

Save Berlin By Atom, Says Barry Goldwater

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., believes the United States should warn the Soviet Union that it will use low-yield nuclear bombs to save Berlin and West Germany.

Goldwater, during a news conference held Tuesday at the 30th annual youth banquet of the California Junior Chamber of Commerce, declared:

"Mr. Khrushchev should be told by President Kennedy, or some other high authority, that the United States would, if Berlin were invaded, use low-yield nuclear bombs that would destroy planes on enemy airfields."

Battered Body Found

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI)—The nearly nude body of an attractive charity worker was found in her blood-spattered apartment Tuesday, the apparent victim of a sadistic slayer who beat her unmercifully before strangling her with a stocking.

An autopsy revealed the death of Carol Ronan, 34, was caused by strangulation. The Ramsey County coroner's office said she also had multiple head lacerations, a skull fracture and internal head hemorrhage.

It said Miss Ronan had been criminally assaulted.

All available St. Paul police detectives and patrolmen were called out today in a massive attempt to solve the brutal slaying.

The body of the red-haired beauty, a case work supervisor for the Bureau of Catholic Charities, was lying on a blood-stained studio couch. It was found by the building caretaker and two co-workers who became worried when Miss Ronan failed to report for work.

The caretaker said a woman living across the hall from Miss Ronan reported she heard a noise about 3 a.m. Tuesday, but reported no screams.

Shipley's Statement Admitted

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—Oregon State policeman James Finney resumed his testimony for the prosecution Tuesday in the first degree murder trial of Larry West Shipley, 20, McMinnville.

Finney returned to the stand at 3:40 p.m. after extended legal arguments in the chambers of Circuit Judge Earl Conrad, for which court had been recessed since Friday afternoon.

Shipley is charged with the gunshot slaying of Linda Jean Stevens, 16, McMinnville. Her body was found Aug. 8 on a wooded forest trail north of Otis Junction.

The arguments in chambers concerned the admissibility of statements made by Shipley before the trial.

Judge Conrad made no formal statement on his ruling when court reconvened, but apparently had agreed to admit the statements in evidence, since Finney's testimony concerned such statements.

Finney said in court he had questioned Shipley the day the girl's body was found. He said the youth told him he had last seen the girl Sunday, Aug. 6, when she came to the service station where he worked.

Finney said he was the driver of a car that took Shipley from McMinnville to Newport later in the week. He said he heard Shipley admit the slaying to a sheriff's deputy and Sgt. L.W. Brockway of the state police.

Glenn Dixon, 18, McMinnville, also is charged in the slaying. His trial will start next month.

Lloyd told police he parked his 1961 car in the carport of his daughter's home in suburban Highland Park and stepped out.

The car rolled about 85 feet down the street, smashed through two chain link fences, down a 22-foot embankment, righted itself, crossed a street, went through two more fences, rolled down another embankment, hit still another fence, broke a clothesline and came to rest in a vacant lot.

Damage to the car and property was estimated at \$900 by police.

Nixon Urged To Quit Race For Governorship

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon was urged Tuesday to decide against running for governor of California and avoid being "black-jacked into withdrawing from the world scene by a few political opportunists."

Ralph Andrews, chairman of "Volunteers for Knight," conceded in an open letter to Nixon that he was giving the 1960 GOP presidential candidate "a little unsolicited advice."

Ex-Gov. Goodwin J. Knight announced his candidacy last week and said he would bid for the Republican nomination regardless of what Nixon, currently a Los Angeles attorney, decides.

The open letter, released as a press handout, claimed the Knight support group had conducted a poll and found Knight running ahead of all candidates.
