Enrollment Increases In All Tule Schools

TULELAKE — Tulelake High School, Tulelake Elementary School and the Newell Elementary School have all registered some increase in student registration over 1960.

J. R. Daughenbaugh, new principal of the high school reports a 10 per cent increase with 200 students in classrooms. Registrations of 367 students in the Tulelake Elementary School are 10 higher than last year, according to Principal Arnold Torggino. Among these are a number of children of transient families.

The high school has added two new subjects, business law economics and physiology and sociology. The administration has also changed graduation requirements to conform to the state curriculum schedule for a mandatory four years of English. Seniors must also pass five subjects during their senior year including four solids.

Graduation qualifications have been dropped from 220 semester hours to 200 hours.

The annual freshman-sophomore "brawl," a faculty supervised contest of physical strength was held Sept. 22.

5-Year Jolt Given Man

Leslie Roberson, 49, convicted last week of assault with a dangerous weapon, was sentenced Monday afternoon to a five-year term in the Oregon State Penitentiary by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Roberson had been indicted by the grand jury for assault with intent to kill but last week's verdict reduced the crime. Maximum sentence for assault with a dangerous weapon is 10 years.

There were no prior felony convictions on Roberson's record, according to an FBI report.

Klamath Lumber and Box, which last year was an outstanding firm, according to Glenn Jennings, United Fund executive, in both employee and firm classifications, came in this year with 144 per cent of last year's gift. They were \$210 over their 1961 quota.

prerogative of exercising that control.

However, Mayor Veach pointed out that the law says the city has the first responsibility.

After some discussion, a poll of the council found Barnes and Kellstrom the only two voting against the denial, and the other three councilmen voting affirmative on the motion of Councilman Walter Fleet to deny the license change.

Sidewalks came in for a round of discussion, also, during the reading of an ordinance providing for sidewalk repair and replacement when deemed necessary by the city.

The ordinance carries this clause which is of interest to all homeowners: "Any owner, refusing or failing to keep his sidewalk in a good state of repair shall be and is hereby made liable to any person suffering personal injury or property damage by reason of any defect in such sidewalk."

The council also set Monday, Oct. 23, at 7:30 p.m. as the time for hearing on the annexation of the OTI campus site north of Klamath Falls without a vote.

L. Archie Huff of the police department appeared to invite council members to visit the new pistol range constructed by the department members on the OTI road. Classes at the new range will start on Wednesday or Thursday, he told the group. The council toured the facility early Tuesday morning.

The question of determining a definition for a limited plumbing shop in a C-1 zone was tabled for another week. However, some suggestions voiced thus far include the limitation of 600 square feet of retail store space and not more than 1,000 square feet for a plumbing shop. Councilman Hoyt asked the delay until planner Dave DeVoe has received an answer from a query to the American Society of Planning Officials on such a definition.

The council also approved negotiation of a contract with Michie City Publications Company of Los Angeles for codification of the city's ordinances.

Police Raid House Here

A city police raid early Sunday morning on an alleged house of prostitution at 521 Commercial Street resulted in the arrest of a woman on a common prostitution charge and a man for keeping a bawdy house.

Arrested were Frances Sims, 26, San Francisco, and Melvin Lee Jackson, 37, 211 Broad Street. Miss Sims is a white woman while Jackson is a Negro.

Miss Sims pleaded guilty to vagrancy (common prostitution) Monday morning in municipal court and was sentenced to pay a \$100 fine and spend 30 days in jail. Jackson was arrested Monday afternoon and lodged in the county jail in lieu of \$500 bail.

Police said they had received information last week that a house of prostitution was being operated on Commercial Street. After an unsuccessful attempt to enter one place, two policemen went early Sunday morning to 521 Commercial Street. According to his report, one officer went to the door and asked about a girl. The man who answered the door first said there were no girls but there was a card game.

The officer said Jackson finally took him upstairs to a small room, where he was introduced to Miss Sims. The officer said he gave her \$15 and arrested her as she started to disrobe.

Schultz Assault Trial Opens; Jury Selected

The trial of Clayton S. Schultz, charged with assault with intent to kill, opened Monday in circuit court with the selection of a jury of five women and seven men.

Schultz, a 19-year-old Klamath Falls youth, is accused of stabbing Roland J. Crume, 19, Sprague River four times on Aug. 2. The alleged knife attack took place in the Waldorf Billiard Parlor, 610 Main Street, after a fist fight on Main Street.

After their selection, jurors were taken to the Waldorf to view the scene of the alleged attack at the request of Schultz' attorney, P. K. Puckett. The jury was returned to the courtroom for opening statements.

Deputy District Attorney Sam A. McKee said the evidence would show that Schultz "pounced" on Crume and stabbed him in the back four times with a kitchen paring knife. McKee said the two youths had previously been first fighting.

Schultz' defense will be self defense, Puckett indicated. Puckett said Schultz was merely defending himself against Crume, Jim Dumont and Albert A. Lawlor.
