Teenage Bowhunter Bags Forked Horn

MONTAGUE — Dennis Campbell, 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Campbell, topped his dad's record this year by killing his first deer during the bow and arrow season on Saturday, Sept. 16.

Dennis, who is an eighth grade student at the Montague Elementary School, has been using a bow and arrow since he was 8 years old, having been taught by his father, who was named archer of the year about two years ago. This is the first time in 10 years that the senior Campbell has come home without a buck.

It was at a potluck dinner held by the local Siskiyou Bowmen's Club on Wednesday evening, that the family learned that Dennis was the only member out of 35 who had killed a buck during the season, which opened on Sept. 9.

and closed on Sept. 18.

Needless to say, "Papa Campbell" came in for considerable ribbing by members, some saying, "Pretty good, when the old man has to take the kid along to get his buck."

The forked horn buck killed by Dennis weighed about 100 pounds, and Dennis dropped him with one arrow through the lungs at about 70 yards.

In addition to being a member of the Siskiyou Bowmen's group, Dennis also is a member in the California Bowmen, Cascade Bowhunters, and National Field Archery Association.

Campbell is a native of Klamath Falls. He attended high school there. Several members of his family are still residents of Klamath Falls, among them his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Campbell.

Henley '11' Seeks Victory No. Three

Coach Leonard Weber's Henley Hornets will be out to nail down their third straight victory of the season Friday night when they play host to a rapidly improving Rogue River eleven.

The Hornets after an opening 7-7 tie with the Chiloquin Panthers have posted successive shutouts over the Merrill Huskies, 20-0, and the Illinois Valley Cougars, 7-0.

Rogue River's Chiefs have been the services of defensive stars Frank Palmerton and Mike O'Brien, both of whom were injured in the Glendale game and were out for two weeks. The Chiefs defeated Glendale 19-0 in their season opener and then dropped a tough 18-0 decision to the Phoenix Pirates. They were idle last weekend.

Single-wing plays have been installed in order to get more off tackle power, and the passing game will also receive more attention this week according to coach Bob Sandgren. Sandgren, in his third year as Chief boss, said that Rogue River will try to carry the offense by passing. The Chiefs have two good receivers in Steve Simer and Barry Frantz. Frantz, an all-conference basketball star, has good hands and makes a fine target for ace quarterback Galyon Knight. Sandgren feels that the Chiefs will have to go for the "big" plays in order to score, and also accomplish a satisfactory ground game attack.

Probable starting line-up for Rogue River is Simer or Gust Scheffstrom and Frantz, ends; Theron Stiehl, all-conference last two years and Tim Murdock, tackle; Bill Cooper and Bob Machado, guards; Randy Anderson, center; Knight, quarterback; Jack Salter and Craig Phillips, halfbacks, and Dick Middleton, fullback.

Coaches Weber and Nels Olson have been dissatisfied with early week workouts on the parts of the Hornets. "For some reason we have been taking Rogue River lightly. They are a rapidly improving ball club and will give somebody fits before the season is over," said Weber. The Hornets have been practicing without the services of its two key linebacks, David Trapp and Bob Gilder. Chuck Milanovich, defense halfback, has been nursing a bruised elbow, and Leo Huff has been slow in shaking an early season arm injury. Other players have had to miss practices and help on the farms before the inclement weather sets in to stay.

The Hornets' tentative lineup will read: Mike Tacchini and Mike Beymer at ends; Charley Thompson and Danny Barrett, tackles; Jay Balsiger and John Riggs, guards; Jim Stenberg, center; Earl Allbritton, quarterback; Pierre LaPierre, fullback; and Steve Reiling and John Crumrine at halfbacks.

Others to see action include Joe Kerns and Elton Schiro, ends; Dick Johnson, Don Berry, and Gary Fuller at tackles; Don Breithaupt at center; in the backfield, Steve Rand, Fred Rodriguez, Charley Phillips, Mike Peacock, Bill Fischer and Phil Hale.

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Koufax Rewrites Record; Maris Takes Afternoon Off

Sandy Koufax broke a 58-year-old strikeout record. Little-used Al Schroll made a strong bid for a no-hitter. But the big baseball noise was made by Roger Maris—and he took the day off.

Maris, who hit his 60th home run Tuesday night and received a thunderous ovation, almost had his membership in the club revoked Wednesday when he took a much needed rest.

The Yankee slugger, with three more games remaining against Boston in which to become the most productive one-season homer hitter in major league annals, left the bench in the middle of the game with Baltimore and was booed by many of the 7,500 fans, on hand to see him swing.

Without Maris and Mantle, the Yankees proved an impotent group against Steve Barber (18-12), who gave up a homer to Yogi Berra among six hits. Jim Gentile's two-run homer, his 46th, off Bill Stafford (13-9) in the first and rookie Johnny Powell's run-producing single—his first major league hit—in the third won it for the Orioles.

Koufax brought his season strikeout total to 269 by fanning seven Phillies and bettered the 267 compiled by Christy Mathewson of the New York Giants in 1903. But the Los Angeles Dodgers southpaw lost to Philadelphia 2-1 on a pair of unearned runs in the third inning.

The Dodgers, however, clinched a tie for second place when the Pittsburgh Pirates beat third-place San Francisco Giants 5-3 on Bill Mazeroski's two-run homer in the ninth. Chicago downed St. Louis 5-2 on homers by Danny Murphy, rookie Ken Hubbs and George Altman. Schroll (4-3), a burly right-hander, held Cleveland hitless for eight innings en route to a 10-4 victory in his first complete game.

Frank Lary brought his record to 23-9 as Detroit whipped Kansas City 10-2 on homers by Rocky Colavito, Norm Cash and Bubba Morton. Jim Pagliaroni drove in two runs with a homer and double in Boston's 6-4 victory over Chicago, and Los Angeles' Angels downed Washington 8-6 in another night game with a three-run rally in the eighth.

Klamath 'Picker' Mops Up

Picking football winners is a cinch according to Dean DeWitt, a Klamath Falls gridiron fan.

Mound Nominees Posted

NEW YORK (AP) — Barring a change in plans between now and next Wednesday, the opening game pitchers for the 1961 World Series will be left-handers Whitey Ford for the New York Yankees and Jim O'Toole for the Cincinnati Reds.

Both managers—Ralph Houk of the Yankees and Fred Hutchinson of the Reds—have indicated they will employ no more than three starters in the series, even if it goes the limit of seven games.

Right-hander Ralph Terry (15-3) will pitch the second game for the Yankees. Joey Jay, another right-hander with a 21-9 record is expected to be Hutchinson's second game choice. The first two games, starting Oct. 4, will be played at Yankee Stadium.

Right-handers Bill Stafford (13-9) of New York and Bob Purkey (16-12) of Cincinnati will be the opposing pitchers in the third game at Cincinnati's Crosley Field on Saturday, Oct. 7. After that, it will be Ford against O'Toole again.

"I see no reason why I can't go with three pitchers," Houk said today. "With the days off after the second and fifth games, it means three pitchers can go every four days. I've been using my pitchers, more or less, every fourth day during the season and I see no reason why I should change my method, especially since it has proved successful all year."

"Of course, if a particular pitcher looked 'bad' or if he were forced to pitch extra innings and his arm became stiffer than expected, I probably would be forced to change my thinking. Otherwise, I will go with three pitchers."

In line with this kind of thinking, Houk plans to pitch Ford, Terry and Stafford, in that order, against Boston in the final series of the year, starting Friday night. None will be allowed to go the distance.

Cal Poly '11' Slates Return To Gridiron

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—California State Polytechnic College of San Luis Obispo will play its first football game Saturday night since 16 members of the team were killed in a plane crash last year in Toledo, Ohio.

Ten of the 22 players who survived the disaster are on the squad which opens here against San Diego State College. The others graduated, left school or suffered such severe injuries they are unable to play.

Coach Leroy B. Hughes, who has mustered 16 transfer students and 10 players from the freshman team, describes his chances this season as "bleak."

The air tragedy followed Cal Poly's 50-6 defeat at the hands of Bowling Green (Ohio) State University. The Mustangs were leaving Toledo in the fog aboard a two-engine C46 operated by Arctic Pacific Airlines of Oakland, Calif. The Federal Aviation Agency said the plane was overloaded and not airworthy.

A pregame tribute is scheduled at San Diego State's Aztec Bowl. Spectators will observe 30 seconds of silence in tribute to those who died.

Yankees Favored In Series

NEW YORK (AP) — Experience gives the New York Yankees the edge in pitching over the Cincinnati Reds.

No one has started more games in World Series history than Whitey Ford, the ace of the American League pennant winners. The brilliant left-hander has started 14, compiled a 7-4 mark and is tied for most victories with Allie Reynolds and Red Ruffing.

Ralph Terry and Bill Stafford, who figure to draw the other starting assignments for New York, worked in last year's series. Terry lost two games, yielding the home run to Bill Mazeroski in the final game that gave Pittsburgh the title. Stafford pitched six innings with no decisions.

Luis Arroyo, Jim Coates and Bob Turley of the Yanks also have seen series action.

On the other hand, none of the 10 Cincinnati pitchers eligible for the 1961 postseason championships starting in Yankee Stadium next Wednesday, has any series experience.

The starting pitchers almost are certain to be Ford (25-4), Terry (15-3) and Stafford (13-9) for New York and Joey Jay (21-9), Jim O'Toole (18-9) and Bob Purkey (16-12) for the Reds.

The fact that all six have impressive won-lost records is a tribute to the teams' excellent relief pitchers — Arroyo (15-3) for the Yankees and Jim Brosnan (10-3) and Bill Henry (2-1) for the Reds. These three will be the late-inning relievers: Coates (11-5) and Bud Daley (12-17) for New York and Ken Johnson (6-2) and Jim Maloney (6-7) of Cincinnati are likely to get the relief calls from the first through the sixth innings.

Mathewson Mark Falls To Dodger

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—"Sure the record is nice but I'd rather win," said southpaw Sandy Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers Wednesday night after he established a new National League strikeout record for a single season but lost 2-1 to Philadelphia.

Koufax broke the record of 267, set by Christy Mathewson of the New York Giants in 1903, in the sixth inning when he struck out Pancho Herrera, who took a third called strike.

"I'm pleased (with the record) but I wish I'd stopped the two runs," said the 25-year-old Koufax later. "I knew when he came up to bat I had a chance at the record but I didn't think about it until the third strike was called."

In all Koufax struck out seven batters to give him a new mark of 269. After getting Herrera, the sixth strikeout of the night, he fanned B.G. Smith in the eighth. The American League mark is 348 set by Bob Feller of Cleveland in 1946.

Koufax's 268 strikeouts came in only 253½ innings—his 269 strikeouts in 255 innings—the most he's worked in a single season in his seven-year career in the majors. Mathewson pitched 367 innings when he struck out 267 men in 1903.

Ex-Caveman Leads Saturday Invasion Of Owl Territory

Hardy Spurgeon, a hard-running 222-pound fullback from Grants Pass, will lead the Grays Harbor Junior College invasion of the Oregon Tech Owl territory Saturday night when the Techmen attempt to get back on the win side of the register.

The Chokers, who have a one-point lead in their only start to date, will tangle with the Owls (1-1) on Modoc Field Saturday night at 8 o'clock.

Spurgeon, who starred for the Grants Pass Cavemen as a prep powerhouse a couple of years ago, laid out a year before joining the powerful GH eleven. He was a spectator last year when the Owls eked out a hair-raising 26-19 over the visitors on their home grounds.

Hardy, who was hurt early in the season, is now hale and hearty and shows up well in the GH defensive structure as well as on the offensive.

He will be joined in the backfield by quarterback Jerry Morris, a 5-10 185 freshman to whom falls the Choker passing assignments. The halfback chores will be shared by Rick Safford and Glenn Mahar, 175 and 190 pounds respectively.

Across the forward wall the Techmen have a definite weight advantage, the biggest Choker linemen being right guard Chuck Walkowski at 195, and guard Bob McNeely, 199.

The Owl line includes a pair of 245-pounders, big Jim Madden and Claire Hawkins. The Owl defensive unit will be spearheaded by Windell "Goldie" Winterbottom, the smallest man in the line.

The Owls have been drilling extensively on a brand new offense, one thought necessary by coach Rex Hunsaker and aides George Miller and Jim Cordial, as a result of the one-sided 47-0 loss at Whitworth last Saturday.

The new offense will place the stress on speed but will have to be proved against the Chokers.

As of press time today coach Hunsaker had not decided on his starting lineup but it was almost a cinch that neither Lanny Myers, Bud Maupin nor Harvey Graham, all ailing backs, would be on hand.

Myers, who has been suffering with water on the knee, was taken to the hospital Monday night. No late report on his condition was available. Maupin, who was injured in an entanglement with a horse this summer, is still sidelined as is Graham who has another week of recuperation ahead of him because of a broken hand.

Eureka Squad Poses Threat To Pels In Weekend Action

The Eureka Loggers, an unknown quantity in so far as the Klamath Union High Pelican football team is concerned, figure to be one of the strongest clubs the KU eleven will face all season.

The Loggers and the Pelicans will tangle in Eureka's Albee Stadium Friday night in a contest that will have no bearing on the Southern Oregon Conference standings.

The game will be broadcast in Klamath Falls over radio station KFLW, to begin at 8 o'clock.

The Loggers, who have not been scouted by the Pelican coaching staff, have racked up victories in all three of their starts to date, the most convincing of which was their 25-7 triumph over Arcata last weekend. In past years the Arcata eleven has been considered the chief power in the Big Four Conference.

Coach Mark Melendy has rated his team with the 1955 squad which was quarterbacked by a 17 Force Falcon star Richy Mayo.

While the Loggers are about even with the KU gridgers in the weight department they are said to claim good speed in both the backfield and line.

The Eureka squad also boasts a fine fullback in the person of George Muzio, a 185-pound workhorse who is leading the conference in rushing gains.

The Pelicans, with a 2-1 win-loss record, have totaled 578 yards on the ground and 74 via the air-lanes while their collective opponents to date have netted 453 and 87.

First-down wise the KU club has the edge, 31-27 over their foe.

The top ground-gainer on the club is halfback Dave Stippich who has packed the ball 24 times for a total 183 yards. Fullback Larry McClure is next with 154 yards in 34 carries.

The Pel passing chores have been split between quarterbacks Sherm Allen who has hit four of 13 tries for a total of 62 yards, and Kent Hunsaker who has connected on two of seven.

Ken Lewis and Stippich share the reception honors with two each, and a total of 13 and 40 yards respectively. Both are halfbacks, back 50 yards.

Punt Return Glide Weapon
