

OTI Owls Top Westminster In 12-6 'Squeaker'

Frosh Trio, Vet Pace Owl March

An 83-yard march that featured the work of a trio of untied freshman backs and the talents of veteran workhorse Stan Glass boosted the Oregon Tech Owls to a squeaky 12-6 win over the Westminster College Parsons on Modoc Field Saturday night.

The victory was tenth straight.

without a loss, counting their nine wins last season, and their 17th straight triumph on their home gridiron.

Starting on their own 15-yard line with 8:02 left in the ball game and the score hooked 6-all the Techmen ground their way into the Parsons end zone with just a minute and 19-second margin. And they went every inch of the way on the ground.

Quarterback Bill Ransom, who tried only three aerials all evening and failed to connect on any, sent Glass into the enemy middle as a decoy and swung around his right end for the winning touchdown from the five.

Freshman Lanny Myers, St. Helens; Harvey Graham, Grants Pass, and Jack McCreary were the freshmen stars in the big Owl offensive.

Myers, a halfback who totaled 63 yards in nine carries for the evening, launched the TD push with a 17-yard reverse and added runs of 10, 5 and 2 yards before it was over.

McCreary swept the ends for gains of 7 and 10 yards during the 14-play Owl scoring series and big Graham, who played with a broken hand, made two six-yard trips. Glass took it up the middle on the alternate plays and ended up with a total of 79 yards in 22 carries, to open his season's work.

The Techmen proved to themselves that "they have a lot of work to do," and that their scoring potential is contained in ground and sock football on the ground.

In the Westminster club the Owls found a stubborn adversary, one that had learned a lot in the past year since the Owls invaded Salt Lake and got away with an equally hard-fought 22-19 victory.

The Owls got on the scoreboard first, Glass bombing over right tackle from the nine-yard line with 4:06 left in the first period, but from there on the going kept getting rougher.

The Parsons steered by quarterback Wes Hill and paced by halfback Terry Hunter, their top ground gainer, evened the score in the third period when halfback Ron Hauser whistled into the end zone from the 12 with 7:02 left. The six points was the culmination of a 12-play series that started on the Parsons 27 and included four first downs, two of which came as the result of Owl penalties.

Overall, the Owls racked up 14 first downs to nine for the visitors and totaled 251 yards on the ground while limiting the Parsons to 63 on the turf and 59 in the air for a total of 122.

Although the bitter defensive struggle was played primarily in mid-field, the Parsons managed to penetrate deep into Owl territory twice but each time fumbled cost them their advantage and spoiled their threat. They reached the 18 on one thrust and the 19 on another.

Some fine defensive work by freshman Wayne Dennis, formerly of KU, who pulled down Jerry Adams after he had traveled 31 yards on a long pass from Hill, ruined another scoring chance for the Parsons.

Also coming in for a share of the defensive standout honors was guard Andy Cook who doubled as a safety man and played nearly the full 60 minutes.

Hill tried ten passes and completed four, connecting with Adams, halfback Ron Nay for two with 17 yards and with Lannie Peterson for 11.

After the game, Parsons coach Robert E. Lee, commented, "I'm a little bitter about a couple of calls, but my kids played a tremendous ballgame. We know Oregon Tech is strong but we should have beaten them. I believe we would have had we played them at home."

Rex Hunsaker, the Owl boss, noted, "We have plenty to do... and we have to come up with a more varied offense or we're going to be hurting. We can't pass. I'm proud of the whole club, especially those green freshmen."

COOS BAY (Special)—The Medford Black Tornado, Klamath Falls' arch rival in the Southern Oregon Conference, won its second straight game of the 1961 football season by edging Marshfield 13-7 on a 73-yard run with a recovered fumble.

Marshfield played the vaunted Tornado to a virtual standstill for three quarters. The Pirates marched to the Medford 27-yard line early in the fourth quarter but fumbled. An alert end, Gibb Mitchell, picked the loose ball up and raced 83 yards to score the winning touchdown. Both teams scored their first touchdowns in the first quarter.

Klamath Falls beat Marshfield last week 12-6 while Medford was bombing The Dalles 35-12. The Tornado, however, remained undefeated this week while the Pelicans lost a 13-12 heartbreaker to North Salem.

Hydros Racing For Cup

WASHINGTON (AP)—Seattle's Miss Century 21 and Detroit's Gale V sped to victory Saturday in the opening elimination heats of the President's Cup regatta in which only five of eight unlimited hydroplanes finished.

After Bill Cantrell piloted Gale V home first in one elimination run at an average 103.686 miles an hour, Bill Muncey gunned Miss Century 21 to first place in the next one at 108.194 average.

All eight drivers in the two elimination runs for the unlimited hydros escaped serious mishap as the big-boats returned to action after last week's fatal accident to driver Bob Hayward in Detroit.

But the crowd of 21,650 lining the banks of the choppy Potomac River for the start of the two-day regatta saw defending champion Chuck Thompson come another cropper in his sentimental favorite, Miss Detroit.

The engine trouble which has beset Miss Detroit throughout the season struck again in the opening lap of the second elimination run. Also forced out by a breakdown near the same point was another Detroit entry, Gale VII, piloted by Bob Schroeder.

Miss Detroit and Gale VII both were later found to have defective superchargers.

This reduced the five-lap, 15-mile run to a two-boat affair. Miss U.S. I, piloted by Don Wilson of Detroit, limped home second, more than 1 1/2 miles behind Miss Century 21, the leader in the season's point standings.
