will be used as outlined in the "Handbook for Flower Shows." Awards will include Tri - Color Award, Award of Merit, Sweepstakes, Junior Achievement and Invitational Landscape Division Awards.

General rules of the show are: 1. Advance entry blanks should be returned by Sept. 28 to Mrs. W. H. Morelock, Malin; 2. Entries will be received between 9 and 11 a.m. at the Malin Grade School the day of the show; 3. Only one entry permitted in each class except in subdivisions of a class when marked a, b, c, etc.; 4. All entries and exhibits must follow the classes as specified. The classification chairman shall determine the eligibility for any class and judges decision is final; 5. Flower show committee will be careful but not liable for containers and urges that all containers be labeled on the bottom; 6. No exhibit or any part may be removed until the show has closed at 8 p.m. Out-of-town exhibitors may mark containers and

pick them up within a week at the home of Mrs. Howard Henderson.

Artistic division consultant is Mrs. Robert Byrne. Each section in the arrangement division will have two classes. Those having won 5 or more blue ribbons will enter Class A, others Class B. Flowers in the arrangements need not be grown by the exhibitor and foliage and accessories will be permitted in any decorative class.

Section A themes are: Purple Waters, informal arrangement for the dining table using shades of purple; Apache, arrangement featuring roadside materials; Gold Dust, arrangement appropriate for a patio; White Sail, featuring water; Ladies Choice, whimsical arrangement featuring chrysanthemums as you wish; Pagoda, Oriental type; Adorable, small, under eight inches; Touchdown, corsage; Harvest Bronze, weathered or drift wood with flowers, and fruit or vegetables.

In the bloom cycle division: Three named flowers of the same variety at 3 successive stages of development. Use only flowers having a single blossom on stem. Own foliage attached if possible. Stems of 3 different lengths. Make in own container a pleasingly placed display of blooms at the various heights and angles, to be viewed from the front. Entries will be: 1. Chrysanthemum bloom cycle—use section G2, Class H, only; 2. any other bloom cycle.

Mrs. Loyal Loveness, consultant, horticulture division, advises, specimens must be grown by the exhibitor and labeled as to variety whenever possible, and be single specimen unless otherwise specified. Containers will be furnished.

Section A will include blooming houseplants, African violets, begonia, geranium, orchid, potted chrysanthemum plant, others. Section B, foliage plants: cacti, colias, fern, hosta, ivy, philodendron, succulents. Section C, berries, shrubs and tree branches; bitter-sweet, crab apple, mountain ash, pyracantha, viburnum. Section D, roses; floribunda, tea, climber, others. Section E, vegetables. Section F, annuals: alyssum, asters, calendula, cuarcia, daisies, marigold, petunia, stock, sunflower, zinnia. Section G, perennial and biannuals: carnations, chrysanthemums, crocus, daisies, gallardia, hardy asters, helianthus, hollyhock, others.

In the junior artistic division, consultant, Mrs. Edwin Peterson, accessories may or may not be used in all arrangements, and

flowers do not have to be grown by the exhibitor. Themes are: Football Bronze, boys aged 12 or over, arrangement featuring fall colors; Lipstick, girls 12 and over, arrangement in color red; Fire Engine, boys under 12 years, featuring fire truck; Raggedy Ann, girls under 12 years, to feature a doll; Parade, boys and girls under 12 years, arrangement suggesting a parade; Adventure, boys and girls 12 and over; Modern arrangement.

Junior horticulture exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor and feature one blossom of any flower. More than one color may be submitted. Flowers will include petunia, marigold, chrysanthemums, and others. House plants will be African violet, cactus, others.

Vegetables will make up the third section. Section C, educational, will feature bird houses built by junior exhibitors. Consultant of the invitational division is Mrs. Karl Kujac and

will feature two groups: "Landscape a garden" is open to the 10 garden clubs in the Klamath District 12; 2. "We greet you by the sea" open to the 13 Klamath District members who attended the state convention.

At the All-Western Regional Bridge Tournament held in San Francisco at the Sheraton-Palace Hotel, Aug. 3 through Sept. 4, Klamath Falls duplicate players again showed outstanding skill at the bridge tables.

The regional tournament was attended by over 4,000 contestants, six of whom were Klamath Falls players. Duplicate bridge tournaments are becoming one of the most popular sports of the nation. Out of the 48 events of the regional tournament Klamath Falls players placed seven times including three first places as follows:

Wednesday, Aug. 30, in the Twin Peaks Pairs, Mrs. George Myers and Mrs. David Richardson placed third.

Thursday, Aug. 31, in the Women's Pairs Championship, Mrs. Myers and Mrs. Richardson placed third.

Friday evening, Sept. 1, in the

Berkeley Pairs, Mrs. Lena Smith and Mrs. Leona Robertson carried with first place honors.

Sunday, Sept. 3, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Robertson won second place in the San Francisco Mayor's Cup two-session event in the evening session, and placed fourth overall in the two events.

Monday, Sept. 4, Mrs. Grace Kresse and Mrs. May Myers won first place award in the morning session, while Mr. and Mrs. David Richardson carried first place in the afternoon Colt Tower Pairs.

Considering the fact that nationally organized duplicate bridge has been played by Klamath Falls players for only two years, the amassed winning of the six players in the San Francisco Regional

was an outstanding accomplishment.

The next out-of-town tournament to be attended by Klamath Falls players will be the Grants Pass Sectional on Sept. 29, 30, and Oct. 1. Sixteen Klamath Falls players expect to attend the Hawaiian Holiday Bridge Tournament beginning Oct. 28.
