WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy has presented Congress with a \$41.6-million bill for the fire damage suffered by the aircraft carrier Constellation in the Brooklyn Navy Yard last December. The repair work has almost been completed and the huge carrier will be finished by Christmas, the Navy predicted. Fifty lives were lost in the blaze which broke out when a tank of jet fuel was spilled on the hangar deck and ignited by a welding torch.
