Oregon's 10-Year Plan Sparks Better Airports

SALEM (AP)—A 10-year plan for development of airports in Oregon adopted Wednesday by the state Board of Aeronautics calls for improved airports throughout Oregon.

"Thirty six Oregon cities of 1,000 to 10,000 populations . . . and 36 cities of 500 to 1,000 population have no airport.

"Privately owned airports are disappearing all over the United States at an alarming rate and Oregon already suffered from the trend," the report said.

Oregon, the report said, has not used its annual quota of federal funds for airport construction except in a few years.

"In much of Oregon, light aircraft flying at their normally lower altitudes cannot communicate with anyone and no radio navigation is useable by them" it said.

"This problem is not confined to the wide-open spaces of central and eastern regions but is also true in the coastal areas and sizeable areas of Western Oregon.

"Three of the airports at cities of 5,000 to 10,000 and seven of the 14 at cities of 2,500 to 5,000 are not lighted."

The long range goal of the plan is to make every Oregon community, recreational area, agricultural area and forest industry area accessible by air.

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
