League squads, the 36-year-old slugger reflected Friday on his 15 years of major league experience.

"The toughest thing for a ball player is to take a 'riding' from the home fans. The customer expects us to play like machines, forgetting we're only human."

"There are two things in baseball. First, it's a game of inches. You can be a hero or a bum by the width of a fielder's glove."

"Second, a player is just as likely to have an aching jaw, stomach pains or have been up all night with the baby as a mailman or bank president. If we have a bad day the guy who paid for the seat is entitled to boo us — he purchased the privilege."

"But it's not easy to take when you pop up, strike out or hit into a double play. A player never minds the jeers on the road. But it can be agony in front of the home folks."
