Reed Gets Ford Grant

PORTLAND (AP) — The Ford Foundation has given a \$1.4 million grant to Reed College, Richard H. Sullivan, president of the college, announced Saturday.

Reed is the only college in the West to receive such a grant. Sullivan said. It is one of eight given to U.S. liberal arts colleges under a new special program in education of the foundation.

\$500,000 of the Ford grant will be given to Reed before the end of the year. Sullivan said. The terms call for the college to raise \$2.8 million in matching funds over a three-year period.

The grant will make possible a major step in Reed's 10-year, \$20 million advancement program announced last year, the college president said.

The plan includes provisions to increase faculty salaries and provide additional scholarship assistance for deserving students, Sullivan said.

He said physical improvements contemplated are completion of the science teaching and research center, expansion of the library, construction of a center for the arts, and improvement of recreational facilities.

Already constructed as part of the science center complex are the chemistry and biology buildings. Still planned are a physics building, a science library and a lecture building.

Gov. Mark O. Hatfield said of the grant: "Historically Reed College has been a tower of strength in academic circles throughout the nation. This recognition is further evidence of the growing prestige which Reed brings not only to its campus but to our state as well."

Hatfield added, "Reed's research and personnel have contributed much to the area's development and this is an important factor in our state's future."

 ASHTABULA, Ohio (AP) — Thomas P. Madden, 72, who was a member of the faculty of the University of Notre Dame for 29 years, died Monday. He retired in 1938 after serving as head of the freshman English department for many years.

LONDON (AP)—Britain told its Commonwealth partners today they may have to give up their advantageous trade and tariff position in Britain. A meeting earlier this month of Commonwealth finance ministers in Accra, Ghana, issued a communique expressing fear that the Commonwealth may break up if Britain joins the common market.

The Commonwealth is composed of France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg. Now moving to unite its members in a vast trading area, it also has political overtones. Some supporters maintain that ultimately the Common Market could lead to a united Europe.

The 130 delegates attending a meeting of Commonwealth parliaments applauded. Strong opposition has been expressed to Britain's application for membership in the six-nation European trading group.
