

Wide Scope Seen Ahead For 97 Route

BEND (AP)—A prediction that Highway 97 eventually will extend from Nome, Alaska, south through California, possibly Nevada and to the Mexican border was made at the Okanogan Cariboo Trail Association's 30th anniversary convention in Bend Saturday.

Present terminus of the route is Weed, Calif.

The prediction came from W.C. Williams, Oregon state highway engineer. He said Highway 97 has been about 90 per cent reconstructed through Oregon.

The association works for improvement and extension of Highway 97 as a north-south interior route from Alaska to Mexico.

USFS Offers Skyline Map

A new map folder on the Skyline Trail in Oregon is now available at U.S. Forest Service offices in Oregon and Washington, reports J. Herbert Stone, regional forester.

The folder replaces one printed in 1952. Maps and information have been brought up to date, and the folder has been made more attractive by use of color printing and new illustrations.

A similar folder recently was published for the Cascade Crest Trail of Washington. The Cascade Crest Trail and Skyline Trail make up the Pacific Crest Trail system which stretches from the Canadian border to California.

NEWBURY, Mass. (AP)—A sports parachutist intending to land with a birthday cake among a group of Boston socialites at a birthday party on Plum Island fell in the ocean and drowned Sunday.

George K. Dolloff, 31, of Newburyport, father of three daughters, was pulled 50 yards to shore but mouth-to-mouth respiration failed to revive him.

A former Navy parachutist and veteran of many sports jumps, Dolloff had leaped from a small plane 2,000 feet over the party. A huge cake was attached to a special harness on his equipment.

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JFK Mulls Complete Disarmament Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy returns to Washington today to make a decision on whether to deliver a potentially crucial address to the United Nations General Assembly.

A hint came Sunday from India's Prime Minister Nehru that Kennedy will lay a plan for complete disarmament before the United Nations, sessions open in New York today.

Kennedy revealed Friday that the United States has in the final drafting stage "a comprehensive plan for general and complete disarmament." This shortly can be presented publicly, he said.

It could not be learned immediately from White House officials who accompanied the President on a weekend visit with his family at their Cape Cod home whether Kennedy proposed to make the United Nations the forum for unveiling a general disarmament blueprint.

In fact, Press secretary Pierre Salinger said Sunday the President still had not decided on whether to visit the General Assembly at all.

Questioned directly late Sunday night on Nehru's remark, Salinger said he "couldn't have anything to say about that." He repeated that Kennedy still was undecided about visiting the United Nations.

In New Delhi, however, Nehru—just home from Moscow talks with Soviet Premier Khrushchev—spoke as if a Kennedy proposal were drinking, "Write Ann Landers' booklet, 'Teenage Drinking,' enclosing with your request 20 cents in coin and a long, self-addressed, stamped envelope.
