

Klamath Council Girls Kick Off Member Drive

Klamath Council Camp Fire Girls kicked off its annual county-wide membership drive Monday with girls from the second through the eighth grade receiving notices at school.

The local drive is a part of the national "Have Fun—Join Camp Fire Girls" week Sept. 11-16, according to Mrs. Naomi French, executive director.

"Girls may join the Camp Fire Girls or Blue Birds throughout the school year," Mrs. French said. "But the early invitation is always given to give members full opportunity for the entire year's program."

More than 1,700 girls annually take part in the Klamath Council activities which are supported by the United Fund, the executive officer announced.

Focus this year will be on "Our World Next Door," with members coordinating their various activities to the international

theme. Incorporated will be the Pen Pal Program Gifts for People Overseas and the Needlework Guild.

In conjunction with the membership enrollment emphasis, Mrs. French also announced annual fall leadership training classes for leaders.

Blue Bird leaders will hold four-hour sessions at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday and Thursday at the Camp Fire office 325 Main. Additional 9:30 a.m. sessions are slated for Sept. 18, 20, 26 and 28, plus Oct. 2 and 4.

Burned Fence Worth Only \$18

LONDON (AP)—Britain's chancellor of the exchequer has sent a check for the equivalent of \$18 to a Philadelphia minister who billed him for a church fence burned by Redcoats nearly 184 years ago.

But the chancellor, Selwyn Lloyd, told the minister, the Rev. Joseph Koci Jr., the correct place for him to seek compensation was the U.S. government or the State of Pennsylvania.

The Rev. Mr. Koci, rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church in the City of Brotherly Love, lodged his claim with Lloyd last month for destruction of the fence, used as firewood by British troops.

He priced the fence at \$18, but said interests over all the years now amounts to \$756,000.
