Stocks Wall Street NEW YORK STOCKS NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market showed sharp losses late this afternoon after a burst of selling greeted news of the death of U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold. Volume for the day was estimated at 3.5 billion shares compared with 3.13 billion Friday. Key stocks were down from fractions to 1 or 2 points. More volatile issues showed wider losses.

400 Pint Goal Needed In Bloodmobile Drive

Klamath County residents use 100 pints of blood a month for the ordinary sequence of accidents, surgery, shock cases, child birth and newborn babies with RH factors. This doesn't count emergency situations such as heart surgery and major operations where sometimes more than a gallon is used. A 400-pint goal four times a year is set to meet the need, explained Mrs. Winston Purvine, chairman for the Red Cross blood bank program which will be in operation Sept. 19-20.

Hammarskjold's death came one day after the 13th anniversary of the death in action of Count Folke Bernadotte, also of Sweden, who was U.N. mediator in Palestine. Bernadotte was killed Sept. 17, 1948, in Jerusalem by Jewish terrorists while he was seeking to end Jewish-Arab hostilities.

She was a member of St. Augustine's Church of Merrill and of the Altar Society.

She was a graduate of Klamath Union High School in 1942, and a member of the Fruitvale Presbyterian Church of Oakland. She was the daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Gottfried J. Anderson, who pastored the Mission Covenant Church of this city for some time.

Six Timber Tracts Sold At Medford Oral Auction

Six timber tracts, containing approximately 11,554,000 board feet, were sold at oral auction by the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, Medford district, Sept. 14, for \$298,123.65. John Carnegie, timber sale officer, reported bidding was more active than any sale held on the Medford area in the past six months. Tracts, successful bidders, board feet and sale prices are as follows: Area 1, west of Glendale on Cow Creek, Superior Logging Co. of Glendale, 960,000 feet, \$20,636.10. Area 2, Clover Butte in Klamath County, Modoc Lumber Co. of Klamath Falls, 3,830,000 feet, \$119,832.35. This was the highest price paid for any of the six areas offered, five other bidders competed for the tract.

Police List Knife Case

An alleged knife attack Saturday afternoon in a service station parking lot at East Main and Oak streets put one man in the hospital and another in the city jail on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Hospitalized was LeRoy V. Acord, 47, of 2117 Oak Street. His condition was reported as satisfactory Monday morning. Booked on the assault charge was Owen M. Hodge, 58, of 2111 Oak Street. Witnesses told investigating city police officers that Hodge and Acord had argued in front of a service station. Police said a witness heard Hodge tell Acord, "Stay away from my house or I'll cut your head off." According to the witness, Hodge pulled a knife. Acord told Hodge to put the knife away, the story continued, and took a step toward Hodge. Hodge lunged with the knife, the police report said, and stabbed Acord in the left shoulder. Police said the knife penetrated about three inches. Hodge was arrested nearby in the Sunrise Tavern, Tavern, where he was detained. Police were unable to find the knife.

Felony Charges Filed Against 19-Year-Old

Two felony charges were added over the weekend to two misdemeanor charges that have been filed against a 19-year-old Klamath Falls youth, Ysmal C. (Smiley) Herrera, 636 Owens Street. Herrera, who was free on \$900 bail on the misdemeanors, was arrested Early Saturday morning on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon and burglary in a dwelling. He was scheduled to go on trial this Thursday for assault and battery and Friday for failure to support minor children. City police said Herrera's ex-wife, Delores, 20, and Albert Crank Friday night were at Crank's home, 2130 Vine Street. According to the police report, Crank and Mrs. Herrera heard the glass break in the front door shortly before Herrera and a 16-year-old companion appeared in the house. Police said Herrera was armed with a .22 caliber automatic pistol and the 16-year-old had a tire iron. Crank was allegedly forced into the bathroom, where he was knocked unconscious with the tire iron. When he came to, Crank told police he and Mrs. Herrera were taken at gunpoint to a car along with Crank's 3-year-old son. Crank said he drove to the Midland Road, where Herrera forced him and the boy from the car. According to Mrs. Herrera, her ex-husband forced her to drive to the Dorris area, where he raped her twice. Shortly after this series of events, Herrera was rushed to Klamath Valley Hospital to be treated for an apparent overdose of sleeping pills. He was arrested upon his release from the hospital. The 16-year-old youth was placed in the county juvenile home. The FBI was called into the case to investigate a possible federal law violation. The two earlier charges against Herrera also involved his ex-wife.
