

Minister Feels Debt Satisfied

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church says he can willingly forget "in the furtherance of Anglo-American unity"—the \$756,000 compound interest on a 35-year-old debt claimed against the British government.

With a personal check from British Chancellor of the Exchequer Selwyn Lloyd for 6 pounds, 8 shillings and a pence in hand—\$18—the Rev. Joseph Koci Jr. said Monday that he was satisfied in receiving payment for the original debt and considered the matter closed.

He said an entry to this effect will be made in the minutes of the vestry of the historic church.

The \$18, the Rev. Mr. Koci said, will be used to help cover the cost of repairing and repainting the classrooms in St. Peter's School for Boys on the church grounds.

About a month ago, the Philadelphia minister sent the British government a bill for \$18 plus \$756,000 interest for a church fence that went into the British campfires during the American Revolution.

The British government officially rejected the claim but Lloyd sent his personal check Monday.

Heritage Day Republican Picnic Crowd Hears Dellenback, Davis

Before capacity crowds the second Klamath County Heritage Day came to a successful close with the Republican picnic at Veterans Memorial Park on Sunday afternoon. Main speakers included State Representative John R. Dellenback of Medford and Republican State Chairman Robert G. Davis of Grants Pass.

"A revolution is underway in the Republican party of Oregon. The Democratic party made substantial progress during the early 1950s but it allowed complacency to enter into its spirit," stated Representative Dellenback during his address. "The Heritage of the Fifties and the Challenge of the Sixties."

A Republican revival began in the late '50s and this new decade will see a dedicated minority working in a spirited manner for the 1962 and 1964 elections, commented Dellenback. He stated that it was the good fortune of Klamath County to have Reps. George Filtrcraft and Carrol Howe working in Salem. Dellenback called on the young people of Oregon to dedicate themselves to better government and to enter politics as a vocation.

The guest speaker commented that competition was a healthy state for the Republican party and that with spirited campaigns in the next two elections the party would succeed in placing the Democratic party in the minority column. Dellenback announced that it would take only a little more effort from the Republicans of Oregon to take control of the Oregon State Legislature in 1962.

Dellenback, voted the most promising freshman legislator by the newspapermen of Oregon, called for the reelection of Gov. Mark O. Hatfield next year. Klamath County Treasurer Eva M. Cook introduced Dellenback.

Mrs. Collis Moore, Republican national committeewoman for Ore-

gon, urged that Klamath County Republicans begin work in their precincts to strengthen the party in the next elections.

Robert G. Davis, Republican state chairman, discussed plans for the 1962 election campaign. "Come over and be Republicans," conservative Democrats were urged, by Davis. State Chairman Davis said, "There has been no place in the Oregon Democratic party for a conservative under the regime of Democratic State Chairman Robert Straub and the coming election of a new party chairman will not change this."

Davis was introduced by Ben Adair, Klamath County Central Committee chairman.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg and County Clerk Charles F. DeLap were honored at the Heritage Day ceremonies and were presented with plaques by George Filtrcraft, state representative.

Master of ceremonies was Fred W. Heard of Klamath Falls. Heard was introduced by Charles G. Woodhouse as a potential candidate for public office after being

honored on the occasion of his 21st birthday.

Mrs. Helen Epley Hoffman was the author of the Heritage Day Proclamation, signed by Mayor Robert Veatch on Sept. 6. "The Madrigals" of Sacred Heart Academy furnished the entertainment at the picnic.

The Republican picnic followed a reception Saturday evening at the Community Lounge in honor of Judge Vandenberg and County Clerk DeLap. Miss Lynn Ferrell sang a series of songs pertaining to the great heritage of all Americans.

Educators Urged To Open Door To Rehabilitation

SALEM (AP)—Don't close the door to possible rehabilitation for persons who in the past have done wrong, Oregon's Boards of Education were urged today.

Dr. Arthur Flemming of the University of Oregon and Dr. Frank P. Ingram of Eastern Oregon College joined in pleas to the boards during their annual joint meeting.

The plea was against the back-drop of the Dean Be. case, although it was never mentioned specifically. Bay, a recent Eastern Oregon College graduate, was denied a teacher certificate because of a past criminal record.

Such judgments, Dr. O. Bennett said, should not be for all time. He appealed to the boards to allow for reformation.

"All employers—both public and private—have an obligation to look at rehabilitation," Dr. Flemming, a former secretary of Health, Education and Welfare in the Eisenhower cabinet, said.

Unless this is done, Dr. Flemming said, the vast sums spent on rehabilitation and the dedication

of many thousands of lives to the work of rehabilitation will have been in vain.

"Any rule that says to individuals that because of something that has happened in the past you are barred from forever taking a productive part in society is wrong," he said.

This followed a report by Joy Hills Gubser, assistant superintendent of public instruction, on teacher screening methods.

She said Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, had urged teacher col-

leges to more carefully screen applicants to prevent them from educating themselves as teachers, and then finding they cannot teach.

Miss Gubser said three, and possibly four, cases are pending before the Board of Education as a result of past criminal records of applicants.

Plans Evacuation

OSLO (AP)—Authorities plan to evacuate the population in large areas of northern Norway if Soviet nuclear explosions cause a dangerous increase in the radioactive fallout, a civil defense spokesman said today.

Sverre Servan, civil defense adjutant, said that 60 observation stations are operating in the north of Norway to warn the population if any of the Soviet test explosions create dangerous conditions.
