

State Makes Civil Rights Progress Says Advisory Group In Late Study

Oregon has been making substantial progress in safeguarding civil rights of its people although there are some areas of discrimination.

This was reported by the Oregon Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights in a study released Saturday.

The committee said there is no known discrimination on voting; that children attend schools in the district in which they live without regard to race or color; that housing on campuses of state institutions of higher learning is not discriminatory; that the state fair employment practices law is adequate and is enforced in an alert and sympathetic manner by the state Department of Labor.

Oriental and Indians are generally accepted for employment without discrimination because of their race, the report continued. It added that Negroes were finding a widening field of employment.

But in Portland, better rental properties are usually denied to Negroes, the report continued.

It said that elsewhere in the state there are relatively few Negroes. Eugene has only about 50 Negro families and Klamath Falls about 30. There seems less awareness in upstate areas of the law prohibiting discrimination in housing, and little change from two years ago, it added.

The report said that Salem has been traditionally hostile to Negroes and of some 12,000 civil service employees in the city, at the time of the survey, only four were Negroes.

The report concluded that although the Negro "is still a long way from equal access to adequate housing of his own choice... we can report progress... It will take time, however, to erase prejudices and make certain that these rights will be respected in practice."

Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher and former governor, was chairman of the Oregon committee.

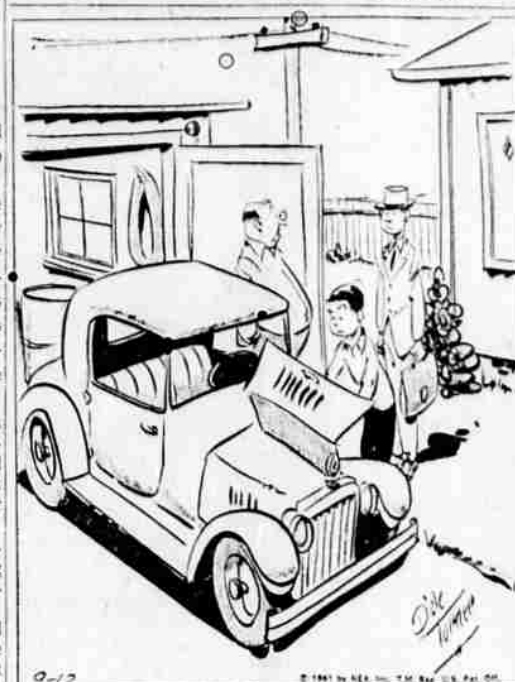

Red Cross Blood Drive Schedules Bloodmobile

Annual fall drive of the Klamath Basin Chapter, American Red Cross blood drive will be held Sept. 18-20, according to Mrs. W. B. Purvine, bloodmobile chairman.

Sponsoring groups for the quarterly collection will be the National Guard and the Knights of Columbus with the Catholic Daughters of America.

Official bloodmobiles for the general public will be held on Sept. 19 and 20, while National Guard and Reserve personnel will donate on Sept. 18.

Public donation hours on Sept. 19 at the National Guard Armory will be from 5 to 9 p.m. Sept. 20 the bloodmobile unit will move to the Sacred Heart Academy gym with hours from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 5 to 8 p.m.

Uniform Traffic Citation Proves Helpful In Raising Arrests, Fines

SALEM (AP) — The uniform traffic citation, now being used by all police agencies in Oregon, has resulted in a 20 per cent increase in the number of traffic arrests, State Police Supt. H. G. Maison said today in his annual report.

He said traffic fines have increased 52 per cent, with a corresponding decrease in acquittals. Maison said that if the number of auto accidents is to be reduced, "the motor vehicle driver must be convinced that he should be his own traffic officer and police his own driving habits at all times."

"The effects of driver education programs and the construction of safer highways are resulting in safer drivers, but only the knowledge that violation of the traffic laws will result in prompt apprehension and the sure assessment of a penalty will deter some from placing themselves and others in jeopardy."

He said that the state police arrested 91,682 drivers for traffic law violations in the year ended June 30.

A little-known activity of the state police is providing aid to stranded motorists. Such aid was given to 15,799 drivers during the year, mostly on freeways.
