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We The Women

Sound Thought: Establish A Minimum Dating Age

Is the time ripe for parents all over the country to adopt a minimum dating age for their children?

Dr. David R. Mace, executive director of the American Association of Marriage Counselors, writing in a national magazine, says of the trend toward earlier and earlier dating:

"I believe we have no time to waste. We must reverse this trend. I submit that the way to do it is by establishing an age below which dating is outlawed by universal social custom."

"To me, the most logical and defensible age to start with is 15, the age at which most youngsters make the transition from junior to senior high school."

If parents are ready for such a plan it shouldn't be too hard to get a minimum dating age established. It could be done school by school, neighborhood by neighborhood, group by group.

Then individual parents could say to their own 12 and 13-year-olds: "You can start dating when you are 15—and not before." Without the usual come back "All the other kids in junior high school can have dates," the parents wouldn't get much of an argument.

Actually the majority of young teen-agers probably would just as soon not start dating so early. The reason they want to now is because "all the other kids do" and they don't want to be "different."

But if the commonly accepted age for starting to date is 15 the youngsters aren't under any social

pressure to get started ahead of time.

The problem is going to be in getting parents to agree—particularly mothers. For in every group there are some mothers who can't wait for their little darlings (especially their daughters) to get started on the business of "growing up."

They are the ones who think it is just too cute for 12-year-olds to have dates, to pair off, to be chauffeured by mama on afternoon movie dates—and so on.

Getting these mothers to agree to a minimum dating age may not be easy, but with enough pressure from sensible parents perhaps it could be done.

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
