



Ducks, Beavers Set For Season

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—Dynamic little Cleveland Jones is gone but Mel Renfro is here and Oregon football fans are looking forward to another successful season under coach Len Casanova. Jones, a 5-4 halfback, captured the fancy of the football world last season with his running and pass catching for Oregon's Liberty Bowl team.

But Renfro, according to all advance notices, is the hottest thing to hit the Webfoot campus since Miller Dyerl Burleson.

He is a 188-pound sophomore who does everything well, runs the 100 yard dash in 9.6 and figures as the left halfback. He is such a fine athlete that he's being counted on as a decaathlon threat in the 1964 Olympics. He also has done 13.9 in college high hurdles, broad jumped 24 feet and cleared 13 feet 6 inches in the pole vault.

Says backfield coach Max Coley, "Mel is a wonderful runner, fine passer, excellent receiver, blocks with authority and has good defensive potential."

Oregon also boasts a potential All-American tackle. He's Steve Barnett, who weighs 252 pounds but is the fastest interior lineman on the team.

Casanova, starting his 11th season at Oregon, rates him real high. "We feel he will be one of the better tackles in the nation this year," the conservative Casanova says.

Barnett is only one of a good number of veteran linemen returning. Oregon should have another tough defensive squad.

LAKEVIEW (Special)—Lakeview keglers walked off with firsts in all but one classification in the recently concluded second annual Mike High Bowlers Roundup on the Lakeview alleys.

Verna Scott, Klamath Falls, scored an 1182 to win the Heifers' singles classification, and thus became the lone out-of-town winner.

Neil Bonner, Lakeview, rolled a 2580 total for 12 games to pull down the top prize in the Steers' singles and teamed with his mother, Frances Bonner, to collect a first in mixed doubles competition. They rolled a collective 4775.

Joe Bannister and Will Duval, both of Lakeview, won the Steers' doubles with a 4822.

In the Heifers' doubles the first prize was won by Sue Fairchild and Dee Ackerman who teamed for a 2362 pin total over six games.

In the Steers' single action Al Getty, Tod Shelton and Duval finished two, three and four behind Bonner with scores of 2572, 2555 and 2554, respectively.

The high scratch game, 237, was turned in by Frank Beard of KF who finished with a series of 2334.

Bonner and Ed Arsenault were second in the doubles with 4983 to beat Shelton and Dave Cory, third with 4837, and Al Rossi and Wayne Misco, Klamath Falls, who were fourth with 4831. Bud Scott, also from Klamath, had the high scratch game and teamed with Beard had a high scratch doubles score of 4833.

Lynne Howard and Shelton were second in the mixed action with 4733 while Ackerman and Cory were next with 4678.

Shelton had both high scratch game and series for the men, a 246 and 2358. Edith Merrill was high for the women with a 224 while Vita Carson, KF, had high scratch series, 2226.

In winning the Heifer singles event Mrs. Scott had a high of 243. High series went to Helen Owens, Medford, who was second in the event with an 1151. Her scratch score was 1142.

The tournament was the second in the series which is planned as an annual event on the Lakeview hardwood.

Toss Away Exhibitions For NFL

You can toss away all the exhibition results in the National Football League. They won't mean a thing starting Sunday.

The circuit's 14 teams all swing into regular season competition with the world champion Philadelphia Eagles ready to open defense of their title against the Cleveland Browns in Philadelphia.

Changes have been made since the Eagles tripped the Green Bay Packers 17-13 for the 1960 title. Minnesota's Vikings have been added to the league's makeup and are a member of the Western Conference. The Dallas Cowboys have moved from the Western to join the Eastern Conference.

Everything considered, it appears the Eagles may be the team to beat in the Eastern and Green Bay once more will be the class of the Western Division although Baltimore and Detroit could give the Packers a rough time.

The Packers open against the Detroit Lions at Milwaukee. Baltimore is host to the Los Angeles Rams. Minnesota makes its league debut at home against the Chicago Bears.

Other openers find Pittsburgh at Dallas, St. Louis at New York and Washington at San Francisco.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Sophomore Paul Martha splashed 60 yards through a tropical rainstorm when Pittsburgh's cause seemed hopeless and the Panthers beat favored Miami 10-7 Saturday in the season's first major football game.

The winning play, which broke up a game previously dominated by Miami, actually covered 80 yards. Halfback Fred Cox started it and after racing 20 yards around his left end, lateraled to Martha at the Pitt 30.

When the shocker came, most of the 33,292 spectators saw it from the shelter of the upper deck overhang, where they had retreated when a black squall rolled over the stadium early in the third quarter with driving rain and streaked lightning.

Shortly after the deluge, Cox drilled a 38-yard field goal through the uprights for Pittsburgh's first three points, after the Hurricanes had taken a 7-0 lead in the opening half.

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Henley, Chiloquin Victorious

Panthers Whack Mustangs, 19-0

The speedy Chiloquin Panthers reaffirmed an early supposition that they would be the number one threat in the County B football race when they whacked the Malin Mustangs 19-0 under the new lights on the Henley Hornet field Friday night.

The victory was the first for coach Gordie Kuist's Panther 11; they tied Henley 7-7 in their first 1961 action. The Mustangs, on the other hand, now stand 1-1, having dropped the Klamath Union Jayvees 27-14 last weekend.

In the Friday night tiff the Panthers appeared to be off to the races in the first few minutes but the Malin defense stiffened and limited the winners to a lone six points in the first quarter, seven in the third and six more in the fourth frame.

After scampering 49 yards on the first play of the game Chiloquin's Al DeBortoli whipped into the end zone on a 35-yard TD romp with 5:45 left in the first quarter. His earlier gain was wiped out when the Panthers bogged down on the Mustang one.

The Panthers got their second TD in the third when Al Eggman scooped up a Malin fumble and sped 40 yards with 5:20 left in the period. DeBortoli plunged over for the extra point to make it 12-0.

With 2:45 left in the game halfback Benny Nygren bombed in from the Malin two for the final points of the game.

The big yardage gainers for Chiloquin were DeBortoli with 133 yards in 18 carries and Nygren with a net of 50, also in 18 trips.

The Mustangs, led by halfbacks Larry Rick and Nick Johnson, got an aerial attack mounted in the closing minutes but failed to dent the Panther goal line.

Rick heaved 19 passes and completed 10 during the test in addition to packing the ball 12 times for a net gain of 37 yards. His passes, four good to Johnson for 34 yards, four to end Dick Clark for 49, and two to Ernie Hunt for 16, totaled 99 yards.

Johnson carried the mail 11 times for a total of 23 yards. The winners tried seven aerials and completed three for a total of 20 yards. Nygren hit Eggman and Al Wilder in his three attempts while DeBortoli reached Eggman for one in four.

The Mustangs registered 10 first downs to eight for the victors.

Punt, Pass, Kick Registration Open

Registration began last week for the nationwide Punt, Pass and Kick competition, in which Klamath Falls area grade school boys aged 8 through 10 can compete in a test of football skills for prizes ranging from football equipment to a trip to the National Football League Championship game and a visit to the White House.

Eligible boys may register without cost at Baisiger Motor Co. at Esplanade and Main. Each must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

In order to help contestants train for the KF punting, passing and place-kicking competition, to be held early in October, each entrant will receive an instruction booklet containing tips by National Football League record-holders Johnny Unitas, Yale Lary and Paul Hornung.

Pete Rozelle, commissioner of The National Football League, which is cooperating with the Ford Division of the Ford Motor Company in this national competition, points out that the program will enable all boys to participate in athletic competition.

"Boys who have been unable to 'make the team' have been deprived of the benefits offered by participation in the sport of football," Rozelle says. "But this program will make it possible for all boys to participate."

In the "P. P. & K." competition, boys will be judged on the distance and accuracy of their punts, passes and place-kicks. The five top winners in the Klamath competition — one for each age group — will receive football uniforms.

The scores of the top five boys in the local contest will be compared with the top scores from all the other contests held in the region covered by the telecasts of the San Francisco 49ers' home football games. The top competitors, one in each age group, from this region will appear on television during a November home game of the Forty-Niners to test their football skills against winners of other regions.

All scores then will be compared to determine the five national champions.

Later opening dates for commercial crab fishing operations in both the northern and southern areas of the state were announced today by the Oregon Fish Commission. Harry Smith, commission auditor, said that Area 1 (offshore waters from Cascade Head to the Columbia) would now be open from Jan. 1 through Sept. 15. The former open period ran from Dec. 15 through Sept. 15. The new dates coincide with Washington's commercial crab fishing season in the adjoining area to the north.

Formerly the Columbia River Estuary was open all year, but following the recent regulation change, the season in this section will conform with that prescribed for Area 1, that is, from Jan. 1 through Sept. 15. Smith said.

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SHA Stuns Pel JV's; Boss Happy

"This is a victory we needed before starting our league," so stated happy coach Marv DelPlanche, following the Sacred Heart Trojans' stunning 34-7 victory over Klamath Union's JVs Friday night at Gem Stadium.

DelPlanche now feels his spirited squad is ready for the league opener with Merrill this Friday.

There was no doubt in anyone's mind following Friday's contest that the Trojans were more than ready to romp. It marked the first time in 23 years that the city rivals of KU had taken the JVs.

The entire squad deserves credit for the outcome, according to coach DelPlanche, but special mention must go to two rugged boys who played tremendous ball on both offense and defense. The two are Mike Holland, who romped for one touchdown, two extra points, and set up another TD on a beautifully executed option play, and Doug Murray, who scored one six-pointer and was easily the star of a determined Trojan defense.

Trojans Dominate

Sacred Heart completely dominated the game from the opening moments. They had a tremendous advantage not only in the score but also with the statistics. The Trojans' first touchdown came in the first period when Jerry DeNault took a KU punt on his 40 and raced down the sidelines into pay dirt. Holland's conversion made it 7-0. In the second period Holland went 13 for another score. His conversion gave the Trojans a 14-0 half-time lead.

In the third period, the academy crew, eager for the victory that it knew was now within easy grasp, scored twice more. DeNault's 22-yard scamper off of a pitch-out option play from Holland made it 20-0.

Surprise!

The next TD was the highlight of the night. The KU JVs had the ball on the Sacred Heart 45. On a play up the middle, a KU back got to the 40, but then the fans were surprised to see red shirts appear from the pile-up headed for JV land with the ball. It took a few seconds before the crowd realized that Keith Murray had stolen the ball from the grasp of a KU player and raced 60 yards for another score. Shan Britton scored the conversion.

The Junior Pels scored their only TD in the opening moments of the fourth period on a 25-yard pass play from Rick Horn to Tom Day. Vern Petrick made good on his conversion attempt.

The Trojans bounced back quickly though on the next series with DeNault going 70 yards down the middle for the academy's fifth TD. Bob Neely scored the conversion to make the final score 34-7 for the Trojans.

Hornets Wreck Merrill Opener

MERRILL (Special)—The Henley Hornets had their troubles for the first half of the ball game but came out in the third quarter "to play some football" and chalked up a convincing 20-0 win over the Merrill Huskies here Friday night. The victory was the first for coach Len Weber's Hornets.

The Hornets scored in the first period when halfback Steve Reiling notched the first of his two touchdowns on a four yard run. The conversion attempt was missed and the Hornets bogged down for the remainder of the half.

They broke things wide open in the third quarter when halfback Dave Trapp, taking advantage of some fine downfield blocking, made about four trips cross-wise of the gridiron while covering 42 yards for the second score. Reiling ran in with the conversion to make it 13-0 for Henley.

The Huskies staged their big threat then. Early in the fourth frame they moved to the Henley three but fizzled when a "side-saddle" pass from center zoomed past tailback Ken Smith and the Hornets quick-kicked out of danger.

The final Henley tally came when Reiling plunged in from the Merrill one and Trapp followed up with a conversion run.

Henley utilized seven ball-carriers but Reiling and Trapp, a senior who scored his first Henley TD, got credit for the bulk of the net 158 yards on the ground. Each packed the ball 12 times for a total 68 apiece.

Smith, a rugged sophomore, made 20 trips for the losers but the Henley defenses allowed him only a total of 22 yards. Smith also attempted 15 passes but managed to complete only two, good for a total of 15 yards.

Earl Allbritton and Reiling shared the passing for the Hornets, each completing one. The defensive standouts for the Hornets were Jim Stenberg, Jay Baisiger and Bob Gilder. Baisiger and Gilder were each credited with 12 tackles while Stenberg, the offensive center, chalked up 15.

St. Mary's A-2 Debut Successful

LAKEVIEW (Special)—The St. Mary's Crusaders, the 1960 Oregon prep B football champions, got off to a flying start in their class A-2 debut when they belted the Lakeview Honkers 13-0 here Saturday afternoon.

Coach Bill McKibbin's SM crew topped the Sacred Heart Academy in Klamath Falls to open its season last weekend.

Saturday the Crusaders got one touchdown and a point-after in the opening quarter and added six more points in the third stanza.

Both counters were the results of passes pitched by Rod Callahan. Callahan hit Jim Kaise with a 10-yarder for the first one and connected with Bob Read for 15 yards and the second. He also kicked the lone SM conversion.

The host Honker squad launched a sustained drive from its own 15 late in the fourth quarter and wound up on the Crusader four where a pass from Chuck Cossey was intercepted. Cossey had completed four aerials in the drive.

The contest, a Rogue League counter, was the first of the season for coach Howard Hopper's Lakeview eleven.
