"Learning Through Leading to Better Our School" will be the theme of the Region 5 Student Body Officers Conference scheduled for Klamath Falls Sunday afternoon through Tuesday morning, KU Student Body President Rod Sparlin announced to the first assembly of student council after school Thursday afternoon.

According to Sparlin, some 250 delegates from 45 high schools in Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, and Klamath counties will register at the First Presbyterian Church Sunday afternoon and Monday morning.

The conference will get underway Monday in the church at 9:15 a.m. with an assembly which Sparlin, who is also president of Region 5, will open. He will be followed by KU Principal Willard McKinny's opening address, and then by Mike McCulloch of Medford, Oregon's First Citizen from the Boy's State meet held this summer, who will deliver the kick-off speech.

From there the body will break up into group sessions to discuss and debate school government. Lunch will be served at the Willard Hotel after the morning sessions. With the conclusion of an afternoon group session and election of next year's officers, the delegates will be invited to an informal dance in their honor in the KU cafeteria stage area. Only Klamath Union Student Body officers and none of the KU students will be in attendance at any of the festivities.

The meet will wind up with a gala banquet in the Willard Hotel, and 250 officers will head home Tuesday morning.

Student Savings Stamp Plan Starts In Schools

The student savings stamp program began in the city and county school systems last week and individual school chairmen met with the state director of the program at Mills School Thursday.

George Mimnaugh, Oregon director of the program, of Portland, emphasized to the chairmen that the idea behind the program was not to encourage parents to increase allowances for purchase of the bonds and stamps, but to have children earn their own extra money for them—thus teaching them thrift.

Mimnaugh outlined the entire stamp and bond program as it is geared to the schools. Stamps will be available at breaks in the school day, on specified days, in denominations ranging from 10 cents upward. Eighteen dollars an seventy five cents buys a \$25 bond, Mimnaugh said.

Bureau Seeks Grass Seed

This Bureau of Land Management in Portland has called for bids to be opened 2 p.m. (PST), Oct. 3, to furnish approximately 161,000 pounds of seed for reseeding range lands in Oregon and California, the Department of the Interior announced recently.

Pure live seed is requested which will be delivered to BLM warehouses in Vale, Burns, Lakeview, Prineville and Baker, Ore., and in Susanville, Calif.

Quantities range from 2,000 to 32,000 pounds consisting of Crested and Whitmar wheatgrass. Of the total quantity, 20,000 pounds will go to California.

The bureau is purchasing the seed as part of a stepped-up program for rehabilitation of the Oregon-California range.

Details on the invitation are available to prospective bidders at the Bureau of Land Management's Portland office, 1002 N.E. Holladay Street.

Entry fee for the events is \$1.50; events begin at 10 a.m.

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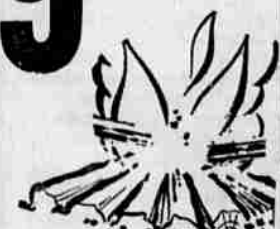
