

Tule Potato Growers To Talk Regulations

TULELAKE — Local potato growers will be given an opportunity Thursday night, Sept. 14, to make their recommendations to the Marketing Agreement Committee. The notations would cover regulations which producers wish to see established for marketing of this year's potato crop. The meeting has been called for 8 p.m. (DST) in the Sportsman's Hotel.

Merrill Webb, committee chairman, will discuss regulations established by other marketing areas. Similar meetings are to be held in Klamath County and Central Oregon.

In announcing plans for the meeting, Tulelake Growers Association President Herbert Kirby and Cliff Jenkins, association manager, said the meeting of importance to all potato growers is also open to potato producers in the Dorris and Macdoel areas. The National Potato Council went on record at the August meeting favoring establishment of a potato diversion program for all market agreement areas. The council seeks a recommendation from local growers for diversion payments on this year's crop.

Potato harvest wage rates will also be discussed in addition to plans for establishment of a trailer labor office for the Tulelake Basin this year. Auburn Coe of the state department of labor placement will be here to meet with growers.

Plans call for labor placement service here during the harvest regardless of a decision on use of a trailer for an office. R. R. Groder of the Federal Market News Service will discuss the establishment of a potato market news office in the Klamath Basin this year.

Leonard Kinney will be present to announce the increase of Federal State Inspection Service fees and anticipated changes in the inspection service.

House Says No On Generator

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Wednesday refused to approve even a single electric generator at the Hanford, Wash., plant that produces plutonium for nuclear weapons.

The decision came on a roll call vote rejecting a Senate-House compromise which a ready excluded provisions for excess electricity to be distributed by the Bonneville Power Administration.

Wednesday's action by the House virtually shelved the administration-backed project for this session.

The vote of 251 to 155 sent the entire atomic energy authorization measure back to a conference with the Senate.

The latter body originally approved the full \$65 million request for two generators at Hanford.

The House had rejected the dual generator program three times with representatives from coal regions and public power opponents supporting a majority of Republican members.

Prince Tells Of Engagement

ATHENS (UPI) — Crown Prince Constantine today announced the engagement of his sister, Princess Sophie, to Don Juan Carlos of Bourbon, son of the pretender to the Spanish throne.

The crown prince, acting as regent in place of his vacationing father, King Paul, made the announcement.

Constantine said King Paul telephoned the news from Lausanne, Switzerland, where the Greek royal family — including Sophie — is vacationing along with the prospective bridegroom.

Ask Atom Ban

ROME (AP) — An international conference on human genetics, bringing together 700 experts from 31 countries, called Tuesday for a ban on the development and use of nuclear weapons. The conference being held at the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization building here, unanimously approved the resolution.
