Teachers' Duties Set

YREKA—Paul Fisher, county superintendent of schools, has released the following outline of assigned professional staff duties including changes brought about by his appointment to the superintendent, the resignation of Dr. Kenneth Young, and the addition of new staff members.

Bob Dais, who has been in the county office for several years, has been made assistant county superintendent. New and old duties of Dais are: Teacher inservice training and orientation, building programs, tax elections and notices, school district reorganization, budget consultations, retirement consultation, county institute, liaison for professional organizations such as C.T.A., C.A.S.A., N.E.A., and others and general consultation in the schools as time permits.

Hartel Gray, administrative assistant, will be in charge of teacher placement service, teacher credentialing, building programs, bond elections, boundary line and annexation elections, trustee elections, Public Law 874 consultation, visitation of foreign students and supervision in elementary schools.

Jerry Edwards will be in charge of child welfare and attendance, the Siskiyou County Science Fairs, school exhibits at the county fair, monthly enrollments and ADA reports, annual audit contacts, civil defense, work permits, small school district associations and elementary consultant service.

Joseph Turbovsky will be in charge of the county wide testing program, screening and testing of mentally retarded and guidance services.

Yreka CAP Holds Meet

YREKA—An orientation meeting of Yreka Squadron No. 116, Civil Air Patrol, was held Tuesday night, Sept. 5, at the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office.

The meeting was conducted by Acting Commander Hal Chaney and Executive Officer Howard Cramer.

Cramer explained the many phases of CAP, outlining the duties performed for a good working program, and how, in addition to light airplane flying during search and rescue missions, the services of people to work as observers during flights, airplane mechanics, auto mechanics, radio operators and office staff were all required to form a unit into a functioning organization.

The CAP, it was further pointed out by the executive officer, is strictly a volunteer service, but it is also an auxiliary of the Air Force, and as such, is provided with surplus equipment including equipment, and office furnishings.

The squadron will hold meetings on Monday each week, until they are more firmly established.

Cowan Trial Nears Jury

The first degree murder trial of Ransom Cowan, 65-year-old Chiloquin man, moved slowly into its seventh day Wednesday with a slight chance of getting to the jury by the end of the day.

The defense, which is attempting to show that Cowan shot Bybee Butler, 56, Chiloquin, in self defense, concluded its case in chief Tuesday afternoon. Rebuttal testimony, final arguments and instructions by Judge David R. Vangberg remained before the jury of seven men and five women could begin deliberations.

Four character witnesses agreed Tuesday that Cowan's reputation in the community as a peaceable, law-abiding citizen was generally good. The witnesses were Walter Zimmerman, Chiloquin, Wood River District justice of the peace; Fred G. (Fritz) Markwardt, Chiloquin; Walter Albert, Wocus, and Deputy Sheriff Alvie O. Youngblood, Youngblood, one of the investigating officers, testified earlier for the state.

District Attorney Dale T. Crabtree cross-examined Cowan Tuesday morning. Cowan stuck to his story that he was in fear of his life when he shot Butler with a .22 caliber rifle on the night of May 26. He said Butler had threatened to kill him.

Crabtree attempted to get Cowan's record of drunkenness into the record but failed when Judge Vandenberg upheld an objection by Cowan's co-defense attorneys, J. C. O'Neill and R. F. McLaren. A motion by Crabtree to strike the testimony of Dr. Hugh Curran was also overruled by the judge.

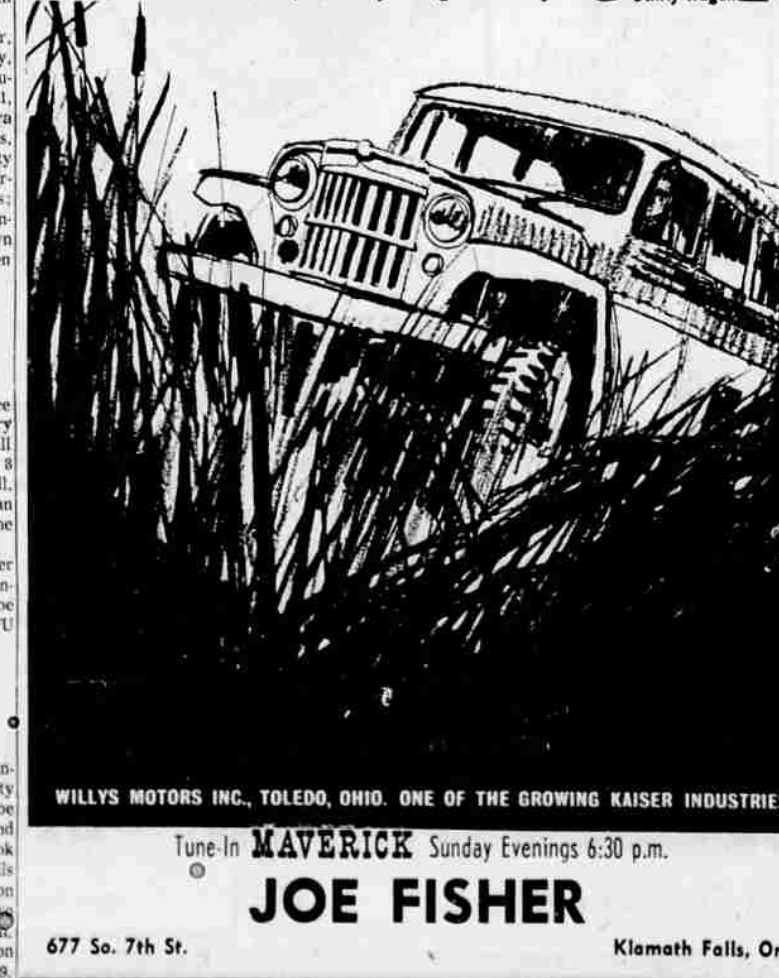
