

Rural Highway Traffic Up 10 Per Cent In '61

Traffic on rural highways in Oregon increased 3.1 per cent in July, over the same month last year, according to the State Highway Department. This brought the total increase for the first seven months of 1961 to 10.4 per cent greater than the same period in 1960.

July 1, which began the long July 4 holiday, saw the greatest number of cars passing highway department recording stations. Greatest traffic hour occurred most frequently during July from 4-5 p.m.

Gasoline consumption increased 4 per cent in June, 1961, over June of last year. Total for the first six months increased 5.35 per cent over the same period in 1960.

Recorder stations in the Klamath area showed the following:

U.S. 97 to Chemult, one mile south of Chemult, 3,394 vehicles daily average during July, 1961, up 1.3 per cent over 1960.

State Highway 66 to Beatty, four miles east of Beatty, 664 vehicles daily average during July, down 2.8 per cent from 1960.

U.S. 97 to Midland, six miles south of Klamath Falls, 2,758 vehicles daily average during July, down 4.4 per cent from 1960.

State Highway 39 to Merrill, two miles east of Merrill, 2,361 vehicles daily average during July, up 7.3 per cent over 1960.

State Highway 62 to Fort Klamath, 1,943 vehicles daily average during July, up 6.9 per cent over 1960.

Communist Takes Post

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Communist party chief Janos Kadar has again taken on the post of premier in a major government shakeup. He quickly announced a boost in Hungary's military spending.

Kadar took over the premiership from Ferenc Muegnich, an old revolutionary, who had ridden to power together when the Soviet Union crushed the Hungarian uprising of 1956.

The shakeup, announced on Wednesday by the presidential council, makes Kadar the official government spokesman. His dual role parallels that of Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet premier and party chief.

Kadar, 49, last held the two jobs in 1958, when he relinquished the premiership to Muegnich.

Muegnich appears ready for semiretirement at the age of 75. He stepped down from the premier's job to minister of state. The government announcement said this and other changes were suggested by Kadar "to strengthen party and state leadership."

Endre Sik, the white-haired foreign minister, was replaced by Janos Peter, a former reform church bishop who has led Hungary's delegation to the U.N. General Assembly for several years and made bitter speeches opposing the West. Sik probably will retire.

Karoly Kiss, deputy president and member of the politburo, lost his job as secretary of the party's central committee. He may succeed Istvan Dobi, Hungary's aging figurehead president.

Free Hand For European Military Chiefs Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Military chiefs reportedly are urging U. S. commanders in Europe be given a freer hand to respond promptly—and as they see fit—to any Soviet harassment of movements in or out of Berlin.

Some Pentagon sources contend Gen. Lauris Norstad, top U. S. and Allied commander in Europe, is operating under too restricted authority to deal on the spot with such Communist actions.

These sources said State Department officials involved in planning U. S. moves in the Berlin crisis are intent on trying to anticipate all possible situations and to lay down specific instructions on how to cope with them.

The military view, as expounded by the Defense Department sources, is that all possible situations cannot be anticipated and that armed forces commanders would be handcuffed if they were not allowed to exercise their judgment according to the circumstances.

Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was understood to have taken up this question with President Kennedy. There was no indication of any presidential action.

House Okays Orphan Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Provisions for admitting alien orphans to the United States for adoption are put on a permanent basis in a bill the House passed Wednesday.

The catchall measure also tightens rules on court appeals from deportation orders and speeds up the admission of about 11,000 persons, generally close relatives of naturalized citizens and foreign residents of the United States.

The bill was put together in a Senate-House conference out of portions passed separately by one chamber or the other. The House accepted it by voice vote without debate, sending it to the Senate for expected approval.

The legislation makes permanent the alien orphan adoption act under which nearly 10,000 foreign children have been brought to the United States, with Koreans providing the largest single group. The law had expired June 30.

Mount Rainier, Dormant Volcano, Now Shows Signs Of Life

LONGMIRE Wash. (AP) — Mt. Rainier, dormant 14,410-foot volcano, has started emitting steam and hot gasses up near the 12,000-foot level.

But University of Washington seismologist Dr. Frank Neumann said Saturday there was no evidence of any connection with a sharp earthquake which apparently centered 50 to 75 miles to the southwest Friday night, in the Mt. St. Helens area.

Rainier National Park Supt. Preston Macy said the new fissure

and escaping gasses at that elevation was unusual. But Army snow troops training on Disappointment Cleaver discovered evidences of similar heat among the eternal snows at about the same elevation several years ago, he added.

"I wish I could use some of that steam for heating," he joshed. Macy's headquarters are here at the base of the peak.

The summit crater has many such vents for escaping steam and gasses with rocks too hot to touch. The new fissure developed in August after a slide tumbled several thousand tons of rock from the northeast corner of Gibraltar Rock onto Cowlitz Glacier, Macy said.

It is in an extremely inaccessible area and no one is known to have visited it. Steam has been sighted frequently from Paradise Valley, four miles distant by air-line at the 5,500-foot elevation.

At Seattle Dr. Neumann said Friday night's earthquake was felt fairly strongly in Portland and over much of Oregon and southwest Washington. He said it had an intensity of about 6 on the Mercalli Scale of 12.

A known earth fault to the north runs through the southeast corner of Mt. Rainier National Park but not near the summit of the mountain, Dr. Neumann added.

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
