Wall Street

NEW YORK (AP)—Stock market prices sagged again late this afternoon as a noontime attempt at a rally fizzled out. Trading was quiet.

Volume for the day was estimated at 2.7 million shares compared with 3.11 million Wednesday.

Losses were slight in most cases with only a few running out to a point or more.

Republic Steel maintained a loss of a major fraction after the firm cold-shouldered President Kennedy's request to hold down steel prices. U.S. Steel was down about a point, along with Jones & Laughlin.

Ford's early gain of a point or so was pared sharply and Philco widened its drop to more than 2 points as traders continued to assess Ford's plan to acquire Philco.

Chrysler was up nearly a point and General Motors about unchanged as only halting progress was made toward settlement of the GM strike.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks stood at 718.40, off 3.80, at 2 p.m.

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Dorris Council Hears Yreka Lawyer On Fees

DORRIS—The Dorris city council Monday night heard city attorney George Al Tebbe of Yreka explain what legal service he would render to the city in exchange for a \$75 per month retainer fee. The present fee is \$25 with most of his legal advice being paid piecemeal.

Tebbe told the council he would take care of all improvement bonds and defend the city in any suit brought in which the city is not covered by liability insurance and attend city council meetings when his presence would be requested by the board. Council members postponed the decision to a later date.

The council approved an eight inch water line extended 424 feet on Fourth Street to the south city limits.

Dorris citizens responded to a request made by city clerk Virginia Hamilton in letters asking that dangerous sidewalks be removed or repaired.

Heirs of the Dustin property have agreed to give a grant deed to property to the city of Dorris.

The council discussed with chief of police Al Uphan the proposed question of setting up a radio base station in the city for the police department. The board deferred making a decision until further study can be made.

City Attorney Tebbe was asked to check on the legal aspect of handling abandoned cars on private property.

Lemos Rites Held Friday

YREKA—Funeral services were held for Joseph Albert Lemos, 83, Hawkinsville, on Friday, Sept. 15, at 10 a.m. from St. Joseph's Catholic Church, followed with interment in the St. Joseph's Cemetery.

A rosary was recited at Girder's Funeral Chapel on Thursday evening.

Mr. Lemos, a lifetime resident of Siskiyou County, was killed Monday in an automobile accident one half mile north of Yreka on U.S. 99, according to the report of the California Highway Patrol.

It was believed by the CHP officers that Mr. Lemos may have suffered a heart attack as he drove north on Highway 99. Witnesses indicated that he attempted to control his car as he traveled 270 feet on the right hand shoulder of the road, knocked over a mail box, swerved back across the road, ran off on the left hand side and turned over in a ditch. The CHP officers said he was thrown from the car and pinned under it.

County Sheriff-Coroner A. B. Cottar said, however, that Lemos died from injuries received in the accident. He is the third fatality in Siskiyou County within a week and the 23rd this year.

Mr. Lemos was born in Hawkinsville, Dec. 18, 1877, and resided there all his life working as a farmer and miner.

His survivors include a son, Joseph Jr. of Hanford, Calif.; three daughters, Mrs. Madeline Markwick, Yreka, Mrs. Josephine Noya, Sacramento and Mrs. Wilhelmina Akers, Anchorage.

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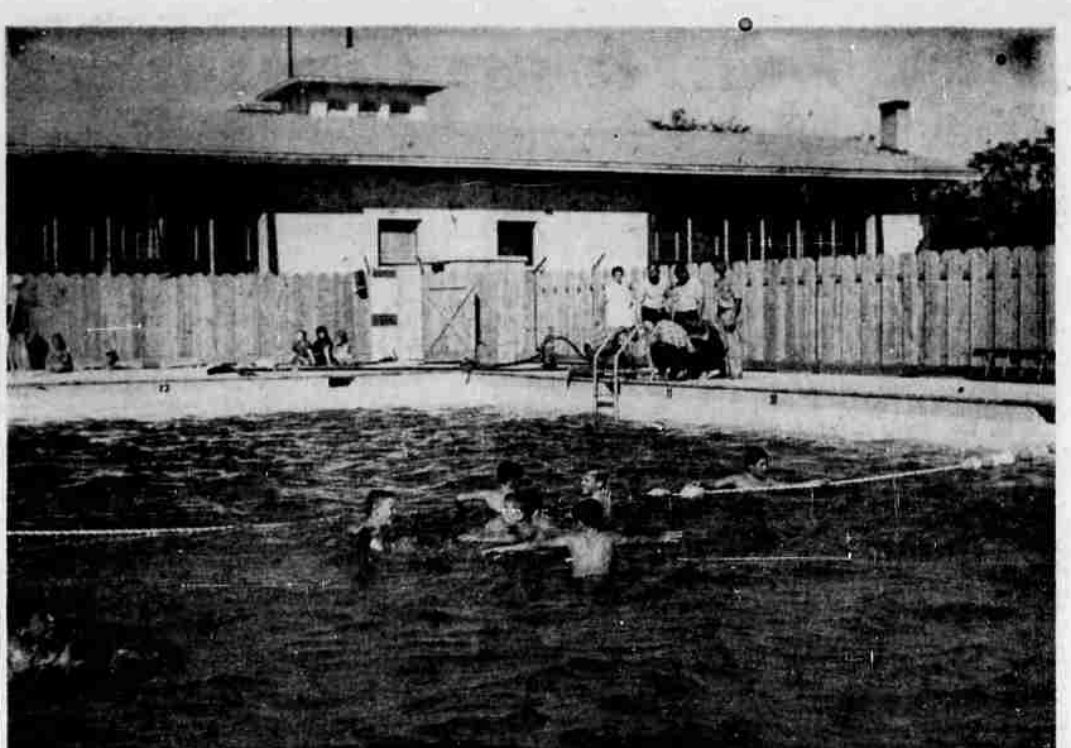

Weed Freeway To Be Completed In Six Years

WEED—Completion of a new U.S. Highway 99 freeway beginning at Spring Hill, six miles south, and ending at the new highway department sandhouse on U.S. 99 north, is expected within six years, H. S. Miles, engineer of the State Division of Highways, Redding, informed the Weed City Council at the regular monthly session last week.

Miles requested an open public meeting here in October to better inform local citizens and discuss the proposed new route shown on an aerial photo map to the council members and attending citizens.

Miles stated the present Highway 99 would be used for northbound traffic and the new freeway would be for southbound traffic with a Highway 99 interchange at a point one-half mile south of the south city limits routing all Highway 99 traffic through the city on the present Highway 99.

He stated tentative plans call for the new route to cut through Dom's Restaurant and continue on a direct angle over the hill and behind the south highway business district to the new highway department sandhouse, a disturbing very little improved property.

Mills said that prior to the meeting an enlarged aerial map of the proposed route will be posted at the Weed City Hall with an informant on hand to answer questions of interested townspeople and possible property owners involved.

The council:
1. Voted against prorating a business license, requested by the estate of a deceased applicant.

2. Granted a six-month extension to Safeway Corporation for a use permit necessitated by a delay in property acquisition and the original permit conditions calling for commencement of construction by September.

3. Granted use permit to Fielding Russ for construction of a new garage and storage for Upton's Mortuary, on recommendation of the City Planning Commission.

4. Accepted quick-claim deed from International Paper Company for land where city hall is located.

5. Passed ordinance making it permissible for the building inspector to be a voting member of the planning commission.

6. Planned to study the TV franchise regarding percentage to the city before taking action.

Heard the report of the city administrator William E. Hansen, resulting with the following action:

1. Council members received copies of a new ordinance drafted to cover the franchise with Pacific Power and Light Company for study.

2. Members approved appointment of Dr. V. J. Thompson as city health officer. Thompson will serve without pay and his appointment considered effective Sept. 5.

3. Ronnie Hansen was appointed as humane officer for Weed and Mount Shasta.

4. Council members to study and Harold Silvers, plumbing and registered quarter horses.

Another highlight of the afternoon will be the appearance of Barney Calmes of Klamath Falls, noted bullfighter and clown, who is being sponsored by the Montague Hotel and Fletcher's Place of Montague.

The Montague Lancerettes headed by their captain, Doris Wheeler, will be on hand to perform some of their intricate and beautiful drills.

Other events to be staged will include bareback and bronc riding, calf and team roping, saddle bronc riding, and a girls' barrel race.

In Saturday evening, Sept. 16, the evening preceding the rodeo, a dance will be held at the Montague auditorium, featuring Western Music by Al Tanner and his group of musicians. Proceeds from both the dance and rodeo will be earmarked for the Montague Swimming Pool fund.

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
