Birch Group Has General As Member

WASHINGTON (AP) — Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker is listed in an official Army report as a member of the militantly conservative John Birch Society.

Walker, former commander of the 24th Infantry Division in West Germany, was officially reprimanded by the Army June 12 for attributing Communist leanings to former President Harry S. Truman, other top Democrats and elements of the U.S. press, television and radio.

The report, made public Thursday, describes Walker as "a sincere, deeply religious, patriotic soldier, dedicated to the nation and the Army."

It adds: "He is an eccentric and is not only violently anti-Communist but has been for years working at it with a passion, studying, lecturing, and reading all literature available on the subject."

The report was prepared by Lt. Gen. Frederic J. Brown, acting inspector general who investigated allegations against Walker. At the direction of Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, the report was turned over to the Senate Armed Services Committee. Brown said in the report that Walker joined the John Birch Society "due to a basic similarity in approach to anti-communism."

Man Killed In Argument

PORTLAND (AP) — One man was dead and another was booked on a murder charge as a result of what Portland police said was an argument over money.

Victim of the Thursday night shooting was Richard D. Scarbrough, about 27, Portland. Duane E. Flugstad, 27, also of Portland, was arrested after the shooting. Police said Edwin A. Flugstad, father of the arrested man, was a witness to the incident. Police quoted him as saying that the shooting climaxed an argument over money which Flugstad accused Scarbrough of taking.

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Air Force Misses Titan Target

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force has missed its summer target for getting the first potent Titan intercontinental missile in place.

But it expects to have the first nine Titans in firing position at Lowry Air Force Base in Colorado within the next few months.

In a test of the missile's inertial guidance system for a future more powerful model, the Air Force Thursday night successfully launched its second Titan in two nights from Cape Canaveral, Fla. Officials said the bullet-shaped projectile performed as planned, sending its nose cone racing at more than 15,000 miles an hour into a target area 5,000 miles down the Atlantic Tracking Range.

The launching followed Wednesday night's successful Titan flight over a 6,100-mile course.

The flights brought the total of successful Titan tests to 28 in 40 attempts. Eight of the others were

rated as partial successes. The Titan is the second U.S. intercontinental ballistic missile. Its U.S. ICBM. The Atlas has been estimated 380,000-pound thrust in combat-ready for some time.

Berlin Nights Spooky Along East, West Wall

BERLIN (AP) — It's eerie at night along the wall between East and West Berlin, even though the tanks and armored cars are out of sight now.

The searchlights have been removed from the main crossing point, the corner of Friedrichstrasse and Zimmerstrasse. But the light from a big green neon sign makes the scene even more sinister.

It has been a spooky part of town ever since World War II. Once the center of Berlin's newspaper district, it was badly bombed and not much rebuilt. Vacant lots alternate with shabby apartment houses, small shops, a bar or two. Ruins and bomb sites make ugly black shapes at night. You get some liveliness at the corner itself, at least on the West Berlin side. There are half a dozen American soldiers in battle dress, slightly bored but good humored and ready to chat.

"It used to be more fun when this thing first started," said a

private from the 3rd Battle Group, 6th Infantry. "One night we had quite a lot of chow here—chicken, it was. All they had was potato soup."

"They" meant the Communist East German police.

"They watched us through binoculars from the other side of Zimmerstrasse—about 40 feet away," the soldier added. "So we asked them over and gave them some."

The GI showed a happy-go-lucky attitude toward the whole situation. Whether he had actually shared his meal with the Communists or was just telling a tall story, he seemed a lot sorrier for the men on the other side than angry at them.

"Why," he said, "we've seen the same ones over there for 15 hours at a stretch."

The Americans have installed themselves fairly comfortably in a bombed out building a few yards from the border. It has a courtyard convenient for parking jeeps, and space for a few cots. Next door is an equally convenient bar, with a juke-box and a large supply of soft drinks.

Right after the Communists put up their wall, angry crowds gathered regularly on the West Berlin side. Now only a few curious West Berliners have been standing around these warm evenings. Some just stare, some chatter about the situation, some hoot at the Communist police—nothing too violent.

"It's pretty dull," said the soldier. "Sometimes we get an odd-ball, though. There was this tourist who got off at the East Berlin Airport and thought he was in West Berlin. He spent most of the day wandering around East Berlin looking for the Hilton Hotel. He ended up here, finally."

Carols Okay At Schools

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Dr. Frederick M. Raubinger, state education commissioner has said that local school boards can allow children to sing Christmas carols and Hanukkah songs or recite Old Testament psalms in classrooms.
