

New Police School Set For Oregon

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon State Police, in cooperation with local law enforcement agencies, will run its first training school next month for rookie policemen in city and county police forces. Thirty-five policemen will be trained Oct. 8-21 at Camp Wilbycombe, the National Guard Camp near Oregon City.

State Police Supt. H. G. Mason said the men will be taught the fundamentals, such as laws of arrest, search and seizure, report writing, radio work, and traffic laws.

This is the first school of its kind. It is the first of its kind in the state. The League of Oregon Cities now runs a more advanced school. The Camp Wilbycombe school will emphasize the things a new officer needs to know, leaving the other school to handle the advanced training.

Instructors at the school will be members of city, state and federal police agencies. Mason long has tried to get the legislature to create a year-around police academy that would be available for police training. He hasn't succeeded. But the 1961 legislature did create a nine-member board to recommend minimum standards and training for the local police agencies.

Mason's deputy, Lee Bown, is executive director of this board. Bown thinks the board will take a long step toward influencing the local agencies to improve their police forces. "It will upgrade the local forces," Bown said, "giving them a target to shoot at."

18 Children Watch As Mom Marries Pop

CARMEL, Calif. (AP)—Their 18 children were watching from two reserved seats as a 43-year-old Navy warrant officer wed the 31-year-old widow of a Navy flier late Saturday in his old Carmel Mission.

After the ceremony, the 18 trooped back to a battleship-gray house where carpenters are busy adding three more bedrooms to the present five, increasing the bathrooms from three to five and the living space from 2,700 to 5,400 square feet.

Relatives will stay with the bride and groom on a honeymoon. "The children already have their trial runs together and they hit it off great; no blowups," said Beardsley, whose wife died last year after a sudden and brief illness.

Mrs. North of San Leandro, across the bay from San Francisco, was widowed by the crash of a jet bomber. The children, ranging from Beardsley's 18-month-old Joan to his 17-year-old Michael, have been together in the home ahead of the wedding, so the older ones could attend the Carmel Mission school. When Mrs. North heard through a friend about the tragedy in Beardsley's life, she sent him a copy of a prayer. Beardsley in turn sent her a copy of a prayer. Then they met and fell in love. "She looks," beamed Beardsley, "enough like my first wife to be her sister."

Mark Hits Pollution

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Mark Matthews Friday asked the state Sanitary Authority to get tough in preventing and eliminating air and water pollution. In a letter to Harold Wendel, chairman of the authority, the Governor said he hopes the authority will "deal appropriately, forcefully and speedily with those who thoughtlessly and continually exceed the limits of good neighborliness to the detriment of all our citizens, or who ignore their moral responsibilities and their legal obligations to the public."

He said the state must have both payrolls and playgrounds, and that the industrial, agricultural, domestic and recreational interests demand clean waters. He said the public is giving increased support to the anti-pollution campaign, but that the battle is far from won.

"Adequate supplies of usable water," he said, "are unobtainable in large areas of the state because of the high cost of water treatment facilities, blighted neighborhoods, impaired health, loss of industrial, tourist and real estate values, and a sacrifice of social, cultural and recreational opportunities."

The governor said the authority should do what it can to get voluntary compliance, but to get tough when that fails.

Power Interlic Plan Felt

OLYMPIA (AP) — The controversial proposal to sell Pacific Northwest electric power to California will be discussed Monday by Gov. Albert Rosellini and a special power interlic committee. Rosellini's press secretary announced the Seattle conference Friday.

The governor said last week he was against a power hookup with California unless adequate safeguards were taken for Washington's power resources.

Horse Breeders Announce Likely Ploidy Events

ALTURAS — Representatives of the Northern Counties Quarter Horse Breeders Association and the Likely Roping Club announced today a list of events to be held at their play day Sept. 16 and 17 at the Likely Rodeo Grounds.

The show is open to all interested horsemen. Quarter horses need not be registered, except in the halter class. Entry fee will be \$2 unless a member of NCQHA. One dollar plus 50 cents on cattle classes will be charged to club members. All children's classes are free.

Halter classes will be: 1961 colts, studs and fillies; 1960 colts, studs and fillies; 1959 studs, and older; 1958 mares and older; gelding any age. Members must send registration number of sire and dam to be eligible for halter class.

Horse show on Sept. 18 will include polo breaking, trail horse class, pleasure class over 17, pleasure class 17 and under, hackamore class for horses five years and under and reining horse class. Sunday's program will be cattle penning, cutting horse class, barrel racing 17 years and under and barrel racing 17 years and over.

5 Invaders Executed

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — Five members of the anti-Castro invasion force that landed in Cuba April 17 were executed Friday night for crimes committed during the Batista regime. Havana radio reported today.

The five fell before Fidel Castro's firing squads at 11 p.m. the broadcast said. They were among 14 of the invaders who were tried before a military tribunal in Santa Clara Friday. Their names were listed as Ramon Calvino Izama, Antonio Valentin Padra, Carlos, Emilio Solor, Jose Ping Yung, and Roberto Perez Cruzata.

Calvino, who has been a corporal in the investigations department of the Havana police during the dictatorship of Fulgencio Batista, had been accused of committing many murders and of torturing prisoners and other crimes.

The trial of the 14 lasted about eight hours.

Vote Discrimination Revealed In 8 States

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Rights Commission recommended today that Congress enact legislation to ensure the right of all qualified Americans to vote. It said six years of schooling should meet any state literacy requirement.

Evidence of balloting discrimination has been found in eight Southern states, the commission reported. The commission divided 4 to 2 on the recommendation that Congress pass laws to deal with discrimination against Negroes and other minority groups in voting.

This recommendation was in two parts. Citing the 14th and 15th Amendments to the Constitution as establishing a federal right in voting matters, the commission majority said Congress should: Declare that voter qualifications other than "age, residence, confinement and conviction of a crime are susceptible to use and have been used to deny the right to vote on grounds of race and color."

Enact legislation providing that all citizens shall have a right to vote in federal or state elections and that this right shall not be interfered with except for inability to meet reasonable age or length of residence requirements on grounds of conviction of a crime.

The right to vote, the commission added, should also include the right to register or otherwise qualify to vote and have the vote counted.

Log Truckers Reduced By New Oregon Ruling

SALEM (AP) — Log truckers are surprised to find that a new law will reduce their numbers. Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said Friday. Hill is holding 14 hearings over the state to explain the new law that requires the log truckers to get certificates to operate after next Jan. 1. Half of the hearings have been held.

Breakdown of the rate is set up as follows: two and a half cents for the Carpenter Truck fund, decreased from last year's seven cents; five cents for advertising, lessened from six cents; five cents for the library, decreased from eight cents; five and a half cents for 1960 water bonds, showing a decrease from 13 cents; 15 1/2 cents for water bonds of 1947, raised from nine cents; two and a half cents for 1948 sewer bonds.

Assessed valuation for the 1961 secured roll is \$4,891,415 and for the utility roll, \$1,034,580, giving a total assessed value figure of \$5,926,000. A five per cent delinquency factor of \$296,300 subtracted from the assessed value brings the figure down to \$5,629,700 net valuation to be used in setting the tax rate.

Also discussed during the session was the city's recreation program, and Councilman Friedman was requested to either infirmation for a study in the program's worth.

Construction of the building, to cost an estimated \$2,481,960, is expected to start next July. The advance is repayable at that time.
