

Paper Quiet On Atom Tests

NAHA, Okinawa (AP) — Kamejima Senaga, former Naha mayor and leader in leftist causes on this American-run island, says he does not know anything about a resumption of Soviet nuclear tests.

The reason? The Japanese Communist party newspaper Akahata hasn't reported them.

Charging in a speech Thursday that the press on Okinawa is controlled by the U.S. military, Senaga said he keeps up on world affairs by reading Akahata. Asked by a member of the audience what he thought of the resumed nuclear testing by the Soviet Union, Senaga replied: "What tests? I know of no atomic tests by the Soviets. The Akahata has not said a word about it."

Litter Cans For Litter

SALEM (AP)—The state Highway Commission is making some slight success in getting out of the garbage collection business.

Forrest Cooper, deputy state highway engineer, said today that fewer people are using the commission's litter cans for their domestic garbage.

The chief offenders, he said, are people who spend summers on the coast. They just haul their garbage to the nearest can.

The commission has put signs on the cans saying they are not for garbage. They are for litter that accumulates in automobiles, and their purpose is to encourage motorists to keep the highways clean.

There is no penalty for depositing household garbage.

In some places, so much garbage is deposited by the cans that it takes a large truck to haul it away.

The commission, Cooper said, has removed some of the cans where the problem is worst.

EDITOR DIES

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP)—Jacob E. Reizenstein, 92, who had been associated with newspaper work in Iowa City for more than 70 years, died Wednesday. He had been city editor of the Iowa City Republican and the Iowa City Daily Press, correspondent for The Associated Press and many newspaper and in recent years a contributing editor to the Iowa City Press Citizen.

Milk Price Act Warned "Temporary"

SALEM (AP)—The administrator of the state Milk Stabilization Act today told the state Board of Agriculture that Oregon dairymen are too concerned with immediate price and not enough concerned about serious basic problems facing their industry.

Kenneth Sawyer, the Agriculture Department official, warned that the act is a temporary measure that expires Jan. 1, 1963, and is only a stopgap measure.

Sawyer, reporting to the board on the law, said state milk producers face a serious threat unless they act to set up something permanent to continue after the act expires. A proposed solution mentioned in dairy circles has been a federal milk marketing order to set a floor on milk prices.

The board met independently for the report and other actions prior to a joint session with the Legislative Interim Agriculture Committee. The interim committee in an independent session reviewed its budget. It agreed to wind up its activities by Nov. 1, 1962.

Sawyer said many problems of dairymen probably won't be solved under the act which merely sets a minimum price that distributors must pay producers for milk used in the bottle and can trade.

He said the department will begin a new series of hearings in Western Oregon to see if higher prices in areas outside the Portland-Salem area should be brought more in line with the Portland-Salem area price.

He said what the department did under the law, other than in the Portland-Salem area, was freeze the price where it found it. He said most of the areas had not been affected by a \$1.12 per hundred pounds of milk price drop in the Portland-Salem area that resulted in passage of the Milk Stabilization Act.

He said if Western Oregon prices are not made more uniform it appears that the disparity and the present mobility of milk supply may lead to shipping of milk into different marketing areas.

This, he said, could lead to some very reputable, but small, dealers being forced out and their producers with them.

Dean F. E. Price, Oregon extension service, Oregon State University, said his department was studying the situation in Oregon and its neighboring states, but added there had been very little call from dairymen for information.

Sawyer also said he felt dairymen should be more concerned with the price of surplus milk, which is actually not surplus but milk that goes into manufacturing processes.

He said much of it is grade A and B milk that sells for a low price. He said if the price of the surplus were brought up it would help the dairymen.

He said that the dairymen get a blend price—the average of the higher bottle and can price and the lower surplus price. He said now in Oregon, bottle and can milk averages about 70 per cent of a dairymen's output and the rest is surplus.

At present the bottle and can price minimum is \$3.80 in the Portland-Salem milk marketing area and surplus prices run about \$3.00. Both prices are for a hundred pounds of milk.

Sawyer also announced that Portland-Salem area dairymen will vote Oct. 2-20 on a petition for a marketwide pool instead of present distributor pools. He also said that Curry County dairymen a recent referendum voted out milk price control, which he said probably was best because they are closely tied to the California market.
