MIAMI (UPI) — Federal Judge

Frank M. Johnson Jr. began today while awaiting final briefs from attorneys before deciding the U. S. government's \$1,000,001 tax case against ex-heavyweight champion Ingemar Johansson.

A two-day hearing in the case, unattended by Johansson, wound up Tuesday after Johnson turned down a defense motion for acquittal.

Johnson said he would study documents offered in evidence during the hearing, and gave attorneys for both sides two weeks in which to file final briefs in his court at Montgomery, Ala. Johnson was assigned here for the case.

Johansson, reported to be in Geneva, Switzerland, by his attorneys, claims he does not owe the Internal Revenue Service any tax money because he is an employee off a Swiss firm—Scanart S. A.—and therefore not subject to U. S. tax laws under a U. S. Swiss treaty.

U. S. taxmen, however, contend Johansson is not exempt from tax laws because the firm, in effect, is nothing more than Johansson himself. They claim he owes the money on his three fights with Floyd Patterson.
