Vet Rules Broadened

Veterans who were disabled or survivors of those who were killed in accidents on the way home from separation centers prior to 1957 were made eligible for certain benefits by recent action of Congress, it was announced today by R. J. Novotny, manager of Oregon VA Regional Office.

These benefits have always existed for veterans separated after Dec. 31, 1956, who were considered by law to be still in the military service until midnight of the day they were discharged, and in some cases even until they reached home.

Veterans separated before this date, however, had been considered to be civilians as they traveled homeward and thus an accident resulting in disability or death was not considered service-connected, Novotny said.

Through the new law, Congress has made veterans, disabled before 1957 in such travel, or dependents of veterans, killed in such travel, eligible for service-connected benefits.

These benefits are not automatic, Novotny pointed out, but must be sought through application. Contact representatives at the nearest VA office will explain the benefits and help eligible persons prepare their applications.

Goldwater Sees Fight

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., who feels former Vice President Richard M. Nixon might have a rough time being elected governor of California, moves back into Ohio tonight for another attack on the Kennedy administration.

Goldwater said it "would be a hell of a race" if Nixon decides to run for governor in his home state next year and is opposed by his fellow Republican, former Gov. Goodwin L. Knight, in the primary. The winner would meet Democrat Gov. Edmund G. Brown who apparently will seek reelection.

Goldwater stuck to his position that Nixon must win an elective office to have a major voice in party affairs, even if it means clashing with Knight. He said Knight's announcement to enter the race puts a "different shade" on things and he would not care to venture an opinion on the outcome.

Nixon has indicated he will announce soon whether he will run for governor.

Goldwater, a potential Republican presidential candidate in 1964, told newsmen Tuesday that his concern was for next year's congressional elections and 1964 "will take care of itself."

The question is whether the country can stand four years of the stupidity of the New Frontier," Goldwater said.

"I am not a betting man, but sometimes I am, and I will lay you even money that the Republicans capture the House next year," he said.

Oregon Employment Up 38,500 Jobs In Month

SALEM — Oregon employment jumped by 38,500 additional filled jobs from mid-July to mid-August, David H. Cameron, Commissioner of the State Department of Employment, announced today.

The increase was from 702,300 to 740,800. At the same time, unemployment dropped from 37,800 to 33,700.

Food harvesting and processing, which rose to its yearly peak in August, provided almost all the new jobs. Gains and losses of employees in other industries almost balanced. Despite the settlement of the dispute in heavy construction before mid-August, contract construction jobs were fewer than in mid-July. However, government, retail trade, and wood products each required large numbers of additional workers.

Compared to August last year, employment dipped by 3,300 workers while unemployment rose by 4,700. Industries making excellent year-to-year gains were government, agriculture, service, electrical machinery, and food processing. Declines were registered by contract construction, trade, and wood products.
