OEA Supports Board Rule

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon state Board of Education has the confidence of the Oregon Education Association's board of trustees in the Dean Bay case, the OEA said in a statement made public today.

Bay, denied a teaching certificate because he had a criminal record, filed a complaint with the OES Ethics Committee, saying the state's action was unjust.

The OEA statement said, "Standards for entry into the teaching profession should be higher than those for entry into any other profession. The board has confidence that the judgment of the superintendent of public instruction and the state Board of Education has been made after careful consideration of all factors."

Police Probe Beating Tale

City police investigated a report early Sunday morning by a man who said he had been beaten and robbed of approximately \$40 by three young men.

The report was made by Lawrence H. Denman Jr., 2685 Radcliffe Street, a staff sergeant at Kingsley Field. Denman told police he had met three men in a downtown bar.

Denman said he rode with the men around 2 a.m. out Front Street near the Klamath Yacht Club. At that point, Denman said he was beaten and robbed.

Three youths, two from Portland and one from Klamath Falls, were brought in for questioning later. Denman, however, couldn't identify them as his assailants and they were released.

Rev. Phillips Death Noted

The Rev. Victor Phillips, 73, former pastor of the Methodist Church of Klamath Falls, died Sept. 20 in a Portland nursing home. He had undergone serious brain surgery last January, from which he failed to recover.

The Reverend and Mrs. Phillips and family left Klamath Falls 13 years ago after serving the local church for nine years. Since his retirement he had served numerous Oregon churches as a supply pastor.

The family home is at 2325 N.E. 53rd Avenue, Portland 13.

Funeral services were Monday from the Ross Hollywood Chapel. Final rites and interment were in Lincoln Memorial Cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe M. Kennedy, this city, were in Portland with the family shortly before his death.

Survivors include the widow, Ethel, two daughters, Mrs. Thelma Bodigan, Mrs. Lois Blodgett, all of Portland; a son Kenneth Phillips of Medford; a sister, Mrs. Lyle Tree; also 11 grandchildren.

Jackie Style Hair Outlawed

(AP)—The University of Miami, sometimes known as "Suntan U.," has issued a set of rules outlawing such things as Jackie Kennedy-style hairdos, student parking and necking any place on campus, T-shirts, slacks, sandals, men's shorts shorter than two inches above the knee, eye shadow, excessive bouffant and bee-hive hairdos, and fraternity parties more than 20 miles from campus.

Burglars Hit South Sixth Businesses

Two adjacent businesses on South Sixth Street, Broderick's Pharmacy and Adair's Furniture, were entered early Sunday morning by burglars, who broke open a safe, stole money and other items.

The burglaries were discovered Sunday by Ben Adair, furniture company owner. His store is at 2200 South Sixth Street and the pharmacy is next door at 2212.

Police said the burglars first broke into the pharmacy through a skylight at the rear of the building. They knocked the dial off the safe and stole an undetermined amount of money. A small amount of cash was taken from the cash register and a \$15 watch was also stolen.

The furniture store was entered through a dividing door. A filing cabinet was broken open and \$14 was stolen from the top drawer. Papers were scattered around the store. The burglars left after breaking two locks in the furniture warehouse.

Hunger Striker Condition Bad

AMRITSAR, India (AP) — Sikh Leader Master Tara Singh was reported in grave condition today, the 40th day of his hunger strike.

Singh, 76, is fasting to support a demand for a separate state within India in which the Sikh religious minority would dominate.

Himdu Yogi Surya, who began fasting at the same time in opposition to Singh's demand, was reported in a steadily weakening condition.

Prime Minister Nehru's government is standing firm against creation of a Sikh state despite efforts by various mediators to win some concessions which might permit Singh to end his fast. It is feared death of the aged religious leader might provoke riots and bloodshed.
