

Berlin Commies Hit Paar's Use Of Army

BERLIN (AP)—The East German Communist regime today not to "play war games" for television at the border in Berlin.

The Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland today said "ears had been boxed" because a Jack Paar TV show had been filmed on the border at Friedrichstrasse last Thursday. The Berlin Communist information officer was removed and an East German colonel accompanied by 13 enlisted men to participate in the filming.

"What does an American television director do when he wants to film war scenes and there is no war taking place?" asked an official in the Communist paper.

BERLIN (AP)—Television critics in Berlin have offered to film a TV show on the East Berlin border.

Many sensors said they were alerted when they heard extra troops were on hand at the Communist border crossing point when Paar took films for his TV show.

Paar, in a cablegram Monday to Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said, "I will be available at your convenience to discuss with you and your colleagues anything you wish, if you feel it necessary after viewing the program."

Paar said reports of his activities in Berlin were "inaccurate and based on the distortions of one anonymous American reporter."

There was no immediate comment from Javits.

Nab Medford Jail Escapee

MEDFORD (AP)—Police at Canyon City Monday captured a man who recently locked two deputies in the Jackson County Jail at Medford and fled with a woman inmate and \$300.

Police said Anthony Vasconcellos, 20, and the female inmate, Mrs. Mary Teresa Garrison, 28, were taken into custody after their car was found abandoned in John Day.

Vasconcellos, who had served time on a bad check charge, returned three days after his release and pulled a gun on two night deputies. He forced them into a cell, released Mrs. Garrison, and took the money as he left.

The Jackson County sheriff's office said the pair stayed in a Medford motel for several days. The motel operator identified them through police photographs and described the automobile they were driving.

Deputy Joseph D. Walsh and Chief Criminal Deputy Paul Bettel were sent to Canyon City to return them to Medford.

Store Victim Of Bad Checks

City police learned over the weekend that a man had cashed five worthless checks totaling \$90 the previous weekend at Payless Drug Store, 808 Main Street.

Store manager Noel Flynn told police that the checks were cashed on Sept. 1 and 2. Four were for \$20 and the fifth for \$10. The bogus check passer gave his name and age as Steve E. Welty, 25. The checks were made out on the First National Bank of Oregon.

City police detectives suspect the same man of passing other worthless checks in Klamath Falls.

Woman Cited After Crash

A 31-year-old Klamath Falls woman was cited Saturday afternoon for failing to yield right-of-way and driving with an expired vehicle license after a collision at the corner of Shasta and Washburn ways.

Cited was Rosetta R. Nelson, 31, 5648 Avalon Street. The other driver was Mrs. Ruby R. Woldt, 47, 1709 Bissbee Street. City police said the Nelson car was making a sharp left turn onto Washburn Way. There was extensive front end damage to both cars.

City officers investigated a possible hit-run incident early Sunday morning. Henry Wong, Route 1, Box 574, said his car was struck while it was parked in front of 421 Main Street. Police later located the suspected hit-run car but could not find the driver, a Spokane man.

Holdup Man Loses Fiver

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—A gunman lost \$5 in a holdup attempt at a Portland service station.

Attendant Steven Stabler, 21, told police a man walked into the station Monday night, handed him a \$5 bill and asked for change. The visitor then pulled a revolver. Thinking quickly, Stabler shouted: "There's a police car! You're not getting anything from me!"

There was no police car but the rattled gunman fled empty-handed.

Wilderness Opposition Warned

SEATTLE (AP)—Asst. Interior Secy. John A. Carver Jr. told U.S. mining officials Tuesday their opposition to the Wilderness Bill and other recreation and conservation proposals could hurt the industry.

His statement was in a speech prepared for delivery at the convention of the American Mining Congress. He said opposition to a Wilderness Bill might give the industry more room for prospecting, but that additional space might be gained at the expense of ill-will which could damage the mining profession.

The mining organization had a resolution pending, and was expected to approve it, which condemns what it calls "the recent and unprecedented action of the U.S. Forest Service in requesting withdrawal of large acreages of land for the specified purpose of precluding the location of mining claims."

"We specifically oppose the so-called Wilderness Bill," the resolution stated.

"Our military strength and economic growth are dependent upon the full utilization and development of the productivity of our public lands through private enterprise."

"We believe that the public interest is best served by keeping the public domain open for the discovery and mining of minerals."

"No area of the public domain should be closed to mining nor should any area which is now so closed be enlarged, either by congressional or by departmental action, unless and until it is established by proper examination and appraisal by the U.S. Bureau of Mines and the U.S. Geological Survey."

Carver said in a prepared speech that the American people are demanding conservation measures like the Wilderness Bill, which would keep vast areas in a wild state for public use.

456 Pupils At Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN — Four hundred fifty six students had registered at the Chiloquin schools by Friday, the second highest total for the first week of school in any recent year. Only 1939, with a total of 475, was higher. This year showed seven more students than last year, and all were in the lower six grades, with 251 over last year's 244. Both last year and this, the upper six grades had a total of 205.

By grades, the enrollment was as follows: first, 40; second, 40; third, 47; fourth, 42; fifth, 46; sixth, 36; seventh, 57; eighth, 44; ninth, 48; 10th, 29, 11th, 13; and 12th, 23. Each year the seventh grade shows an increase over the previous year's sixth grade because students from Sprague River and Fort Klamath grade schools are brought by bus for the upper six grades, and this year the Crater Lake School is also taking only the lower six grades, with seventh graders coming to Chiloquin.

CHILOQUIN — C. A. Samples heads a staff of 13 teachers, one more than last year, for the upper six grades at Chiloquin this year. In addition to his duties as principal, he will teach senior math.
