

Klamath Art Group Plans Year Program

Fresh approaches to exhibits and shows, programs, art reviews and instruction classes were announced this week by the Klamath Art Association.

Complete details of the entire year's program will be outlined at the first meeting of the new year at 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 21, at the Maple Park Gallery, according to Lyle Matoush, newly elected president.

Newsletters explaining memberships and policies of the group were mailed out to members, prospective members and friends this week, Matoush said.

The meeting will be open to anyone who is interested, said Matoush, arts and crafts teacher at Klamath Union High School. Matoush, who teaches general arts, personally specializes in print making and silversmithing. He came to KUHS in 1960 from San Francisco State where he received his master's degree. He resides at 1517 Donald Street with his wife, Jane, also an art instructor, who teaches part time at Fremont School.

Also taking office at the meeting will be Frank Wandell, vice president; Dr. Miriam Luten, treasurer; and Roberta Blomquist, secretary.

Most different innovation in the art group's plans for the year is that the monthly meetings which convene every third Thursday of the month will be devoted to art reviews, lectures and entertainment. Business meetings will be conducted by the board at another time.

"We hope to make the programs

interesting and appealing," Matoush said. "We will give brief business reports, of course, but we aim at a variety of programs which will appeal to a cross-section of interests."

Board members also announced that patrons of the KAA will be given the privilege of using rent-free their choice of a picture, print or sculpture for a period of four months this year. Patrons may make their selections at the membership show which runs Sept. 17 through Oct. 1.

The newly elected president pointed out that it was not necessary to be an artist—"only interested"—in explaining the different memberships. Membership classes include student, \$3; single members, \$5; couples, \$7.50; donors, \$10, and patrons, \$25.

Beyond memberships the association will again open its doors to the public for classes including oil painting, water color, weaving and ceramics. Special Christmas decoration and packaging sessions are also planned.

Shows and exhibits scheduled for the first few months include the membership show through Oct. 1, Virginia (Mrs. Walter) Brown, Oct. 8-22; Robert Bosworth, Oct. 29-Nov. 12; Blanche (Mrs. Edward) Casey, Nov. 19-Dec. 3; Christmas art fair, Dec. 9-Jan. 3; and photography, Jan. 15-29.

All the shows will be open to the public without charge each Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m. Members sometimes open individual shows with receptions introducing the artist.

2 Arraigned On Burglary

Two Klamath Falls men arraigned Monday on burglary charges asked for preliminary hearings in district court.

Arraigned were William O. Stephenson, 19, Route 3, Box 46, Klamath Falls, and Harold F. Shepherd, 21, 1947 Melrose Street. They are accused of breaking into the T. P. Packing Company on the Old Midland Road early Sunday morning in an apparent burglary attempt.

Stephenson and Shepherd were arrested by state police when they ran their car into a ditch. Both are lodged in jail in lieu of \$3,500 bail to await a preliminary hearing, which was set for Sept. 27 by District Judge Hal F. Coe.

A preliminary hearing was also set Monday for Leon Graham, 21-year-old Malin man charged with larceny. He is accused of stealing \$180 on Sept. 4 from a car owned by Barbara Rogers of Malin. The hearing was set for Sept. 22 and Graham was jailed in lieu of \$2,000 bail.

A 55-year-old Klamath Falls man accused of attacking another man last Saturday afternoon with a knife waived his right to a hearing and was bound over to the grand jury. He is Owen M. Hodge, 58, 2111 Oak Street.

Hodge is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with the alleged attack on LeRoy V. Acord, 47, 2117 Oak Street. Bail is set at \$5,500.

Huge Fine Levied Man

Duane E. Matt, 34-year-old Chilquien man who failed to show up in district court Monday to answer two charges, was fined a total of \$475 and sentenced to 160 days in jail by Judge Hal F. Coe.

Judge Coe also issued a warrant for Matt's arrest. Matt had been charged with driving while his license was suspended and being drunk on a public highway after a July 27 traffic accident on Highway 97 near Modoc Point.

Matt rammed into the rear end of a car being driven by a Navy officer, Sidney Morris, tearing a fender and trunk lid from Morris' car. Matt continued up the highway until he was forced to stop.

Judge Coe fined Matt \$400 and gave him a 150-day jail term for the suspension violation and added \$75 and 10 days on the drunk charge. Matt had previously pleaded not guilty and asked for trials. An additional charge, of driving without a license, was dismissed.

Episcopalians Test Plan To Unite Church

DETROIT (AP)—A crucial test of their bishops and clergy neared today on a monumental proposal for uniting four major Christian denominations into a single church "truly Catholic, truly reformed and truly evangelical."

The House of Bishops at the triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church set a full day of sessions for action on the matter.

"We're in for considerable debate on it," said Bishop Henry I. Lottitt, of Orlando, Fla., chairman of the House's Committee for Dispatch of Business.

Before the church-governing body is a recommendation by its unity commission to approve merger negotiations with the United Presbyterians, Methodists and the United Church of Christ. Altogether, they have nearly 20 million members.

Moves also were afoot to include the Polish National Catholic Church.

Whether the historic plan actually gets under way hinges heavily on action by the Episcopal Church, which clings to ancient Catholic concepts not found in the other strictly Protestant bodies.

Anglo-Catholic "high church" forces have mounted a full-scale assault on the plan, saying it would mean "sacrifice of essential principle," concerning the church's sacraments and historic succession.

Episcopalians trace the ordina-

tion of their bishops and clergy back to the Apostles through the "laying on of hands" from one generation to another, and stress Christ's real spiritual presence in the Lord's Supper.

These are Catholic qualities, not characteristic of Protestantism generally. But Episcopalians also hold to Protestant traditions, such as democratic church government and the Bible as the rule of faith.

Many top Episcopal leaders, including the presiding bishop, the Rt. Rev. Arthur Lichtenberger, hope the difficulties could be overcome.

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Kennedy Plans Assured Of Congressional Okay

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two of President Kennedy's innovations in foreign policy, his Peace Corps and disarmament agency, were assured of final approval today by a Congress plodding toward adjournment.

Compromise legislation making

the Peace Corps a permanent agency may be sent to the White House today. Operating under executive order the Peace Corps already has sent 110 volunteers to teaching and other jobs abroad. By next summer it expects to have perhaps 1,000 in a dozen countries, with 1,700 more in training.

Final enactment of legislation setting up the disarmament agency awaited agreement between negotiators assigned to compromise differences between House and Senate bills. The House approved its version, 290-54, Tuesday night. The Senate passed the bill, 73-14, last week.

Chief Roadblock
The main obstacle in the way of adjournment was the foreign aid money bill on which Senate-House negotiations began Thursday. House leaders still hoped to adjourn this week, but Senate leaders said the session might run into next week.

The House Tuesday night passed legislation to ease the stock market and tax impact of the court-ordered disposal of \$3 billion worth of General Motors stock by DuPont Co. The court ruling stemmed from an antitrust suit.

Senate leaders had planned to call the legislation up in the Senate. Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., warned that if they did, he would lead a floor fight to tack on amendments to close "tax loopholes."

Charges Favoritism
Gore charged the measure was principally designed to benefit stockholders in high tax brackets. He said he did not want to see "the only tax bill passed by the first session of Congress in the Kennedy administration be a DuPont tax-relief bill."

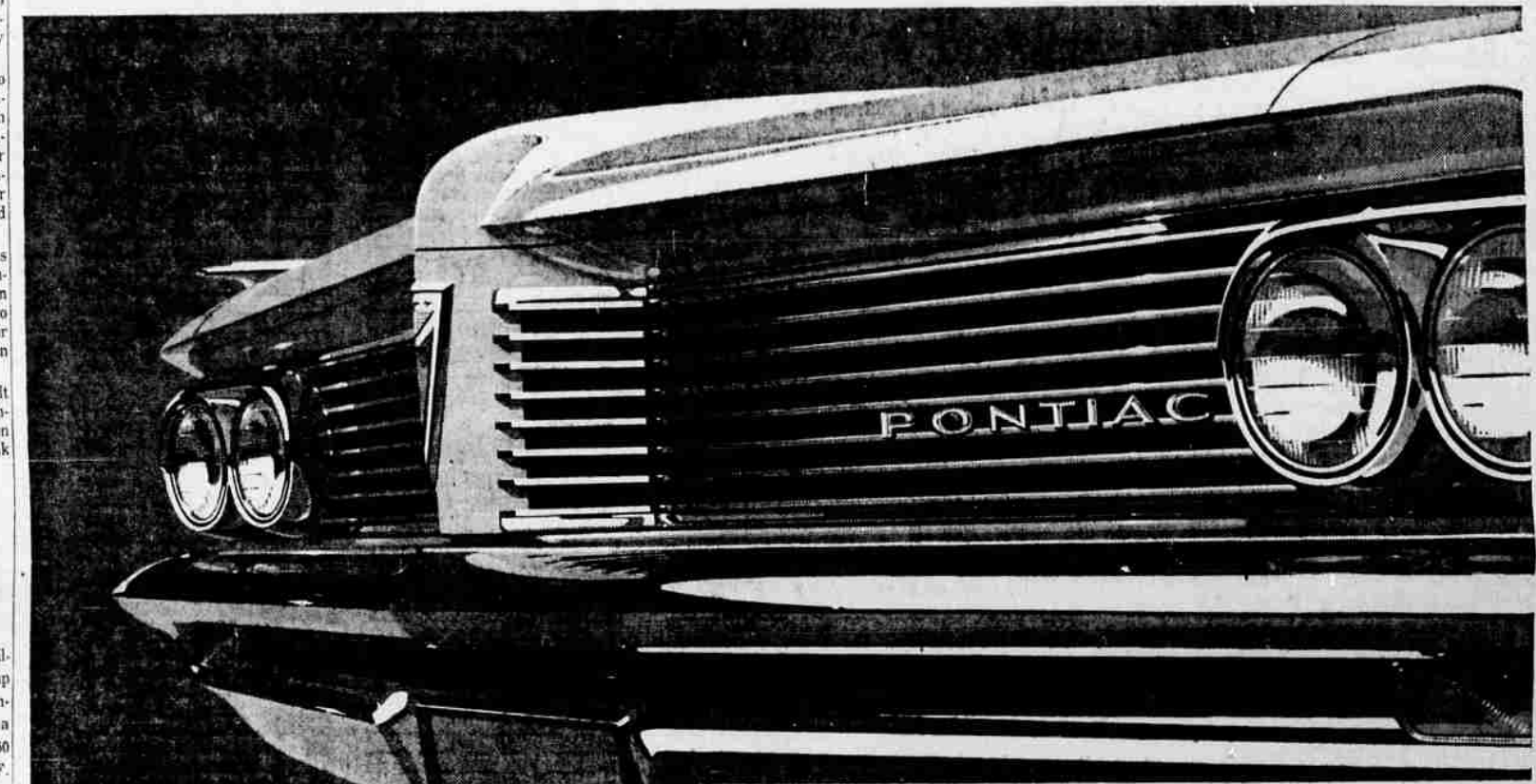

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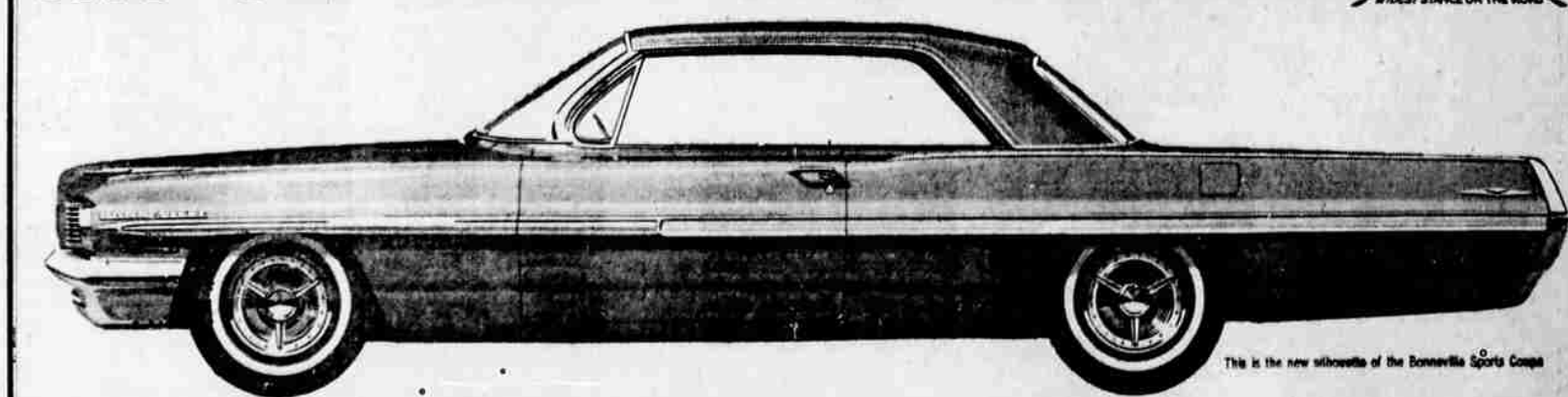
