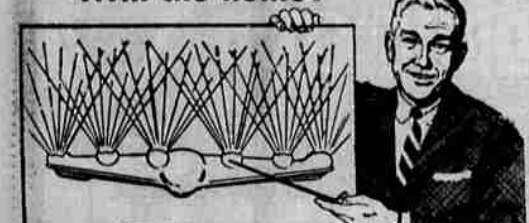
Genevieve Pierce, vice grand, reported on contributions to the eye bank. She told of an encouraging response, but urged members to continue their efforts.

### Others Will Not Consider Your Age If Not Reminded

If you want others to forget your age, there is one thing you have to do. Forget it, yourself.

That means you must not keep reminding others of your age by remarks that begin with such phrases as "At my age..."

"When I was your age..."

"If I were younger..."

"I'm too old to..."

All such phrases force others to consider your age when, if the matter were never brought up, they probably wouldn't give it a thought.

That's one reason for not dragging your age into the conversation. Another is that you can't feel young when you are talking about how old you are. And as long as you let yourself feel young you will act young, too.

Also, when you start talking about how old you are, you begin to make excuses for not doing things you could do on the grounds that you are too old. It becomes an easy alibi for limiting your life more than necessary.

Haven't you heard people say they were too old to make new friends, or too old to learn something new, or too old to make a move to a new place, or too old to correct a fault, or too old to care about their appearance.

And yet with just a few more years those who aren't so age-conscious go right on doing all those things the age-conscious have convinced

themselves they are no longer capable of doing.

This doesn't mean you ought to pretend that you are younger than you are. That's silly and rarely fools anyone.

All it means is that if you don't want others to attach a lot of importance to your age you ought not to attach a lot of importance to it either.
