

# Airline Service Discussed

SALEM (AP) — The question of what is adequate airline service to Eastern Oregon communities will be considered Monday at a hearing in Salem.

It will bring together officials of West Coast Airlines, the federal Civil Aeronautics Board, the communities of Baker and Ontario and the state public utility commissioner, Jone C. Hill, and the state aeronautics director, Robert Dunn.

John W. Dregga, CAB director of community and congressional relations, will hear Hill and Dunn air complaints about what they term inadequate West Coast Airlines service.

West Coast's vice president, Herman F. Scheurer, will represent the airline.

West Coast has indicated it would like to suspend service to the two Eastern Oregon points under the CAB "use it or lose it" policy which calls for at least five passengers boardings per day at each city.

Hill said the meeting was arranged with the hope of eliminating the necessity to ask formal CAB action to enforce an earlier order in which West Coast was asked to provide better service.

The order to West Coast Airlines called for commuter schedules that would allow business men to board planes in Eastern Oregon in the morning, travel to Portland and return the same day. He said present schedules make this impossible.

# 'Protection' Said Scandal

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI) — Dr. Willard F. Libby Tuesday characterized the state of fallout protection in the nation's schools and hospitals as a "scandal" and urged immediate steps be taken to remedy the situation.

Libby, winner of the 1960 Nobel prize in chemistry and a former member of the Atomic Energy Commission, made the remark in a chamber of commerce talk.

"There is no reason why there should be any deaths from radioactive fallout if proper steps are taken for protection," he said.

But, Libby warned, "in the current state of unpreparedness" from 20 million to 40 million deaths could result from fallout in an atomic attack.

# Banker Dies In Accident

WELLS, Nev. (UPI) — Prominent national banking figure Walter E. Cosgriff, 47, Salt Lake City, died in an automobile crash east of here Tuesday.

The former director of the Reconstruction Finance Corp. died in a one-car roll-over accident while on his way to Salt Lake City from Elko, Nev., where he had played in a local golf tournament.

Cosgriff was president of the Salt Lake Bees of the Pacific Coast League and was a championship tennis and golf player.

He had owned at least seven banks since his 23rd birthday when he inherited them from his father. By 1953, he owned more than 20 banks in Utah, Idaho and Montana worth more than \$200 million.

He was director of the RFC from 1950 to 1951. He was appointed by then President Harry S. Truman.

# Pilots Father To Ask Visa

ROANOKE, Va. (AP) — The father of imprisoned spy pilot Francis Gary Powers said today he will go to Washington next week to seek a Soviet visa to visit his son in the Soviet Union in the spring.

Oliver W. Powers of Norton, Va., repeated an earlier prediction that his son, serving a three-year sentence in a prison not far from Moscow, will have been moved to a penal colony a year and a half ahead of schedule.

The U2 pilot's plane was downed 1,300 miles inside the Soviet frontier on May 1, 1960. At a Moscow trial he drew a sentence of three years in prison and seven years in a prison colony.

# Copter Crashes On Highway

MERCED (UPI) — A helicopter crashed on Highway 140 seven miles west of here today after clipping a 12,000-volt power line. Three persons were hurt.

Treated at Mercy Hospital were pilot Bill Sigler, Newman, and his passengers, Andrew Martinez, Monterey Park, and Ben McWaters, Newman. Attendants said injuries were minor.

The crash occurred when the crop-dusting craft, owned by West Side Helicopter Service of Newman, took off from an intersection near a cafe.

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
