Army's Thrift Store Extends Welfare Aid

"This is all a means to an end," said tall, husky Capt. Dale E. Johnson, surveying the piles of clothing and tables of assorted household goods at the Salvation Army Thrift Store.

The new commanding officer, who arrived in Klamath Falls with his attractive wife, Jennie, and their children in August, is literally up to his ears in revamping the Army's thrift store, located in the basement of the headquarters, 400 Klamath Avenue.

Backed by the board of directors, the couple is busy painting, building counters and setting up longer, more efficient and convenient schedules.

Starting Monday, Sept. 18 the store, filled with used clothing, appliances, dishes, furniture and various household accessories, will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., six days a week.

Actually, the thrift store functions as a background activity of many of the services of the "religious organization with a social aim," Capt. Johnson pointed out.

Probably the first function of the store is to act as a distribution point to meet needs of welfare and transient families in Klamath Falls. Thousands of items including clothing and furniture are annually distributed to families who cannot afford to buy them.

In many cases, including some in Klamath Falls, Salvation Army Thrift Stores are able to supply practically all the necessities to re-establish families that have been burned out.

Second, and equally important, are the large number of people who walk through the big red door at the back of the building to purchase the very same items at nominal costs.

Capt. Johnson speaks out strongly in favor of this program which allows low income families to obtain good, used articles at budget costs and still maintain and preserve their self dignity.

For instance, with winter approaching and school beginning, the Thrift Store is fortunate to have a large supply of heavy coats and children's winter clothing.

Particularly in families with several small children where the needs are great and the sizes are always changing, the store is invaluable, the officer believes.

At the same time persons are buying items, even at nominal costs, they are furthering the activities of the Salvation Army.

While supported by the Klamath County United Fund the Thrift Store has the potential of extending the Army's welfare funds which supports a list of services running the gamut from clothing to food and temporary lodging for transient men and families as well as destitute local families who do not qualify for other welfare aid.

"Don't be surprised at who you happen to meet in a Salvation Army Thrift Store though," remarked Capt. Johnson. "They're famous the country over for many other things than nominal cost clothing."

Traditionally, Thrift Store's attract drama groups searching for properties and costumes, persons going to Halloween and costume parties, antique fanciers and book collectors.

At the present time the Klamath Falls Store has only the help of a few senior citizens who make repairs but in larger and more established stores persons often find useable furniture and clothing restored to excellent shape.

Because of the limited help at this time Capt. Johnson would like items in good repair which can be used immediately. Otherwise they must be given away or sold as is.

However, he is not putting any tight stipulations on his operation which annually benefits from families leaving town, families moving into smaller homes, and the periodic whirlwind closet cleanings by housewives.

"These donations are the life blood of the entire program," Capt. Johnson stated. "To facilitate both the housewives who want to get rid of the items and to supply the store, intensified pick-up schedules are planned."

Salvation Army trucks will collect items from 9 a.m. to noon Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Donors may call the headquarters for pick-up service.

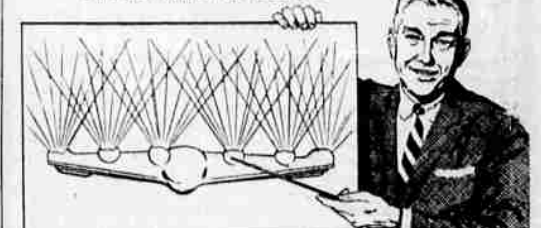
